We have been contacted by Will Sutton (Cllr) in regard to numerous enquiries he has been receiving in connection to concerns that local residents have after seeing their Blue and Brown bins being emptied into the same refuse lorry, which raised the question of the benefit of residents taking time and effort to sort their rubbish if it is being collected into one vehicle.

He has sent the following article in the hope it quells peoples concerns as to the effectiveness of recycling.

New 'One Pass Solution' Vehicle Collects on Efficiency

A new design of refuse vehicle is being used to support the refuse and recycling teams to continue to deliver a high quality and cost effective service to some of the more remote parts of Fenland.

The vehicle is specially designed with two separate sections to allow it collect two bins at the same time.

It is used to collect blue and brown bins from more remote locations and as a result will reduce the amount of miles travelled and time spent servicing these more difficult to reach locations.

This vehicle is an integral part of the Environmental Services efficiency work that has been running within refuse

and recycling over recent vears.

The 'Tom Daley of the duck world' hits a record high at Welney

STAFF at the Wildfowl and Wetland Trust in Welney have recorded the largest ever number of tufted ducks on the Ouse Washes, with numbers hitting almost 3,500.

Affectionately known as 'tufties', due to the feathers on the head, tufted ducks have bold black and white plumage and brilliant yellow eyes.

Known by staff as the Tom Daly of the avian world, the ducks dive deep under the water's surface to feed and despite the recent deep water from flooding, they have not been fazed.

Visitors to Welney can see them at the daily swans feed, where they join some of the thousands of swans and other ducks that spend the winter at Welney.

In between the swan feeds the birds are out on the wild The Welney-based reserve feeding on larvae and aquatic insects. Steve Wiltshire, warden at WWT Welney said:

"Although the tufties aren't doing anything as extravagant as Tom Daley's two and a half backsomersault with two and a half twists, they've certainly made a splash at Welney!

"We pick up peak counts of birds such as the tufted ducks, by monitoring them regularly in our wetland bird surveys throughout the winter, which is hugely important for conservation because it helps us track the long term trends of populations.

"February and March are usually when we see the highest wildfowl counts, as birds start to move back through the UK from further south. It is also the time when males are looking their best in their breeding plumage and starting to display to the females."

There are not many weeks left to see these diving demons. Water levels on the Ouse Washes are now dropping as it transforms from a haven for wintering wildfowl to prime breeding habitat for wading birds over the summer.

Swan feeds run daily until Sunday, March 10, at 12pm and 3.30pm.

Support for Welney Washes causeway

Electronic signposts showing realtime flooding updates will be installed to alert drivers about the state of the A1101 Welney Wash Road.

The move, which will solve the problem of road closure signs remaining in place after the water has gone misleading motorists into taking unnecessary diversions, have come thanks to local MP Steve Barclay.

The North East Cambs MP is campaigning for a causeway to be built over the flood plain and has secured backing from fellow MPS Elizabeth Truss and Jim Paice.

Following the launch of Mr Barclay's campaign for a causeway over the floodplain, Welney Parish Councillors met with Norfolk County Council to discuss plans for electronic signposts showing real time flooding updates.

Mr Barclay said: "I am delighted that my colleagues are lending their support for this project. Flooding on the Welney Wash is a recurring problem for residents and the possibility of electronic road signs would provide an effective short term solution to the problem.

"Flooding in the area for around 50 days per year is a major inconvenience and impacts on local business. We need to take concrete measures to limit this issue and work with local authorities to take action on long term solutions like our campaign for a causeway."

Under the parish partnership scheme, Norfolk County Council has offered to fund 75% of the £15,000 cost of the signs, meaning the parish council is now on the hunt for the remaining £3,250.

Mr Barclay will meet with the MPs and local councillors at the site on March 22 to highlight the need for both short and longer term solutions for local drivers and residents who need access to the road.

He has also written to the Transport secretary, Patrick McGloughlin and Norfolk County Council asking for a feasibility study on the project to build a causeway over the floodplain.

A DRIVER had a lucky escape on the afternoon of Feb 25th when his lorry toppled off the road and ended on its side in a Fenland field.

Police received reports of a lorry which had left Wimblington Road, Manea, at about 3.30pm.

