Voter registration forms will be dropping through letterboxes from the 2nd October 2013 and Fenland District Council urges you to confirm your details as soon as possible.

They require a response from every household, even if your details have not changed. You may not realise that you have to register every year and that you are not automatically registered even if you pay Council Tax. You may also find that not being on the electoral register can affect your credit rating.

If we do not receive a response, canvassers will be out door knocking non-responding properties to obtain information from late November 2013 till January 2014. All canvassers will carry official ID.

To ensure your details appear on the register, you need to respond by 10th February 2014 at the very latest.

If once you have responded your circumstances change, or you do not receive a form, or you have a query about registration, please contact the Electoral Services team.

Upwell Health Centre Newsletter September 2013

A lot of water has passed under Church Bridge in Upwell since my last newsletter, even at the rate of flow in the Welle Creek! The practice has had many significant changes and we are already starting our 2013 flu vaccination campaign.

The most notable change has been the retirement of Dr David Bevan. David had been a doctor here since the mid 1980's when he replaced the late Maurice Handoll. During his time he pioneered the computerisation of the practice in 1987; played a huge role in the MAGPAS service in the area, finishing off flying around in the helicopter ambulance saving many lives; spent several years as the Chairman of East Cambs and Fenland PCT; fascinated us all by his often extraordinary wardrobe and looked after a large number of patients with psychological problems who miss him now he has left. He is still doing the occasional locum shift in other practices in the area but is mainly taking it easy. I'm sure you will join me in wishing him a long and happy retirement.

Dr Vineet Bhardwaj has been appointed a partner in David's stead and Dr Heidi McDowell and Dr Kavin Unamboowe have been appointed as salaried GP's. The two new doctors are doing 7 days a week between them. This means we are now offering many more hours a week consulting time following David's retirement even allowing for the fact I am now working at the CCG on Thursdays. Heidi is an experienced GP who has moved to the area to be with her new husband, while Kavin has just completed his GP training having spent the last year as our GP trainee. We also have a new trainee who you may remember as she has already spent six months with us a few years ago. Dr Rebecca Smith will be with us for the next year until she too completes her training. While on the subject of the doctors I feel I must make a mention of the other Dr.Williams who has been helping us out so much over the last two years. He found it amusing that I was often referred to as the old Dr.Williams, I hope because I had been here longer! He had recently retired from a Wisbech practice and is several years my senior and was flattered by the inference about his age. He is currently not working in the practice but is on stand by should he be needed for any future sickness or maternity cover. I mention him in order to profoundly thank him for all his invaluable help.

The growth in the size of the practice in recent years has put a strain on our nursing team which has also been unfortunate in having a series of long term sickness episodes. The upshot of this has been that a lot of the care for people with chronic disease that the nurses have done has been missed. Notably diabetic and spirometry clinics have got well behind and the smoking cessation service has been quite restricted. We felt we had to take action to address this problem and we have been very lucky to be able to appoint Angela Mills in the new role of Long Term Conditions Specialist Nurse. Angela ,until recently, was the matron on the medical unit of Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Kings Lynn, prior to that she was a diabetic specialist nurse in the hospital. Angela started with us in July and has so far been concentrating on the diabetics in the practice. She is rapidly catching up with the clinics we have missed and if you are a diabetic and you haven't met her yet I am sure you will very soon. As her title implies she will not only be looking after diabetics. The next diseases she will be taking on the long term monitoring of are essential hypertension (raised blood pressure) and ischemic heart disease (angina and heart attacks).

This will mean that those of you on repeat prescriptions for blood pressure tablets, heart tablets and diabetes treatments will in future have to make appointments with Angela for your routine reviews. Angela is fully trained in looking after these conditions and will be delighted to meet you and do your checks. The effect this, and the other changes I mentioned earlier, will have on the rest of the practice should mean that it will be easier for everyone to book an appointment with the doctor of their choice without having to phone up on the day, which is the way things have been for the last year or so.

I now come to the news on the flu vaccination campaign. As usual we recommend that all of our patients over 65 should have a flu injection. Also any adult who suffers from a long term condition which makes them more likely to be unwell with flu. The list of qualifying conditions include diabetes, people who have had a heart attack or have angina, heart failure, congenital heart disease, asthma, COPD and other chronic lung disease, chronic kidney disease, stroke, TIA's in the past and degenerative neurological disease, those who are immunosuppressed due to disease or treatment e.g. steroid therapy. You may also have the vaccine if you are the main carer of a disabled person or if you live or work in a care home.

