In 1979, the Iron Curtain was virtually impenetrable. Rarely did anyone from East Germany manage to flee west. But a film by Michael Bully Herbig tells the true story of two East German families who made a spectacular escape attempt a decade before the Berlin War fell. On September 16, 1979, the Strelzyk and the Wetzel families flew to freedom in home-made hot air balloons: four adults and four children wedged in a basket measuring two square meters, and towering 30 meters above them the balloon made of 1,245 square meters of material. For half-an-hour at night, the gondola carried the families to their destination in West Germany's Bavaria, 18 kilometers from their starting point in communist East Germany.

## UPWELLHEALTHCENTRE

#### Introducing the "On the Day Team"

We will shortly be implementing a new approach to looking after our patients for all immediate needs and queries. It will be called the "On the Day Team".

Each day the practice will have a team of clinical professionals whose job will be to look after all patient appointments, phone calls and queries that come into the practice that day. The team will be made up of a mix of different clinicians - Paramedics, Advanced Nurse Practitioners, Physicians Associates and at least one GP. This team will work together to ensure all patient needs are met.

#### So, what does this mean for you?

It is quite like what you are used to. When you call, you will be asked to give us a little bit of detail regarding your condition or query. Based on a GP approved list of scenarios we will offer an appointment or a telephone call back. In some cases, we may refer you to another healthcare provider. For example, a minor injuries unit (for a suspected broken bone say) or a Pharmacist.

When you are offered an appointment, you will be given a time to arrive at the surgery on the same day – just check in as normal and you will be called in by a member of the On the Day Team as soon as possible.

If you request or are offered a telephone call back a member of the On the Day Team will call you as soon as possible. Please ensure you give us the correct number to call you on and be available to take the call. The most significant change you will notice is that patients obtaining an appointment or a call back on the same day will not be able to request a specific clinician as it could be any one of the team members. Be assured however that you will be seen by a suitably qualified individual and there will always be GP support in the team to assist if needed. You will still be able to pre-book an appointment with a specific clinician for future dates for non-urgent matters. As currently, if you have an urgent need on the day and all appointments have gone then you will be spoken to by a clinician and seen at the surgery as required.

#### So, why are we making this change?

This is a big change to our method of working internally and our aim is to be able to manage an increasing workload, maintain good care and be ready for the future. Like many practices we are using other clinical roles in conjunction with GPs to ensure that we have enough GP time available for patients that can only be looked after by a GP. The number of complex patients (with multiple conditions and medications) is increasing yet the number of GPs nationally is simply not keeping up. We also need time to consider and develop our services to you.

#### **Comments & Suggestions**

We may need to alter how we manage the system after a period of time. Please do not hesitate to let us know how the new system is working for you. Thank You.

## THE YEAR TO BACK BRITISH FARMING



### How the Fens delivers for Britain

The fields around Christchurch are part of a rich agricultural and natural landscape that delivers both for food and the environment.

A report produced by the National Farmers' Union (NFU) shows just how much food is produced in the Fens and how farmers are working to mitigate the impact of climate change. It also highlights why the people, property and farmland in the Fens must be protected for the future.

Statistics in the report include:

- $\pounds$ 3.1 billion the value of the Fens' food chain
- 500,000 people live in the Fens
- 80,000 workers are employed from farm to fork in the Fens
- A third of our fresh vegetables and more than a fifth of all UK flowers and bulbs are grown in the Fens
- 428,000 homes can be run off Fens-generated renewable energy.

The report points out that well-maintained flood defences are essential to protect the people, businesses and the 1,500 square miles of the Fens, much of which is below sea level. You can read the report here: <u>http://bit.ly/fensreport</u>

### Public urged to back British Farming

Cambridgeshire residents are being asked to get behind a new campaign that recognises the important role farmers play in feeding the nation and caring for the countryside.

Food and farming contributes over £120 billion to the UK economy and provides jobs for more than 4 million people.

British farmers produce food to some of the highest standards in the world but there are concerns that future trade deals will allow the imports of food produced to standards that would be illegal here.

As part of the Back British Farming campaign, the National Farmers' Union (NFU) is asking the public to urge local MPs to champion British food and farming.

The campaign website also includes information on food standards, food labelling and advice on how you can enjoy fresh, quality produce by buying seasonal food.

Christchurch Community Centre Committee

For many years adults told Linda Ekins, an experienced vocal tutor coaching children, students, amateurs and professional singers, that they couldn't sing; never could sing because they remembered being told by teachers when they were very young to sing quietly at the back or play the tambourine instead. Sadly, children don't develop their "musical ear" until between 8 and 14 years old. Most were discouraged from singing before they had learned to listen - before friends become important and communication skills develop quickly.