The vehicle was stuck on its side in a field close to the junction with Station Road, but the driver was unharmed.

A police spokesman said: "It was causing a distraction more than anything because people kept stopping to check that the driver was safe.

"It is unknown how the lorry managed to get there."

National survey reveals East of England as UK phone scamming hotspot

Research for Microsoft's Spot the Scammers campaign reveals number of people targeted by phone scam in East England is highest in UK.

The East of England has been identified as the UK phone scamming hotspot, as Microsoft reveals that over 40% of people surveyed in the area have been targeted by a computer phone scam.

The figure for the region is almost 7% higher than the national average, which stands at just under 35%. Almost 42% of those asked in the East of England have been targeted, or know someone who has been targeted, by some form of phone scam in the last month alone.

In response to these findings, Microsoft has launched the Spot the Scammers campaign to raise awareness of the prevalence of the computer security phone scam and to provide a list of simple steps people can take to avoid falling victim to it.

The computer security phone scam typically involves a call from someone claiming to be a reputable technology firm like Microsoft. The caller will use this name to gain the trust of the victim, offering to help them solve bogus computer issues or remove viruses. In reality, their intention is to trick the recipient into giving out personal information or bank details, or to install malicious software on their computer.

Research conducted in 2010 found that victims in the UK lost on average £745 as a result of the scam.

Stuart Aston, Chief Security Advisor at Microsoft, highlighted the dangers of the scam: "Essentially, this scam is a confidence trick conducted by often quite sophisticated criminals, who are adept at gaining their victims' trust by using a name like Microsoft, adopting industry jargon to make them sound professional and using apparently personal information to appear legitimate. We've launched the Spot the Scammers campaign to raise awareness that the scam exists – and ultimately that is the best way of ensuring people don't fall victim to it. Just as you wouldn't hand over your credit card to any stranger who knocks on your door, you should always be wary of unsolicited callers asking you for personal information or bank details."

Stephen Proffitt, Head of Action Fraud, backed the campaign: "In the six months from August 2012 to January 2013, Action Fraud received 5,434 reports of computer software service fraud." This is an increasingly common fraud where fraudsters cold call every number in the phone book and convince victims their computer has a problem before charging them for apparently fixing it. "Software and anti-virus companies do not cold call customers, so if anyone calls claiming to be from such an organisation and offers to fix your computer, tell them you will seek advice locally and end the call. If you think you have been a victim of fraud report this to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by phoning the contact centre on 0300-232040."

Microsoft has produced the following top tips to help people avoid being scammed:

- Always be suspicious of unsolicited calls or emails from people offering help with a security problem, or any other problem with your computer. Microsoft will never call you in this way or ask for money related to fixing a computer problem.
- Do not go to a website, install software or follow any other instruction from someone who calls you out of the blue
- Take the caller's information down and pass it on to your local authorities or to Action Fraud
- If you have received a call and think you may have been a victim of a phone scam already, you are advised to:
- Change your computer's password, change the password on your main email account, and change the password for any financial accounts, especially your bank and credit card
- Use free software like Microsoft Security Essentials to find out if you have rogue software installed on your computer
- Contact your bank and credit card companies

MINUTES OF THE CHRISTCHURCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY 14th JANUARY 2013 – MEMORIAL HALL CHRISTCHURCH AT 7:30pm

Present: Councillors – Nigel Russell (Chair), Jill Bliss, Simon Freeland, William Beswick, Hannah Poole and Will Sutton (FDC).

Stephen Cowell (Clerk) and 1 member of the public were also in attendance.

1. Welcome and Apologies

The Chair welcomed all to the meeting.

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr. Jacky Wincote, Cllr. Wes Poole, Cllr. Cotterell, Cllr. Yeulett (CCC) and PCSO Russ.

2. Signing of Minutes

The minutes of the 10th December meeting were signed, by the Chair, as true record of the meeting.

3. <u>Disclosure and Declarations of Pecuniary Interests</u>

No interests where declared.