This year there is a new flu vaccine for children aged 2-10 which instead of being an injection is administered as a spray up the nose. This vaccine has been used in other countries for several years and has proved both safe and effective. This year we are offering the new vaccine to ALL children aged 2 or 3 on September 1st this year, and to all children with one of the qualifying conditions listed above between 4 and 10. Over 10 and you will be given the usual injection. The only exception to this are very severe asthmatics where the spray up the nose may trigger the asthma; this group need vaccinating but will be offered the injection.

There will be three Saturday Morning vaccination clinics as usual. The clinics will run from 8 am until 11am and we ask you contact us in advance to be given an indicative time to attend, this will ensure you do not have to wait too long. The clinics will be on:

September 28th October 5th & October 12th

Finally I would like to welcome back to the practice Paula Howe our dispensary manager. Paula has been off since January undergoing the grueling treatment needed for her cancer. I am pleased to say she has now completed her treatment and is being phased back into work during September. I am sure pharmacy will benefit from having her guiding hand back on its tiller.

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Care Fees

Your whole family may be able to benefit by possibly defending against some potentially estate stripping deductions that local authorities can make on your older relatives' assets.

Worrying about inheritance tax could be taking your eye off the ball, with average care fees of \pounds 482* per week that is \pounds 25,064 per year. This can do far more damage to a potential inheritance over 4 or 5 years than inheritance tax may ever do. Elderly relatives do not choose to go into care, it suddenly happens as the only option available. Then the decision about, who pays, and how, follows straight on. Even if the Local Authority pay initially, they will usually have the right to demand it back. Maybe you, or relatives of yours, can do something to protect the equity in the home.

How have we found this information

In 2013 the Isle of Ely Federation of Women's Institutes was awarded A Heritage Lottery Grant to record the life of women in Fenland over the past 100 years. Every W.I. is able to participate in this interesting project.

Christchurch members have been very busy reading and recording items of interest from our minute books since the W.I. was formed in 1928. This has now been completed and all the Christchurch minute books, scrapbooks and other items of interest are now stored at Wisbech museum for safe keeping and will always be available to us. This is part of the project to preserve for the future. Our next part of the project is oral interviewing followed by photography. This will produce an exhibition put together by members to tour the region and to be available for loan to schools, history societies etc. It will be completed in 2015 which will also be the centenary of our National Federation.

MINUTES OF THE CHRISTCHURCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY 12th AUGUST 2013 – MEMORIAL HALL CHRISTCHURCH AT 7:30pm

Present: Councillors – Nigel Russell (Chair), Jill Bliss, Hannah Poole, William Beswick and Will Sutton (FDC). Stephen Cowell (Clerk) and 16 members of the public were also in attendance.

1. Welcome and Apologies

Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr. Freeland, Cllr Wes Poole, Cllr. Cotterell MBE (FDC), Cllr. Yeulett (CCC), PCSO Russ and Roger Gladwin.

2. Signing of minutes

The minutes of the 8th July meeting were signed, by the Chair, as true record of the meeting.

3. Co-option to the Council to fill the vacancy

The Clerk explained that two residents, Mr Roger Gladwin and Mr James Hughes have expressed an interest in becoming a councillor and following a vote by Members Mr Gladwin was co-opted.

4. Disclosure and Declarations of Interests

Cllr. Russell declared an interest in planning application F/YR13/0540/F as he is the applicant.

5. Update on action points from previous meeting

The Clerk reported that:

- Highways report that the metalled part of the village end of Crown Drove finishes adjacent to the last house. Concern was expressed that there is a large pot hole in the un-adopted part of the drove. Cllr. Sutton offered to see if he can locate some material to help fill the hole.
- The proposed improvement scheme at the Padgett's Road and Upwell Road junctions with the Sixteen Foot Bank Road where new reflective posts have been placed has now been completed.
- The Police have been written to to request increased presence at these meetings.

Cllr. Sutton reported that the keys to the sports pavilion have finally been returned to him.

6. Public Adjournment

The following subjects were raised and discussed:

- Several of the residents present registered their opposition to the proposal to have a dog walking area on the Recreation Ground. Following a short discussion Cllr. Russell requested a show of hands and all residents expressing a preference opposed the proposal.
- A resident reported that she had heard that the planning application F/YR13/0485/F was not supported by FDC Planning officers and that she felt that it would be a shame if the future of the new village hall was put in jeopardy if that sale falls through. Following a discussion the Clerk suggested that residents should contact FDC directly and register their views of support or opposition to the plans.
- It was confirmed, by Cllr. Russell, that the sale of the single plot adjacent to the Bowls Green was moving forward.
- A resident speaking on behalf of others reported that it was felt that the cutting back of trees inside the border of the Recreation Ground that overhang residents gardens was the responsibility of the Council and not residents. It was agreed that Cllr. Bliss would contact the contractor who cuts back the willows on the Recreation ground to see if he can cut back the trees overhanging resident's properties.

