Brendan Cox said,

16th June marked the first anniversary of the moment that changed my family's lives for ever, when my wife Jo was taken from us. We were determined to mark it with hope. That's why this weekend, hundreds of events will take place across Britain as part of the Great Get Together - a moment to remember Jo and bring communities closer together. This has rarely felt more important. We're in an intense period of insecurity. People feel that society is changing too quickly and we don't live in as close communities as we used to. Then you have extremists who want to spread division. At its worst this leads to events like the atrocities in Manchester and Borough Market in London. Violent extremism can do untold lasting damage to the families of those caught up in it and our thoughts should always be with them. I don't think extremist groups have grown in size, I think they've become noisier and sometimes more dangerous. We have to make sure the silent majority finds its voice. That we all talk more about the basic things that show Britain for the great place it is. A sense of fair play, tolerance, and being outward-looking as a country. If you give people the opportunity for a sense of togetherness, people take it. For me, that's what The Great Get Together is all about.



Just thought I'd point out to some of our readers who might have missed it, that Upwell Jazz club which was resident for many years at Three Holes has been re-located by promoter Nigel Smith to the heart of the village at Christchurch Community Centre. Since the turn of the year the residents and others have had the opportunity to see some internationally acclaimed musicians strutting their stuff just a short walk from the house. At just a fiver entrance on a warm sunny Sunday Lunch

time, with snacks and a bar available it's a very good deal. Hope some more residents will pop along and give it a whirl.

Last month saw long-time resident Piano player Nigel Portass exchange his role as backing musician to featured artist, along with Phil Brookes Guitar and Mike McCann on Drums.

The sound was clear and the volume well-judged, as regular soundman Chris was unavailable for this gig and the musicians were left to their own devices. Phil Brookes on guitar producing a warm jazz tone from his Yamaha arch -top and classic Fender Valve combo while Nigel Portass keyboard and Bass pedals both supported



and led the group at the same time.

The sets consisted of familiar tunes from the American song-book such as "We will be together again", "Moonlight in Vermont" and many other classics. All played with precision and panache.

I do however have one problem with the performance, a short-coming I have witnessed in many venues, with various artists and that is the lack of communication with the audience.

A jazz buff may well be able to name that tune

after a few bars, but someone experiencing jazz for the first time, may feel excluded and be lost to the music for good.

We the jazz community need new blood to follow and keep the music alive and should always keep our audience in mind, both new and old. Announcing each tune, maybe giving a little history about past performers and

composers, might just not only establish a rapport with the customers but may lead to a better understanding of what jazz 'is really about' Jazz musicians will always try to lift their chosen instrument to the max, but please guys, a little stage craft along the way as well.

extended the original house. Up until that is, the last private owner, a Mrs Hanbury who died in 1966, which is when it was purchased by Chelmsford Borough Council.

Christchurch Residents Association

We met on Wednesday 28th June, 7.30 at The Old School. The previous months minutes were accepted and there were no matters arising. Outstanding subs were collected and members attention was drawn to the proposed coffee morning at the Church on Saturday 15th July from 10.00am till 12.00 noon.

Another Speedwatch survey would be carried out in the very near future and it was hoped that the traffic calming measures proposed at the last Parish Council meeting would add to the success of slowing traffic. All members supported the traffic calming measures proposed at PC.

It was noted that the eyesore at Beckett's Bridge was under investigation by FDC's David Bailey as regards compliance re planning and licensing re water extraction. The persons previously working on the site had been conspicuous by their absence for the last month.

The possibility of trialing a FACT bus had also been raised at the Parish Council. It was suggested that they might run a 15 seater minibus to Downham Market on a Friday leaving at 10.00am, returning at about 1.00pm. The proposed fare would be £5 return and those holding bus passes would not be charged. The Heron was asked to point these details out to Christchurch villagers. If there was no positive feedback showing interest from potential passengers by their next meeting then the Parish Council would conclude there was no demand.

Another thing mentioned at the last PC meeting was the potential beautification of the bus shelter. However, CRA members unanimously felt that this would be a complete waste of time and money. They, and most other villagers they had spoken too emphasized AGAIN that this EYESORE should be removed resulting in the BEAUTIFICATION OF THE VILLAGE as a whole!

Members were informed that there had been a series of petrol and diesel thefts from vehicles along the 16 foot bank. This was surprising due to its openness and easy visibility. Vehicle owners were advised to remain vigilant.

The latest details of legislation relating to dog fouling and fly tipping offences was to be published in this month's Heron. This had increased in importance recently due to some villagers dumping their green waste on the Recreation Ground. All such offences would be followed up. It was unanimously agreed that the proposed Food Fayre be held in late October or November as a pre-Christmas event. Stallholders already involved so far also agreed that this would be a better proposition.

