Designs for the UK's first ever Christmas stamps by children came about as a result of a competition held

by children came about as a result of a competition held by children's TV show - Blue Peter - in 1966.

After the competition was announced by then Postmaster General - Tony Benn, eight professional stamp designers judged more than 5,000 entries, and awarded the winning prize to Tasveer Shemza and James Berry, two 6 year olds.

Seen opposite is Shemza's design which is a brightly coloured drawing of Good King Wenceslas, from the popular Christmas carol, and James Berry's Snowman. Children's designs have only been used on Christmas stamps twice since then; once in 1981, and more recently in 2013.

Fifteen years later, in 1981, viewers of the popular children's TV programme, were inspired to enter a second Christmas stamp design competition. The theme was 'Christmas Through the Eyes of a Child', and produced five very different Christmas stamps. Then in 2013......





Franking Sense!

In the build up to Christmas, millions of people around the world will have been wrapping gifts, and sending both parcels and seasonal greetings to loved ones far and wide. To cope with all the bulging post bags the Royal Mail will be carrying out deliveries up to and including Christmas Eve.

The tradition of sending Christmas Cards started in 1843, when Sir Henry Cole, who had helped to create the worlds first uniform postal service, Britain's Penny Post, commissioned John Callcott - Horsley to come up with a design. The first Christmas Card showed three generations of a Victorian family sat around a table at Christmas. One thousand cards were printed. Last year, according to The Greeting Card Association, over nine million Christmas Cards were bought and sent by festive wellwishers! That takes some licking! Royal Mail first published its own special Christmas stamps in 1966, with childrens paintings of a king and a snowman. For years Christmas stamps had a biblical theme. Nowadays secular and biblical imagery alternate, year on year. However, even in the years dominated by robins, snowmen, and Father Christmases, the Royal Mail still make stamps with biblical themes available. Which is first class news! For whether we post cards or not the message of peace and goodwill is not only one that the world needs to hear, but also the reason for the delivery of Jesus into the world!

At Christmas God sent his flesh and blood Son into a dark, sinful, lost and selfish world as a fragile, venerable baby. As a man Jesus' mission was to bring light, forgiveness and peace. Jesus reached out to those on the edges; those marginalized through race, illness, age or poverty. Jesus welcomes those burdened with guilt because of bad things they had done, or shame because of what had been done to them! Ultimately, Jesus gave His life so that we can live!

The shepherds, angels, and crib scenes of festive philately are more than heart warming images; reaching not only across our own country but across the world! They are a reminder of God's plan to save the world! Jesus is God's down to earth gift to us all; from Benwick, to Christchurch, to Doddington, to Manea, to Wimblington, and all over our local communities, and the world!



"A Lithuanian Christmas!"

Our village is blessed by having people living here who come from cultures different from our own. Sandra Kriauciunaite and her partner Justas Zidonis are originally from Lithuania, though they have lived in our country for many years. They have lived in Christchurch for over 4 years now. They have two young daughters, Luka Zidonyte (5), and Ariele Zidonyte (3). You may have met Sandra. She works in our pub.



"A traditional Lithuanian Christmas actually begins on the Friday before Christmas. Fish is the main dish of that day. We don't eat meat, and don't use eggs or mayonnaise in the preparation of that meal. Our main Christmas Celebrations begin on **Christmas Eve**. Traditionally, we exchange gifts that evening, although many younger people these days do that on Christmas Day.

Our Christmas Tree doesn't go up until Christmas Eve. The family dresses the tree together. We love this tradition, which our parents and grandparents kept when we were living in Lithuania. We adults have happy memories of decorating the tree when we were children.

Our main Christmas meal is also on Christmas Eve. Family and friends come together to celebrate with us at our house, at about 7 or 8pm. We don't put any flowers on the Christmas table. Instead, we just place a white table cloth on it. We put candles on the table, and lay a place for each guest; but there is always one extra plate on the table. This represents any family and friends who cannot be with us, or have passed away. This plate is always kept empty. We put a special



candle beside the plate as a sign of respect and remembrance.

Some people also add straw, to represent the crib in the stable where Jesus was born. At the end of the meal, they play a little game. Each person draws out a piece of straw. The length of the straw, they say, relates to how long you may live – a long straw means a long life. We don't keep that particular tradition in our family.

