# Volunteering which fits around your life!

Care Networks' Help at Home service provides practical help for people who are recovering after a hospital stay, unwell at home, or who need a bit of practical assistance to help them remain independent



at home . Help at Home volunteers visit people in their homes and provide practical help with tasks like checking someone is ok, shopping and collecting prescriptions. Visits can be one-off or several over 3 weeks, so volunteers are not overcommitted but will know they have been of help to someone in need. Visits can be undertaken in the spare time volunteers have available during the day, evenings or weekends, they just tell Help at Home when they are free.

Hilary Johnys, Senior Direct Services Coordinator at Care Network said: "Volunteering is good for you - it's a fact! Statistics show you may live longer and you will certainly benefit from knowing you have helped others and made a difference to their lives. Our volunteers may be people who work full or part time, are retired or unemployed. Age is certainly no barrier, one of our oldest volunteers is 90, and really enjoys visiting people and providing the help they need. Care Network provides volunteers with training, support and pays any out of pocket expenses (usually mileage and telephone).

Gill has been a volunteer for over 16 years. She said, 'Yes I have been doing it for a long time, and have so enjoyed it. Mainly one's clients are older people, often rather apprehensive, especially if they have been in hospital for a few weeks. To be able to visit them, perhaps do shopping, collect prescriptions, but mostly just talk to them and impart confidence in their own ability, is very rewarding.'

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# **SUMMER HOLIDAY SAFETY**

The school summer holidays are here, so to help reduce the risk of accidents over the coming months here are some guidance points below;

#### **FIRES**

Keep matches and lighters away from children. As the weather improves and the things start dry out children setting fire to rubbish and grass can result in fire crews attending minor incidents that not only damage the natural and local environment, but potentially delay fire crews in attending more serious life threatening fires.

### **WATER AWARENESS**

Make sure your children are aware of the dangers of swimming in ponds and rivers. The temperature of inland water does not vary much throughout the year. The water in Britain is still very cold in the spring and summer people can quickly become affected by the cold putting themselves into difficulties, tragically too many children drown every year. Swimming should always be confined to a supervised pool with life guards.

#### **DANGEROUS BUILDINGS**

Children climbing onto factory roofs and other buildings put themselves in great danger; all too often this results in the fire service attending a fatal incident to assist paramedics in gaining access to buildings where children have fallen through the roof.

### **MALICIOUS CALLS**

Know where your children are this Summer - Hoax calls tend to increase during the summer months, remember hoax calls cost lives! A fire engine cannot be in two places at one time. If we are responding to a hoax call it means we may be delayed in responding to a life threatening emergency.

# **BARBEQUE and PATIO HEATER SAFETY**

Keep children well away from barbeques and patio heaters, there have been instances when children, whilst playing, have run into barbeques and heaters and suffered burns. NEVER use petrol to help light a barbecue.

# **ROAD SAFETY**

The age group most at 'Risk' of being involved in an accident are children aged between 5 –14 years of age, with the highest casualty rates occurring with children aged 12. As a minimum please ensure your children know how to cross the road safely, have taken a cycling proficiency course and always wear a seat belt when travelling in a car. ALL cyclists should wear a properly fitted cycle helmet.





#### **Road Closure and Diversions**

For surface repairs the following roads are to be closed and diversions put in place.

Between **7am and 6pm on 6th to 7th August** the Sixteen Foot Bank Road will be closed between the Upwell Road, Christchurch and Padgett's Road junctions.

Between **7am and 6pm 8th to 24th August** the Sixteen Road Bank Road will be closed between Padgett's Road and Bedlam Bridge (Upwell Road March).

For the latter closure it is expected that the road will be open at weekends.

The level crossing on the approach to March (Upwell Road) will be closed from 22:00 Sat 18th Aug to 10:00 Sun 19th Aug.

### **Bushes and plants overgrowing paths**

The Council would like homeowners to consider those who use footpaths, especially those with prams or who use wheelchairs, and ensure that hedges, bushes and shrubs are cut back so that people can pass on footpaths unimpeded.

# MINUTES OF THE CHRISTCHURCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY 11th JUNE 2012 – MEMORIAL HALL CHRISTCHURCH AT 7:30pm

Present: Councillors – Jacky Wincote (Chair), Nigel Russell, Jill Bliss, Simon Freeland, Hannah Poole, Wes Poole, William Beswick, Fred Yeulett (CCC) and Will Sutton (FDC).

Stephen Cowell (Clerk) and 2 members of the public were also in attendance.