It was agreed that the CRA have a summer break until September unless anything really urgent came up. The meeting closed at 9.00pm. Next meeting Wed 27th Sept at the usual time and place.

PSPOs arrive in Fenland

Fenland dog owners are being warned they could face on the spot fines if they break new rules introduced by the district council this week. Fenland Council has introduced a new dog control Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) to encourage responsible ownership and tackle issues such as dog fouling and out-of-control dogs.

The new antisocial behaviour power coincides with the launch of the authority's new Tidy Fenland campaign which will also crackdown on dog fouling, as well as littering and fly-tipping. The order, which replaced the existing Dog Control Order introduced in 2012, means that it will be an offence to fail to pick up dog mess or to allow a dog in any fenced children's play area. "Other requirements apply, including keeping dogs on a lead and under control in certain areas. New signs have been put up across Fenland advising dog walkers about the requirements which have been introduced following consultation. Anyone seen breaking the new rules will be issued with a £75 Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN), reduced to £65 if paid within 21 days. Failing to pay the FPN will result in court action and a possible fine of up to £1,000. The order will not apply to anyone who is registered blind, is disabled or who uses a

trained assistance dog.

Cllr Peter Murphy, Fenland District Council's portfolio holder for environment, said: "Most dog owners are very responsible - they look after their pets properly and don't let them spoil everyone else's enjoyment of our open spaces. But a small minority don't and it is something that upsets a lot of people. Our new PSPO will enable us to crack down on problems such as dog fouling and out-of-control dogs, making our communities safer, cleaner and more welcoming for everyone."

The order is also being supported by a number of town and parish councils. Last week the council announced the Tidy Fenland campaign pointing out it costs £1,000 a day to clear up after thoughtless dog owners, litter louts and fly tippers.

When the Sparrows came to Christchurch - by John Sparrow

John Sparrow, begins a two part series going into where his family came from and what made them the family they are now - Ed'

My Grandfather George Sparrow came to Christchurch in 1897. He had been employed on Luddingtons farm at Littleport as a traction engine driver.

George married Eliza Watson from Downham Market on April 26th 1890, at St. Georges Church Littleport.

Their first home in Christchurch was part of the house named the Union in Church Road, opposite the Church next to Tree Tops. After a short time, a move to Green Lane down by the Dun Cow was their next home. The house, now painted white, is in West Norfolk where the back drove starts. This was where the family was brought up, my uncles and aunts, seven boys and three girls.

When Grandfather George came to Christchurch he started work for Robert Lavender in Padgetts Road, driving steam engines.

In 1902 George went into partnership with John Compline as threshing contractors. They would travel from farm to farm threshing wheat, barley, oats and peas. The traction engine they owned was an Aveling-Porter No.3303, a Marshall Drum and straw elevator.

It would take 10 men to make up the gang to make everything work. Horse and waggon to take the corn away in coomb sacks (18stone) to the farmer's barn or railway station. Another horse and cart to bring coal and water for the engine.

During the spring and summer the machines would be repaired and painted by John Compline and Grandfather who also had a Blacksmiths shop in Green Lane.

The partnership continued until 1932 when Grandfather George retired. My Uncle William (Bill) took over the job from his father George and John Compline. At the time he was working for Walter Whittome of Town End March, driving a Fowler ploughing steam engine, one of a pair weighing 18 tons. The Aveling-Porter grandfather's old engine weighed just 10 tons.

Steam finally gave way to a 1946 new diesel Field Marshall, its first job was to tow the old Aveling-Porter to Durkins scrap yard at March, sold for £10. Today's value in working order would be approaching £100,000.

A second Field Marshall was purchased with drum and elevator, driven by my father Harry. This tractor was sold in 1965 for £150 to Mr Webb from Feltwell, today's value £8000.

A Claas trailing combine pulled by a tractor replaced the drums in 1956.

Another German made combine was purchased new in 1958, Claas SF with a Perkins L4 engine reg. HJE85.

Uncle William (Bill) retired in 1966 and I, John, continued with 3 more Claas combines until I retired.

My First Car by Colin Butcher

I got my first car when I was just 18.

Prior to that I had been into motorbikes. My first car was a 1955 Standard 8 in dark blue. It had four doors but no boot! To access the boot space you had to drop the back seats down and get to it through the back doors. There was a small flap with T-keys below where the boot should have been for access to the spare wheel. Internal trim was all Bakelite with leatherette seating. I ran my old Standard 8 for two or three years before moving on to a Morris Cowley with a beautiful huge bench seat. I ran that one for six years.

