The signs they are a changing to help end flood roads misery for travellers through West Norfolk village

ROAD closure misery at Welney is set to be reduced dramatically when new electronic information signs are installed this Autumn.

Three signs will give real time flood status updates on the A1101 so that motorists know immediately if they can pass through safely.

The dot matrix signs, costing £20,000, were agreed during what was described as the "most positive meeting that has ever taken place" between multi agencies in an effort to solve Welney's flood lock problems.

Next on the list is an in-depth economic study into the impact of road closures so councillors can seek European funding for a solution such as building a causeway over the current road which in just three months this year has already been closed for 46 days.

Gathered for the meeting at Welney village hall today were SW Norfolk MP Elizabeth Truss, Conservative Euro MEP Vicky Ford, county council representatives from both Norfolk and Cambridgeshire because Welney sits on the border of two counties, district councillors and borough councillors.

Mrs Ford said:

"Welney is a unique part of East Anglia which takes the flooding so that everybody else doesn't have to."

"In short it takes it on the chin for everyone else upstream. It is time we did something to help local residents and businesses live with that."

Miss Truss said that closing the road meant longer journey times to work for local commuters and headaches for hauliers trying to get through with deliveries.

"We need to improve links between Norfolk and Cambridgeshire to help rural economic development" she said.

Parish council chairman Ken Goodger praised the linking up of so many interested parties and for the first time felt positive that a real solution could be found.

In the meantime the signs would make a huge impact, he said.

Currently, county council staff drive out to erect and take down road closure signs as the flood levels rise and fall but is an unreliable system, he said.

"Flood signs are up today and cars are wasting time making 20 mile detours yet there is only a couple of centimetres of water on one tiny area of the road."

"If the new signs were in drivers would know straight away they could get through."

One sign will be positioned at the Lotts Bridge Crossroads, one at the March road junction and one at the Welney Bridge. Existing electronic water level measurements gathered by the Environment Agency will be used to relay instant updates to the signs.

If successful it is hoped other signs can be rolled out further afield.

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Welney may well be in Norfolk county, but the decisions made there affect many of its surrounding Cambridgeshire villages.

The past month or so has seen many reports coming out of Welney regards the flooding of 'the wash' and its detrimental effect to local residents, businesses and a loss in revenue.

Sadly we do not see the same reports appearing throughout the year regards the detrimental effect it has to the surrounding villages whilst the wash is OPEN. For the vast majority of the year we endure lorries on roads, damaged by these very same vehicles on roads that were never intended to accommodate these and commuters speeding through the villages as short cuts.

We don't see reports of councillors campaigning to have speed limits reduced on our residential rural village roads, many of which are still designated national speed limits, nor do we see campaigns to have weight restrictions put on roads that are quite clearly not up to the job, ending up costing you, the local residents, for the repairs through local taxes and increasing water rates.

The Wash has been flooded each year for over 100 years, so because local businesses and residents have not factored these closures into their business plans and choice of residence we have to build a causeway?

Therefore it was refreshing to find the following readers letter in the Wisbech Standard. This letter highlighting an interesting fact of the Welney wash I'm sure many are not familiar with...

We said no to Welney Wash walkway so we could continue using property for reason it was purchased... Shooting

IN response to MP Steve Barclay's campaign to build a causeway over the A1101 Wash Road, Welney.

This would cause problems to people needing to access their properties off the existing wash road, which gives access to fields on the Ouse Washes either side.

Therefore it seems logical that the existing road needs to remain where it is and any new structure would need to bypass Welney altogether.

The Ouse Washes prevent our low lying Fenland from flooding. The A1101 at Welney floods less now than at any other time during its history thanks to the Environment Agency, Middle Level Commissioners and the internal drainage board working together to move the water off quickly during times of heavy rain.

Last year was an exceptional year and it is not only Fenland which has been flooded, albeit we have probably got off lightly in comparison to other counties hit by floods.

While I accept businesses do suffer when the causeway floods, it is not the closure of the road harming business but the way people now live their lives.

I do wonder, however, why people move into an area where they know flooding takes place if they are not willing to accept from time to time the road may not be passable?

The flooding of this Wash Road isn't new. It's been doing it since the washes were first constructed and floods at Earith, Sutton and Welney, with Sutton having a raised wooden walkway to allow foot passage to the village.

During the last government John Prescott wrote to landowners with land adjacent to the A1101 asking if we would give permission for a walkway to be constructed to allow foot access.

We declined that request because we purchased our property for shooting during the winter months. To allow foot access would prevent us from using the property for which it was purchased for - shooting.

Shooting makes the property hold its value. Out of perhaps a dozen properties all accessed off the A1101 causeway, five are shot over on a regular basis throughout the winter. Three belong to shooting clubs and two are in private hands.

The fact that they are shot over makes them very expensive properties worth well in excess of £10,000 per acre. Only recently nine acres of washland at an out-of-the-way location sold for in excess of £90,000.