4. Update on action points from previous meeting

It was reported that:

- A New 'No Dogs' sign for the Recreation Ground has been purchased. Cllr. Wes Poole and the Clerk agreed to fix it to the wall of the Sports Pavilion.
- Letters requesting local hauliers to avoid the village to reduce noise pollution and property damage have been sent to two hauliers and the Clerk is awaiting information from Councillors with the names of other hauliers who have lorries driven through the village.
- One scheme has been submitted to the Highways Department as part of the Local Highways Improvement Scheme. This scheme is that discussed to improve signage at the Padgett's Road and Upwell Road junctions with the Sixteen Foot Bank road.
- The Clerk has been in touch with FACT offering them a number of alternatives regarding the advertising of their service but as yet has not received any response.
- Information has been passed to Cllr. Yeulett regarding correspondence relating to the overgrown shrubs obstructing paths in Fenview.
- The Highways Department have inspected the road and verge at Cotton's Corner after the Council's complaint that it had been left in a poor state of repair following the bridge repairs. They feel there is no work required. Cllr. Russell and Cllr. Sutton offered to meet with Highways Reps on site to discuss. Clerk to contact Highways.

5. Public Adjournment

No items were raised for discussion.

6. Police Update

PCSO Russ has issued a monthly report that has been sent to all Members. The report includes 1 incident of an abandoned vehicle and 1 of a number plate being stolen plus a report on people flagged down motorists reporting that they have run out of petrol offering to sell items for cash to buy petrol. 1 Speedwatch check has been undertaken in Christchurch with no incidents of speeding. Anyone wishing to help with these checks should contact PCSO Russ.

7. Correspondence Received

Items discussed included:

- Results from the Access to Health Care in Fenland survey a copy of the results was given to Cllr. Bliss.
- The consent to pipe and fill the drain near to the land being sold by the Council on Upwell Road. The Clerk was asked to provide Cllr. Russell with a copy so he could review the consent to ensure it was in line with the verbal agreement he had made.
- The e-mail received from a resident regarding the lack of emptying of rubbish bins in the village, which was circulated to all members. Cllr. Beswick reported that the bins were emptied the day after receipt of the e-mail after he had phoned FDC to report that they were full. He also reported that he checks on them regularly and reports any that are full. The Clerk was asked to respond to the resident.

8. Finance

The Clerk reported the changes to the Parish Precept process and the receipt of the Council Tax support Grant. He also, along with Cllr. Sutton, reported the changes to the Concurrent Grant process and its likely reduction in the financial year 2014/15 and subsequent years.

Following a discussion on the impact of these changes it was decided to made no changes to the budget discussed at December's meeting. It was proposed that the budget recommended by the Clerk at the December meeting be authorised. This was seconded and agreed by all. The Clerk clarified that this will mean that the amount requested via Precept would be reduced by the amount to be provided by the Council Tax Support Grant this was accepted by the Council.

The Clerk reported total bank balances of £55,190.66, with cheques written amounting to £1,832.38 to come from this, and brought to Councillor's attention the earmarked funds (funds that must be spent on specific purposed) that total a little over £33k.


10. Parish Plan – Update

Nothing to report.

11. Raising of Village Concerns

The following items were reported/discussed:

- The short term future of clubs and societies that use the Memorial Hall should it suffer flooding and roof problems again. It was reported that clubs and societies can and have used the sports pavilion. If this became a regular occurrence formal arrangements would need to be agreed with the Bowls Club. Cllr. Bliss reported that a local builder has inspected the roof and is doing what short term repairs/patching up that are possible and that the Memorial Hall Committee has agreed to continue to run activities from the hall in the short term. The sale of the land adjacent to the Bowls Club and the building of a new hall/extension of the Sports Pavilion was discussed. It was agreed to discuss again once the most recent letters regarding the sale have been reviewed.
- Concern over the number of pot holes in the road surface along Euximoor Drove was raised as was
 the poor quality of repairs made to the bridge over the Sixteen Foot Drain at the top of the Drove.
 It was agreed to discuss the latter with a Highways Rep when the Cotton's Corner issue is discussed.
- Dog fouling along Church Road was again discussed with a councillor relating an example of a
 resident seen kicking mess under a hedge rather than clearing it up. It was suggested that PCSO
 Russ is made aware of the problem.
