and angry, they were particularly concerned about the young foal who was unlikely to survive without its mother. They quickly became 'hot property'!

Thieves parked a fairly large vehicle/trailer on the 16 Foot Bank, made a hole through the hedges and dismantled a 12,000v electric fence, herding the animals on board. They must have been terrified, as evidenced by those who managed to avoid capture. Before the theft took place all would approach to be hand fed, now they are scared and the owners can't get near them at present.

Police were slow to react to the theft but Jo immediately informed customs, ferry ports, airports, trains, and slaughterhouses. A rusty white van with no number plates has visited the site at night a further five times since the original theft along with a blue Audi A6. On two separate occasions persons were found 'hiding' at the site and were chased off, heading across the fields towards Manea. A pair of gloves were also found, left after the thieves dealt with the electric fence. In addition male and female footprints were found in one of the barns along with fingerprints on a ride-on mower.

Jo also began a very successful Facebook campaign with details and updates on the theft. One post had over 60,000 responses within half an hour of being posted. There has been a fantastic amount of support from Facebookers and others with both sightings of the ponies and other information.

As a result of various leads supplied, 27 other 'lost' ponies have been found, and eventually, just a few days later, two of the stolen ponies were spotted in a field in Christchurch on Padgetts Road. Following up various leads and with police help, five of the other Falabellas were traced to a gypsy site in Mildenhall. Currently only one of the little treasures remains missing (see cover). Thankfully, among those rescued was the little three month old who is now reunited with its mother.

Please check out Jo's Facebook page for full details and updates on this bizarre story, and share the details with your friends. Let's try and find the last missing Falabella. The theft occurred sometime between 10.00pm on Wednesday 12th July and the early hours of Thursday 13th. Surely somebody must have seen something? Anyone with any information regarding the theft of these beautiful little horses please get in touch. Any information received will be handled discretely,



but remember there is a reward.

An additional temptation for the thieves seems to have been a large generator which was formerly on the site. Amongst other parts this housed over £7000 worth of copper wire! The generator has now been removed and, so, hopefully any further threat. Jo and Dan slept in their car on the field with the remaining ponies for several nights. There is now additional security in place with regular checks being carried out on the grounds throughout the night. Jo and Daniel wish to send out their heartfelt thanks to all those who played a part in the retrieval of seven of the eight Falabellas stolen. With their success so far, they remain hopeful of finding the final missing Falabella, Barbie, (as shown on front cover) who is still missing at the time of going to press. **RWBG**

Flu Jabs - appointments can be booked from now onwards. Two clinics in September 23rd and 30th and two in October 7th and 28th ALL 8am-11am

These are recommended for anyone over 64, those who are currently pregnant or for younger people who suffer from chronic lung disease, such as asthma or COPD, diabetes, heart disease or various conditions where your immunity is reduced.

We again will be offering nasal flu vaccine to children in the target population, however some children will be offered vaccination at school. We will run separate clinics for those children who need a flu vaccination so please do not book them into the Saturday clinics.

We are offering a pneumococcal pneumonia vaccination to everyone over 64 and we are also continuing with the shingles vaccination campaign. This year we can offer a jab to: people born on or after 2nd September 1946 and are aged 70 and people born on or after 2nd September 1938 who are aged 78 or 79. If you are unsure if you are eligible please ask the doctor or nurse at the time of your flu vaccination.

Those who are regular readers of this column may have noticed that the last couple of reviews have been less than fulsome in its praise of the musicians visiting the club.

Last month my complaints centred around a lack of communication with the audience, well this month that criticism was turned on its head as bass player Len Skeat stood at a microphone and gave a potted history of each of the players as they took to the stage.

Once in place Paul Eshelby on Trumpet and Flugelhorn with Robert Fowler playing Tenor Sax, Graham Harvey Piano, ably supported by Len Skeat and Neil Bullock on Bass and Drums respectively, hit the groove running with a fast tempo version of Sweet Georgia Brown.

Musically impeccable, except when Paul Eshelby began playing the wrong song, a problem that was swiftly corrected with humour and wit. The band swung like the clappers through a high energy version of film composer Michelle LeGrands "Watch What Happens" as well as a highly sensitive version of the classic "Misty." Played beautifully on the tenor sax by Robert Fowler. A high point came when Trumpet Man Paul led the crowd in a rousing sing-a-long of the



bridge of Kathy Kirbys "Secret Love" before the band stormed in with an energetic swing version of the same song. In a Jazz Club, Priceless.

The humour bouncing around between the band members was infectious, as "Have you met Miss Jones" was introduced, Len commented from behind his bass, "She got married you know" followed by short discussion on who the lucky man might be.

Paul entertained with gag after gag, all funny, one or two a little risqué, but all well received. A special mention must go to drummer Neil Bullock, the youngest member of the band and one of the best drummers I have seen in a long while.

In conclusion, it was a pleasure to see a group of musicians so on top of their game that they could relax in to the gig and involve the audience in such a special way. **Top marks Upwell Jazz Club.**

The Sparrow Family - part 2- by John Sparrow

John Sparrow, concludes a two part series going into where his family came from and what made them the family they are now - Ed'

My father Harry worked for Mr Frank Scott at Christchurch as a farm lorry driver, his pride and joy was a Morris Commercial. Jobs were collecting Scotch Seed potatoes from local stations, Stonea, Upwell and Waldesea Sidings, also fetching fertilizer from Fisons of Thetford and taking fat cattle to Kings Lynn market on a Tuesday.