# 1. Welcome and Apologies

The Chair welcomed all to the meeting.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr. Cotterell MBE (FDC) who is attending a meeting at another Parish Council and PCSO Martin Bogunovic.

### 2. Signing of Minutes

The minutes of the 14<sup>th</sup> May meeting were signed, by the Chair, as true record of the meeting.

# 3. Disclosure and Declarations of Interests

Cllr. Bliss declared an interest in payment 9.2

# 4. Update on action points from previous meeting

The Clerk reported that:

Following the handing out of Jubilee Mugs at the Townley School Assembly the Council still has 14 left and it was suggested that these are given to children not yet attending school.

Sharman's will be repairing the Play Park equipment that has rotten wood and are awaiting the wood to be delivered once this has been delivered the equipment will be repaired and they will then review all other issues reported in the RoSPA report and provide the Council with quotes for repairs.

# 5. Review of Finance Regulations

The regulations were reviewed by the members and continued adoption was ratified subject to the correction of a spelling mistake in section 1.6.

# **6. Public Adjournment**

Members of the public raised the following:

The mess left by the Football teams in the Recreation Ground after matches and training. It is not as bad this month as in the past but still too much is being left. The Clerk said they will be reminded to clear up after themselves.

The costs of replacing the 40 mph sign with 30 mph signs seem high. It was explained that the costs previously stated would be worst case costs. Both members of the public volunteered to help erecting the signs if this would reduce the costs.

### 7. Police Update

The Clerk reported that PCSO Bogunovic has sent his apologies.

The report he has sent the Council includes three issues, the theft of a boat from March that was seen being loaded onto a vehicle at the bottom of Euximoor Drove, the setting alight of a car in Crown Drove and the arrest of someone for having a small cannabis growing factory in Green Lane.

### 8. Correspondence Received

The Clerk brought to the attention of Councillors:

An anonymous letter complaining about such issues as dangerously parked cars on Church Road that are for sale and untaxed, the amount of dog mess on the pavements, the lack of police presence and speeding cars. The Clerk reminded councillors that dog fouling was reported to the Fenland District Council a few weeks ago and additional signs have been put up. FDC had informed the Council that they cannot prosecute anyone until they catch them allowing their dogs to foul the pavement. Other issues have been reported to the Police who arranged for the Dog Bin to be emptied (it was reported to be full of papers). The Clerk was asked to inform residents of what action is being taken by putting an item in the Heron and asked to send a copy of the letter to the PCSO and invite him to the next meeting.

A letter informing the Council that the company who have provided the Council with new street lights and made repairs to existing lights have gone into liquidation. The Administrators hope to sell the company to another, based in Norfolk that also provides these services.

Planning consent has been granted on the land adjacent to the Bowls Green. Cllr. Russell reported that a local estate agent is requesting information from FDC to allow the plots to be put on the market.

Details of a number of road closures and diversion.

The Council has been successful in its bid to get improvements to the Croft/Church Road junction on to the Joint Minor Highways plan. The Council's financial input has been estimated at £900 but this may change once the detailed plan is completed. The other bid, to lower parts of the kerb near to the Bus Stop on Upwell Road, is on the Reserve list. This work will be done if funds are available after completion of all the approved bids.

It has been confirmed that funds have been set aside by County Highways for the resurfacing of the Sixteen Foot Bank road were the surface has cracked and is uneven.

### 9. Finance

The Clerk reported total bank balances of £55,277.75 and brought to Councillor's attention the earmarked funds (funds that must be spent on specific purposed) that total a little over £33k.

The following items, listed on the agenda, were agreed for payment 9.1 Clerk's Salary £183.58 9.2 The Heron £65.00

### **10. Planning Applications**

There were no applications to review.

# 11. Responses to the Speed Limit Reduction Consultation

The Clerk reported that he has notified Cambs Highways that the Council has completed its consultation. The next step is to wait until other Councils have completed theirs and then the appropriate information will be published. There are 4 other councils with schemes pending that will share the costs. Cllr. Sutton reported that one of those councils has committed to the main costs of the advert.

### 12. Parish Plan - Update

Nothing to report.

# 13. Raising of Village Concerns

The following items were reported/discussed:

Pot holes along Poulter's Drove.


A Village Walkabout and general tidy up. It was decided to defer this until the current wet spell ends.

Removal of the old roundabout base on the Recreation Ground requires some heavy duty equipment. Cllr. Russell said he would look into the matter.

The Chair thanked Cllr. Sutton for representing the Parish Council at both the Highways Funding Bid reviews and at meetings regarding the planning consent for the land adjacent to the Bowls Green and thanked all for attending and closed the meeting at 8:25pm