A bridge over the existing causeway would be a bridge too far and wipe out the value of those properties in one go.

There is a lot at stake here, besides the revenue the local landlord lost in his trade.

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More Choice in Social Care

Social care is provided to people who have been assessed as having substantial or critical support needs with personal care, getting meals, managing medication and staying safe.

If you need social care the County Council will arrange your care for you, but they now have a duty to offer and provide Direct Payments. Direct Payments are an alternative way of getting the care and support you need. They are cash payments made directly into a Direct Payment bank account so that you can use the money to make your own social care arrangements.

With a Direct Payment you have more choice, control and independence about how your care is organised.

I must first declare an interest; my house is one of the three old ones built round what was the village green long ago, hence the strange name.

It looks into the bus shelter. Christchurch cottage has a side view of the shelter. The third house, set amongst its trees, has no view of it at all. *(Photograph by Keith Hill)*



Upwell Road curves here, and a bus stopping to drop off or pick up passengers can impede traffic in both directions. If we ever have a bus service, a bus stop would be in a better place if sited where the road is straight.

The shelter itself is an eyesore, as well as currently serving little purpose, although if I might indelicately refer to the "unspeakable" in the article, the building has on occasion been put to uses for which it was neither plumbed nor adequately constructed - at least, view viewed from the east - when it was put up in the second half of the 20th century...

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DOES YOUR DOG BARK TOO MUCH???

All dogs bark, but if yours goes on all day or night, and the barking is upsetting your neighbours, it might be not only courteous, but also wise to take action.

Dogs bark to communicate with each other and us, and no one should expect to have a completely silent dog. It's unreasonable to expect dogs to be quiet if there is a knock at the door, for example - it's their duty to tell us someone's there! And living in the country as we do, most people not only own a dog for the company as a pet, they are a very good early warning system to alert us to possible changes around us.

However, problems can arise when a dog barks excessively. Some people can not tolerate persistent sounds and not only just find them a little annoying but can become something that causes them extreme stress and upset. Eventually causing an issue even when the dog isn't actually barking, just the not knowing of when it will start again and not stop can become an obsession.

If you think, or have been told that your dog barks more than is usual, the first step is to consider *why* he's barking. Also, make a note of *when* your dog barks and the type of sound it is, so you can address the underlying emotional cause better.

Is he uncomfortable, or in pain? Is he bored? Is he barking because he's been left alone and is trying to call you back? Or, if your dog is only left for short periods, has he or she become over-dependent on you?

If your dog barks at things outside your yard or garden, don't let it go outside on its own. Keep it away from windows, so it can't see people or other animals.

If your dog barks at the same time every day, like when people in the house are going to work or school, try to keep it busy at that time. For example, you could take it for a walk.

Try to keep your dog calm. If it barks when it's excited, don't play with it at anti-social times like very late at night, or times when you think others might be enjoying a snippet of limited peace and quiet.

If your dog's barking and you're in a flat or a semi, try to keep it away from any walls you share with your neighbours.

Don't leave your dog outside if it's barking to be let in, or if it is trying to alert you to something. Having a dog as an outside burglar alarm isn't much good if you don't pay attention to the alarm, lets face it when your car alarm goes off do you ignore it and carry on watching the TV??

See if you can get a friend or relative to look after your dog when you go out, or take it with you.

Make sure your dog gets some exercise before you go out. A tired dog barks less.

Something to bear in mind

If you don't take steps to solve the problem, and your local authority receives complaints about the noise your dog is making, the authority has a legal obligation to investigate the complaint. The local authority may seek to resolve the problem by mediating between you and the complainants, but where it does not do so, or where such mediation is unsuccessful, and the authority is satisfied that the noise amounts to a statutory nuisance, it will serve you with an abatement notice requiring the noise to be reduced to an acceptable level.

If you fail to comply with an abatement notice, you could face prosecution and, if convicted, a fine of up to £5,000 (and possibly further daily fines of up to £500 for each day on which the offence continues after conviction). You may even be forced to attend at your own expense dog training classes.







**MINUTES OF THE CHRISTCHURCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING
MONDAY 11th FEBRUARY 2013 – MEMORIAL HALL CHRISTCHURCH AT 7:30pm**

Present: Councillors – Jacky Wincote (Chair), Nigel Russell, Jill Bliss, William Beswick, Wes Poole, Mac Cotterell MBE (FDC) and Will Sutton (FDC) who arrived during item 11 as he had been attending another meeting.

Stephen Cowell (Clerk), PCSO Russ and 1 member of the public were also in attendance.

1. Welcome and Apologies

The Chair welcomed all to the meeting.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr. Simon Freeland, Cllr Hannah Poole and Cllr Fred Yeulett (CCC).

2. Signing of Minutes

The minutes of the 14th January meeting were signed, by the Chair, as true record of the meeting.

3. Disclosure and Declarations of Pecuniary Interests

No interests were declared.