Mother and Father were married in 1934 at Christchurch Church, a morning service, the afternoon was spent at Hunstanton, and transport was a Bullnose Morris car thanks to Mr Frank Scott his boss and back to work the next morning.

The four eldest boys did service in WW1, John was the eldest. He joined the 2nd Suffolk Reg. and was killed in action August 1918, buried in France and was awarded the Military Medal. Fred enlisted in the Norfolk Reg. Transport Machine Workshop Division, his job was to maintain and repair motor vehicles. He travelled through many countries during the war. Charles was also in the Norfolk Reg. and spent most of his service with horses traveling to Turkey and Palestine.

James joined the Cambridgeshire Reg. at a tender age of 16 as a messenger boy and was awarded the Military Medal. Fred, Charles and James all survived and returned home.

The younger boys William, Harry and Joe had to wait until WW2 to serve their country with the Home Guard. Harry (father) had a driving licence for a lorry so he was given the job as the ambulance driver in a Ford V8 Pilot that doubled up as a troop carrier. The Home Guard went on exercise to Thetford Forest and Cockley Cley. Harry had a good knowledge of the roads being a lorry driver as all the road signs had been removed in case we were invaded by the Germans. My Uncle William (Bill) was made a

corporal because he could read a map. Joe the baby of the family was a Pte. In the Home Guard. On exercise at Welney by the bridge they decided to go fishing, not with a rod and hook but with a hand grenade thrown into the river, bang! all the fish were stunned and ready to collect for dinner. Joe left school at the age of 12 to work on the land at the Piggery Farm Hole-in-Wall, Padgetts Rd. which was owned by Mr Lenny Frances.

Steam must have been in the blood of the Sparrows from Grandad George to his sons. William driving Fowler ploughing engines and Aveling Porter threshing engines. Fred, after returning from WW1, joined a travelling fair and ran a Savage Carousel with a steam engine in the centre driving the ride and providing lights. The Savage was made in Kings Lynn. Many fine example still exists today. He also worked on the building of the Great North Road now the (A1).

After WW2 Fred worked in East Africa on the Groundnut scheme which failed after 2 years. The British government tried to grow nuts in the desert, no water and lots of wind proved unsuccessful. The government put forward £25 million to clear 150,000 acres of scrub land only 50,000 acres were cleared leaving an unusable dust bowl, cost had risen to £49 million and they all came home.

Jim worked the Boots Bridge water pumping engine along the 16ft river at Stonea. His son Jack followed on after his dad retired.

Joe was a late starter working the Bedlam Bridge pumping station, built in 1947 with two Ruston and Hornby diesel engines. They could lift a total of 80 tons of water per minute from the fens into the 16ft river. My father Harry would run the night shift if they needed to run 24 hrs. during a very wet period.

Nellie was in service in London before returning home to be the first post lady in Christchurch.

May attended Wisbech High School after winning a


scholarship, she lodged in the town coming home weekends.

Ada was in service at Lynn Road, Wisbech starting as a scullery maid and finishing as house keeper before marriage.

Mr Aveling of Aveling Porter steam engines was born in Elm Nr Wisbech before moving to Rochester.



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
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




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Sticky Chicken Sticks with lime mint & chilli

from Richard Hughes, Christchurch's own Celebrity Chef

Soak the wooden skewers in water for 30 minutes.

- Make the marinade by mixing together all the ingredients for it.
- Put in the chicken, turning it over to make sure it is all coated, cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours.
- Thread the chicken on to the skewers and shake off any excess marinade.
- Heat the oil in a large frying-pan (big enough for the chicken to lie flat). Alternatively heat a dry griddle pan and use the oil to paint the chicken. Better still place it onto the hot coals of the barbecue.
- ◆ Cook on all sides until the chicken is cooked through, starting on a high heat to get a good colour all over then turning the heat down or move to a cooler part of the barbecue bars. The whole process takes about 10 minutes. Add salt and pepper and squeeze over some lime juice.
- ◆ Offer extra wedges of lime on the side and plain boiled rice and the Asian slaw.

For the Chicken:

- ♦ 12 boned chicken thighs, cut in half
- ♦ 1½ tbsp groundnut oil
- ♦ juice of 1 lime
- For the Marinade:
- grated zest and juice of 4 limes
- ♦ 2 red chillies, deseeded and shredded
- ♦ 3 tbsp soy sauce
- ♦ ½ tbsp fish sauce
- ♦ 6 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tbsp chopped mint
- freshly ground black pepper

On our return to the 'secure' compound, two weeks later, to Graham's dismay they had damaged his motor by reversing it too far at some point and catching the trailer on the rear bumper! A repair that later would cost over £200.

Anyway, we eventually set off on our 190 mile drive to Venice. Thankfully this was uneventful and we arrived in Venice later that afternoon around 3.00pm. We booked into our hotel, quickly dumped all our gear, and then took our bikes off the trailer and headed off to register at the venue Adria which was about a 20 minute ride away. The scenery around us was almost like being back in the Fens! Very flat with drainage ditches, great views, and familiar big skies. After registering we had a quick look around the venue, bikes still arriving, then we headed back to the hotel for our evening meal. This is it! See photo 1 opposite.

It comprised a massive tomahawk steak, hanging over the edges of the plate with scallop potatoes and shredded onions. Beers were rather expensive in the hotel. When the waiter said €12 I thought he meant for all three but they were €12 each!! That's about £10.50 for a beer!