Linda had a theory that even as adults, people could learn to listen and tune in to sing confidently. She won a grant from the Arts Council to develop her idea and so in 2017 she set up her first course, Viva la Voce, which means "live the voice!"

During that course everyone felt so good about singing they all "tuned in," they started to sing in harmony and even had a go at Improvising. At the choir's first big show at Christmas, several were brave enough to sing a solo or a duet.

But members did much more than sing better. They gained a confidence which changed their lives as they realised they could achieve what they wanted and not hold back.

Viva la Voce is now part of LEADA Cambs CIC, a company set up by Linda and fellow Directors, dedicated to "Make Life Great through Creative Dramatic Arts." Viva sing their favourites and make their own music.

## Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is looking for on-call firefighters to join on-call fire stations around the county. On-call firefighters aren't based at a fire station, instead they carry a pager and respond to emergency incidents as and when they happen.

The Service has introduced a new **daytime contract** to the on-call service, which allows people to be available to respond to emergencies from just **24 hours a week**, for example while working at their regular day job or from home.

The new contract is available for anyone interested in joining an on-call station, providing they can offer a minimum of **24 hours per week (between 7am and 7pm during the week**) and attend the weekly drill night.

On-call firefighters can be men and women that come from every walk of life. They may be at home, working for themselves or a nearby company, or even out in their local community. They must maintain their availability to respond to emergencies by staying within five minutes travel time of the fire station. They receive an annual wage plus additional payments for attending incidents and drill nights.

**PUBLIC TIME: Christchurch Eco:** Nate Lansdell reported on the litter pick held on Saturday January 11<sup>th</sup>. 14 people joined up, which broke an unofficial record for the number of people attending and wanting to start a Street Pride Group. The Fenland District Council rep who attended was impressed. Well done to Nate. (See back page) He also talked of a Green Dog Walkers Scheme. Further details to the next PC meeting. DID YOU KNOW...

Although there are many accounts of coffee history dating back to the ninth century and earlier, the earliest credible evidence of humans interacting with the coffee plant comes from the middle of the 5th century. This is when it was consumed in the Sufi monasteries of Yemen. Monks drank it to stay alert during their night time devotions and long hours of prayer.

## Vet's News

Our Winter this year has been rather mild and wet. The footpaths are wet and muddy. Many dog owners will choose to take a stroll in the Norfolk woodlands.

At this time of the year a vet doesn't want to think about Alabama Rot disease. Fortunately, this disease has not been confirmed in Cambridgeshire and Norfolk as yet, but with each year that passes, it seems to be getting closer to our region. I think it would be good to know a bit more about it.

Alabama Rot, or *Cutaneous and Renal Glomerular Vasculopathy (CRGV)* is a disease that causes damage to blood vessels in the skin and to kidneys. The disease is very challenging to diagnose and to treat and is potentially life threatening.

The first signs are developing skin sores, not caused by wound or injury. Skin lesions might look like a swelling, a patch of red skin or ulcers. They are most commonly found below the knee or elbow; occasionally on the stomach or face. Within a few days, the dog will develop signs of kidney failure, reduced appetite, thirst, fatigue and vomiting.

The survival rate is low, between 20-30% so it is very important to alert your vet early if you see any worrying signs. It is also worth remembering to wash dogs' legs and belly after each walk to remove all mud and dirt.

The festival, which celebrated the coming of spring, included fertility rites and the pairing off of women with men by lottery. At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius I replaced Lupercalia with St. Valentine's Day.

#### Thoughts from the Rectory

Dressed to Impress

One of the labels which will be taking part in London, will be one of the new ethical fashion brands, People Tree. The Fair-Trade label is conscious of the emerging trends and what they say about our times.

Fashion gurus say that 'this coming year the colours are quite subdued there are a lot of greys, blacks and cobalt blues so in a way it does reflect the mood of the nation. Because of Brexit uncertainty and the general slow down on the high street. This has left people with less money in their pockets, so people are looking for cheaper buys or purchases that they can keep'. The Fair-Trade label is making a statement by the way it makes clothes. For they use traditional hand skills and encourage people to think before they buy and the label wants people to buy clothes that will last more than one season.

Clothes over the ages have always made a statement. The Intoxica clothes brand says its designs are 'for the freethinking individuals'. The Prophetik clothes brand describes its clothes as 'wearable philosophy'.