I had a lot of happy motoring in my old Standard 8 but the petrol gauge was not very reliable or accurate. On one occasion I had to call my Dad out to rescue me when the car had come to a halt due to lack of fuel! He was not best pleased and he gave me quite a stern lecture about keeping my petrol topped up, especially with a dodgy gauge! My Dad was an ex-military man and quite strict, having old Victorian values. Since that day I have never ever run out of fuel again! One time when my Dad briefly drove my Standard 8 he had commented on how stiff the steering was. There was no such thing as power steering in those days of course but I was used to it. It turned out that the two trunnion pins were seized up, but you should have seen the muscles on my arms! Eventually Dad and I replaced the trunnion pins and — Wow! What a difference! It was like driving a brand new car! Fond memories. The registration number on my Standard 8 was RYP 28. Dad always said that the RYP stood for "Rob Your Parents!" as he had lent me the money to buy the car in the first place. However, I did eventually pay him back every penny! He made sure of it! I was always very grateful. I learnt a lot of things in that old car.

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

Fenland Association for Community Transport (FACT) have been contacted about the lack of a service bus to and from Christchurch. They are prepared to run a trial bus service subject to the Parish Council covering any losses. 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

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500g dry-cured streaky bacon, finely diced I large onion, finely diced 5 cloves garlic, crushed I small red chilli, seeded and finely diced 500ml white wine vinegar 250g soft brown sugar 3 tbsp maple syrup I shot of strong coffee

- In a medium sized saucepan gently fry the bacon until crisp. Remove from the pan with a slotted spoon.
- In the same pan add the diced onion, garlic
- and chilli. Cook until soft and translucent.
- Return the bacon to the pan with the remaining ingredients and simmer gently for 2-3 hours until thick and jammy.
- Place in a sealed jar and keep refrigerated for up to 6 weeks.





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

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For the Love of Lambrettas - by Colin Steenson



2017 represents 70 years since the first Lambretta came off the production line at the home of Lambrettas in Milan. To celebrate this fact an Anniversary Rally had been arranged to celebrate this engineering milestone. The original factory still stands in Milan, though it is largely now just a shell. Due to a bit of 'argy-bargy' between two of Lambretta's 'big-wigs' a second rally had also been arranged to be held in Venice two weeks later. This had also come about because the Monza Racetrack in Milan was already booked up for the dates they originally wanted as they had left the organization of the event a bit late!

So it was that The Lambretta Club of Great Britain were going to attend. Though each member had to organise their own trip. Of course Lambretta clubs from all over the world would also be in attendance. What a bonus for us all having two world rallies to attend instead of just the one, and only a fortnight apart too! Milan would be 18th-22nd May, and Venice 1st-4th June. My friend Graham Bird and myself had agreed to travel together with our two bikes on a trailer towed by his Ford C-max. We drove through the Channel Tunnel which cost us around £170 for the two of us, bikes, car, and trailer, eventually arriving in Calais. Immediately after that we took the 'payage' (like a toll motorway) on to Rheims where we had an overnight stop at the Campernile Hotel.

Next morning, back on the 'payage' we travelled on to Mont Blanc, another 400 miles on,



for our second overnight stay at the Ibis Hotel. Next day we went on through the seven mile tunnel through Mont Blanc. Very strict regulations here. Each vehicle must remain 150metres apart due to their fire regulations. That's quite a long gap! Still, it was quicker than going OVER the mountain! The other end of the tunnel finished in Italy and from there it was only a three hour drive to the venue in Milan and another hotel, the name of which escapes me for the moment, even though we stayed there for the duration of the event! It was only about twenty five minutes from the hotel to Monza itself. We travelled there and back each day on our Lambrettas of course.

The actual rally in Milan lasted five days but was less well attended than I had expected with only about 600 bikes, not the 1800 that turned up in Venice, as I was to discover a fortnight later. The first day was signing up for registration, some time checking out each other's bikes, and checking out what other events had been scheduled before returning to our hotel for the evening meal. We were looking forward to the next day as they were closing the Monza track for an hour so we could all have a ride round. Quite a spectacular day with 600 Lambrettas all riding around together. I managed four laps. Over the next few days bikes were inspected by one and all, with lots of comparisons re performance and tech specs as you might expect. Finally there was a 'concourse d'elegance'. Though we Brits thought we put on quite a good show, all the prizes went to the Italians.

After the rally was over we drove on next morning to Malpenza, Milan's second airport 25 miles to the north. From there we would head home to Luton Airport after leaving our bikes, car and trailer in a secure compound ready for our return in a fortnights time when we would be heading off for the second Lambretta Rally in Venice.