4. Update on action points from previous meeting

It was reported that:

- Cllr. Russell had met with a Highways Department rep regarding the damaged verge at Cotton's Corner and the damage has now been repaired.
- The Clerk has provided Cllr. Russell with a copy of the conditions of consent for filing and piping the ditch near the building plots to be sold by the Council.
- That PCSO Russ has been made aware of the comments made at the last meeting regarding dog fouling.
- The Clerk has had a meeting to discuss the Jointly Funding Minor Highways bid, made two years ago, for an improvement to the narrow footpath near the Bus Shelter. They discussed alternatives such as widening the path and installing a priority system similar to that in place in Friday Bridge and also dropping the kerb closer to the bend so those having to take to the road do so for less distance. He has yet to receive any formal response following the meeting (see update provided by Cllr. Sutton in item 11).

5. Public Adjournment

No items were raised for discussion.

6. Police Update

PCSO Russ reported that there have been no crimes reported this month in Christchurch. He also reported that a Speedwatch was undertaken on 10th Jan with no vehicles exceeding the limit. The New Police and Crime Commissioner has stated that he would like communities to be responsible for Speedwatch and that the Police are currently setting up a new method of working. The aim is to have a Co-ordinator who will assist with Speedwatch in each area / village however the aim is eventually for each community to set up their own Speedwatch team with the co-ordinator assisting as required. Team members will be trained in the use of the equipment which can be borrowed from the Police Station and used as frequently as required by the teams. The advantages of this type of system is that the equipment can be used at key times and if required over a number of days, rather than once a month often during off-peak times.

There continues to be a number of oil thefts across the rural area, it is suggested that oil tanks are checked regularly and secured with padlocks. There are also alarms available that alert the owner if the oil level drops rapidly.

PCSO Russ also reported that the New Horizon Outreach Vehicle (previously CrimeBUSTer Bus) is due to be in operation shortly, we hope to have use of the vehicle for the Wisbech South Rural Forum that will take place on 28th March. The bus will hopefully be located in Maltmas Drove Friday Bridge between 11.30 and 18.00 hours with the meeting taking place between 18.00 and 19.00 hours.

Continued

The rural area will now be covered by 2 PCSOs, Andy Bush a seasoned PCSO has already started his duties. This will ensure we have sufficient resource to attend Council Meetings, visit schools and Neighbourhood Watch Members amongst many other duties.

PCSO Russ left the meeting at the conclusion of this item.

7. Correspondence Received

The Clerk reported that very little correspondence has been received this month and that all that has been received has been e-mailed to councillors.

Cllr. Cotterell provided a verbal update from the District Council reporting that the coming years will be difficult from a financial point of view as District and County Councils are requested by Central Government to make further cuts. He reported that the Council Tax figures will soon be available on the District Council's web-site and he expected an increase of around 2%.

8. Finance

The Clerk reported total bank balances of £55,215.66, with cheques written amounting to £2,201.96 to come from this, and brought to Councillor's attention the earmarked funds (funds that must be spent on specific purposes) that total a little over £33k.

9. Planning Applications

None to consider

10. Parish Plan – Update

The Clerk reported that the solicitors for the purchaser of two of the plots of land to be sold to fund the new village hall have been requesting information on the covenants and agreements affecting the land. The Clerk and Cllr. Russell have provided details of the County Council's release of the covenant related to the use of the land and Cllr. Russell has agreed to waive his Right of Access over the land. Cllr. Russell has also completed a sale questionnaire that included details of the upkeep arrangements for the surrounding land owned by the Council.

11. Raising of Village Concerns

Cllr. Sutton joined the meeting at this point.

The following items were reported/discussed:

1. Continued concern over the number of pot holes in the road surface along Euximoor Drove was raised as was the poor quality of repairs made to the bridge over the Sixteen Foot Drain at the top of the Drove. Cllr. Russell reported that he has mentioned the latter to Highways.
2. The two street lights along Euximoor Drove are in need of replacement bulbs.
3. The water leak at the Sports Pavilion was discussed currently the water is switched off after use to prevent more leakage. Following a discussion the Clerk was asked to contact the Bowls Club to see if their monitoring suggested how much of a problem it is.
4. Cllr. Sutton reported that there is a broken manhole cover in the car park. He has covered it over with some board and offered to review the problem and discuss potential repairs with a local builder.
5. The cost of councillors receiving Electoral Role updates by registered post was discussed. The Clerk pointed out that this is a requirement of receiving updates as the District Council has to make sure the correct person receives the update.
6. Cllr. Sutton reported that the District Council Environment Officer is to meet with the resident who raised a number of environmental concerns recently. A date for the meeting has not been agreed yet but Cllr. Sutton hopes to attend and Parish Councillors will be also welcome to attend.
7. Cllr. Sutton reported that works have been approved to drop the kerb near the Bus Shelter as mentioned by the Clerk in item 4.