Before we begin our meal, we all stand in silence. We sign ourselves with the sign of the Cross. Then we pass a large wafer round from one person to the next, adults and children, each one breaking some off, all sharing together. (We buy the wafer in Eastern European food shops here in Britain). Someone then says the prayer that comes with the wafer, and everyone joins in with 'Amen' at the end. Traditionally, a Lithuanian Christmas Meal consists of 12 different dishes, representing the 12 months of the year that has passed. Again, no meat, eggs or mayonnaise. The main dish is always fish; usually white fish, such as Cod, but sometimes other fish. Pike is sometimes used. It is considered to be a symbol of fertility. We don't use Pike. The other 11 dishes (often more!) can be potatoes, vegetables, salads, and all kinds of finger foods such as small mushroom pies. Everyone brings a contribution. My favourite main dish is Salmon, and I make another dish which is very colourful and tasty; filleted herrings, with stir fried carrots, onions, garlic and ketchup. It is served cold. Traditionally, only RED wine is served.

Everyone has to try everything!





Village Store Robbery in Outwell!





50% of all fires in the home start in the kitchen, and more than half of those are as a distraction whilst cooking! We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- 1. Never leave cooking unattended.
- 2. Do not cook when tired or under the influence of alcohol ordrugs or that can make you drowsy.
 - 3. Regularly clean the grill pan and oven as a build up of fat and oil can catch fire.
 - 4. Never leave anything cooking if you have to leave the house.
- 5. Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob tea towels, oven gloves, or even washing baskets can catch fire!
- 6. Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when instructions are not followed accurately, such as using inappropriate packaging, or cooking for too long.
- 7. Oven chips, or temperature controlled deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with oil or fat, and turn it down it starts smoking.
- 8. Fire can break out in household appliances, so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines, and driers. Never leave them on if you go out or go to bed, and register your appliances online to make ensure that you are made aware of any faults or recalls.
- 9. Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking, it is probably in the wrong location, or you may have the wrong type of fire alarm.

10. Never leave the batteries out of your fire alarm.

There are also sweet dishes and drinks which are especially for Christmas time. We make the traditional "Poppy Milk". Poppy seeds are boiled with water, sugar or honey, and then liquidised. This is served cold, in bowls, with small baked dough balls made from flour, water, poppy seeds and salt. Then there is Cranberry Juice. The cranberries are boiled in water, with lemon juice and honey added. A small amount of potato starch is added to thicken the juice a little. This is served cold, and is a beautiful colour. Someone will bake a traditional Poppy Seed Pastry Roll, and others will bring different sweet dishes.



Any food that has not been eaten is always left on the table until Christmas morning. Many Lithuanians will attend Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve". **Sandra**

Vet's View

The Christmas is almost on our doorsteps. With plenty of food and decorations plus festive carelessness and willingness to share owners can create a multitude of risk to their pets. This month I would like



to list most dangerous things, even if some of them have been mentioned before.

- 1. Chocolate contains the obromine which is toxic, causing vomiting, diarrhoea, arrhythmia, seizures and death.
- 2. Mince pies, Christmas pudding and variety of other festive cakes these contain rasins, again very toxic, resulting in kidney damage
- 3. Onions, garlic and chieve all cause damage to red blood cells
- 4. Blue cheese although tasty and known to give people weird dreams blue cheese is toxic to pets.

 Conaining mycotoxins like roquefortine and penitrem blue mould can cause tremors, seizures and death.
- 5. Macadamia nuts this delicacy is also toxic to pets although the actual mechanism remains unclear. Eating macadamia nuts can make our pets suffer signs of vomiting, ataxia or weakness, fever, muscle tremors and depression.
- 6. Tinsel cannot stress how much I hate the thing. Each year we see animals, especially cats, who love eating tinsel. Long thin strands of tinsel can get anchored in the throat or stomach and then, being fed into intestines, can cause massive damage to the gut, leading to necrosis of the intestine. This often results in lengthy and complicated surgery, sometimes we have even to resect part of the bowel. Seeing some animals perish over the years after eating tinsel I would recommend steering away from this decoration, especially if you have a cat!
- 7. Candles and scent candles these can lead to burns and quite often curious cats can overturn them, causing fire risk
- 8. Snow globes might contain antifreeze, highly toxic to our pets. Its sweet smell and taste attracts both dogs and cats. Ingestion will cause acute severe kidney failure with very little chance of survival.

Please employ the common sense and make sure we don't have to meet over Christmas in an emergency clinic! HAVE A GOOD ONE! Nick

Thank you to all who donated to Race For Life last term, we raised £351! Such a fantastic amount for such a small school.

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

I hope that the new team will be able to maintain and/or improve those standards and wish them every success in their endeavours!