- Residents requested an update on the New Village Hall project. Prior to this being given Cllr. Russell expressed his annoyance at the poster put up round the village inviting residents to this meeting as it was inaccurate and gave the impression that it was an invite made by the Parish Council. Several of those present reported that they had thought it was a Parish Council notice. The author of the notice apologised for this. It was agreed that Cllr. Russell would point out the inaccuracies in the notice after the meeting had ended. The Clerk then provided an update to the meeting reporting that 5 quotes for the renovation that has planning consent for are being reviewed by the Council along with some headline information on new build costs. The Clerk informed those present that building cannot commence until one of the plots adjacent to the Bowls Club has been sold or the two Charities merge he also reported that VAT charged on a renovation project can only be claimed back on Parish Council money spent and not money held by the Charity. The Clerk reported that a high level review of finances make a new build unlikely.
- In answer to a question as to whether the existing building could be retained if a new hall was built the Clerk reported that the Cash Flow Forecast built on expected usage does not support this as the insurance, utility bills etc would be higher than income would support and that there is no indication that two buildings are needed or would attract significantly greater income. Additionally, car parking space would be lost.
- The lack of telephone lines recently was discussed as some residents had been without phone lines for two weeks but others reported that they had chased BT and got theirs back within hours after threatening non payment of bills.

7. Police Update

The Clerk has distributed, to Members, PCSO Russ's report that included incidences of rowdy nuisance and vehicle nuisance both in Crown Avenue.

8. Correspondence Received

The Clerk brought to the attention of Councillors:

- The revised King's Lynn and West Norfolk Local Plan that is available for review and comment.
- Bowls Club request for recompense. Councillors agreed that the main fault was with the Football Club and asked the Clerk to refer the matter to them. Clr. Sutton was asked to pass on contact details to the Clerk.
- E-mail from a resident regarding Dog Fouling, Speeding, Barking Dogs and the poor state of roads.
- Cllr. Russell reported that he has received the invoice from Scott's for the work undertaken on the internal door of the Sports Pavilion.

9. Finance

9.1 The Clerk reported bank balances of \pounds 51,541.59 with cheques issued to the total of \pounds 2,941.95 to be paid from this.

The Clerk reminded Members that around £32k was earmarked for Play parks.

- **9.2.2** The Heron £70.00
- 9.2.3 Advert for the Clerk's vacancy £24.00

In addition an invoice of \pounds 1,260.00 to E. Mason & Son (Farmers) Ltd for grass cutting was authorised.

10. Wicksteed proposals for new Play Park Equipment

The proposals, in design form, were available for review. It was agreed that the proposed equipment would be an improvement on the existing equipment and would challenge youngsters more. It was agreed that the Council should obtain quotes from other companies.

11. Planning Applications

The Council reviewed planning applications;

F/YR13/0507/O – outline planning for a single storey dwelling involving the demolition of outbuildings at Holly Tree Cottage, Crown Road, Christchurch. Councillors and residents were concerned about vehicle access to Holly Tree Cottage after the changes and felt that they could make the road less safe. The application was not supported.

F/YR13/0540/F – Erection of a 2-storey 3-bed dwelling on land north east of Brimstone House. Prior to leaving the room Cllr. Russell explained that he already has planning consent for a property on the site and that the footprint size will be no different just that the orientation will be different. Councillors felt that the change in orientation would make the views around the adjacent road corner better and supported the application.

The Council also noted planning application F/YR13/0485/F – erection of a 5-bed dwelling on land north of the Bowls Green for which it has a financial interest.

12. Proposal to provide a dog walking area on the Recreation Ground

No councillor seconded the proposal and in light of the residents' opposition the proposal died.

13. <u>Parish Plan – Update</u>

There were no updates above and beyond those relating to the Play Parks.

14. Raising of Village Concerns

The following items were reported/discussed:

- 1. Councillors expressed concerns about the lack of a Clothing Bank and the Clerk was asked to refer the lack of FDC action to Mark Matthews.
- 2. Street light FDC 8 in Upwell Road is on all day.
- 3. Water is not draining away from close to the Shop due to the drain being higher than the road and the drain near Horseshoe Cottage is damaged.
- 4. The Football Teams are still leaving a lot of rubbish on the playing field rather than putting it in the nearby bins.
- 5. Some pot holes in Euximoor Drove have been filled but the majority have not.

The Chair thanked all for attending and making the meeting a lively one and hoped that many would attend in weeks to come and then closed the meeting at 8:40pm.
