Hi Richard

Question: The field behind the Community Centre! I normally let my dog have a run over there, there's hardly anybody there during the early hours, or evenings and it's a good place where she can run to her hearts content. If she fouls there, it's cleared up immediately!

Since Christmas no one has challenged us until last night (Tuesday of this month June). My family and the dog were out for a stroll, we got to the field and let her off the lead, but after a while only for a lady to come out of the community and tell us we are not allowed dogs on this field. We entered by the bridleway at the rear and there are no signs to say dogs not allowed.

I sometimes bring the boys to this park, this might change if I can't bring the dog there and let her off her lead.

From reading the Heron I have noticed different views and comments on dog walking. If you cannot let your dog off the lead here in Christchurch Village where can you, to give your dogs a run? You can't expect dog owners to use up petrol every day taking them to a field some distance away where they can run! Where is the villages community spirit? What can we do to allocate some field or the stretch along the river? Maybe a possible thought, there are a few empty areas along Church Road, disused or left to overgrow, could these be turned into dog play areas?

There's are places around the UK where they have allocated places for dogs. One I can bring to mind is Queens Country Park between Stock Village and Billericay and is set over 60 acres in Essex. It has a wooded area, an open field meadow with a large hill in the middle with a few copses. It takes about 30minutes to walk the whole round. It has dog bins at different intervals, you can let you dogs off the leads where all the dogs either chase balls or just run. At weekends this place is busy with families and dogs walking around it.

So, my question is - Why can't we let dogs have a run on the Community Centre field when not in use by the public. Or, is there another option?

I look forward to an answer to this sore point. Regards Derek

Mini Motorbikes and the Law

There have been several reports of mini-motorbikes being ridden around the village and on the Community Centre Field, as well as aound the car park gravel. If you own or ride one of these vehicles, it is your responsibility to know the law. If you have purchased one for your children, you are responsible for ensuring that they obey the law. It is illegal to ride any motorbike in public open spaces such as parks, recreation grounds, play areas and on pavements. You can only ride an off-road motorbike legally if it is on private land and you have the land owner's permission. Land owned by the local council is not classed as private land.

Riders, and in some cases the parents who are held accountable for the actions of their children, can be arrested and prosecuted. Illegal off road bikes seized by the police can be crushed.

If you see anybody riding a motorbike illegally, please call the Police non-emergency number 101.

BIRTH OF THE BLUES PART FIVE

After the upsurge of the blues in the mid-sixties, from 1968 onwards while maintaining a lot of the interest generated previously, the music began to change and become almost



part of the establishment. BB King led the way with relentless touring, playing major venues across the world and releasing new material on a regular basis. The Yardbirds who started life as a blues band slowly morphed into Led Zeppelin and appeared dazed and confused. Music fans flocked to a farm in upstate New York and Woodstock became a reality, as well as a legacy that lasts, even today. The movie featured Alvin Lee playing a one line, one chord Blues, he was "Going Home." Hard on the heels of Woodstock, Hendrix could be seen setting light to his Strat at Monterrey.

There were still lots of blues bands putting out material such as The Groundhogs with guitarist Tony McPhee, while John Mayalls' Blues Breakers, seemingly had a revolving door when it came to guitarists, with Peter Green joining Fleetwood Mac and Mick Taylor leaving for the Stones, while on the other side of the pond, Mike Bloomfield's Les Paul driven blues held sway. Eric Clapton on the other hand couldn't decide if he wanted to play blues, become a country singer or turn into Delaney and Bonnies right hand man. Cocaine featured in his life in more ways than one, but he always had Blind Faith and later in the decade changed his name to Derek. Many of the previous decades blues lovers added over driven guitar sounds and huge drum kits as the blues had a child who we could call

Jazz Club Review -Jazz Royalty Comes To Christchurch

As a gigging Jazz musician, I am not usually given to Hyperbole, however the red carpet was truly out last Sunday the 24th June, at the Upwell Jazz club, still resident in the Christchurch Community Centre. Internationally renowned Bass player Len Skeat led a band that featured Dave Newton on Piano, yet another internationally acclaimed musician who has recorded and toured with the best of them including the Guy Barker Big Band and guitarist Martin Taylor. Sebastian DeKrom held down the drum seat, his regular gig is playing drums for Jamie Cullum while Bruce Adams, no slouch in the performing arena entertained on Trumpet/Flugel Horn and Cornet. The latter instrument had previously belonged to the late Roy Castle. To top it all off was Tina May a jazz vocalist of the highest calibre. As a young woman Tina studied at the Sorbonne which she jokingly referred to as the "Sore Bum!" While in Paris she began her singing career appearing with many of the top names in jazz. Once back in England she continued her singing career appearing with Humphrey Lyttelton as well as the Stan Tracy Big Band and the BBC Big band. Tina has also played some of the best club and halls in the UK including Ronnie Scott's and the 606 club. She was also involved in the theatre and worked with political satirist Rory Bremmer in a show called "You are Eifel, but I like you." On paper a great band, on stage equally as good. One of Tina's many CD's and albums was dedicated to the songs of "the little sparrow" Edith Piaffe and the enthusiastic audience was treated to several songs from that repertoire sung in faultless French as well as English. It was immediately

Blues Rock, later turning once again into Heavy Rock, giving rise to many and varied bands and artists. Bowie borrowed an old blues riff and sang Jean Genie over it, while the Stones found Sympathy with the Devil, ACDC turned an old school uniform into a stage act and Chuck Berry found his Ding-a-Ling. But Blues also became more sophisticated with Donald Fagin and Walter Brecker borrowing from the source to provide Steely Dan with their Rock Music with Chords approach. Jimmy Page and Robert Plants' Led Zeppelin got busy with studio techniques and Stairway to Heaven was born. Carlos Santana took his pentatonic blues format and added percussion and Cuban rhythms', and still BB King toured. John Lee Hooker found new audiences for his one chord blues, while Van Morrison having left the blues behind previously, came

over all Astral Weeks and Canned Heat went on the road again.

On top of all that everyone wore flares, and called each other "Man" as Kensington Market became the centre of the world, if only temporarily. When you think about the two decades from 1960 onwards it could take your breath away. I hope you enjoy this column, I'm off for a lay-down.



noticeable how at ease she and the other musicians were together with the good humour spilling over into the solos. Dave Newton at times playing quotes from several Scottish Reels, much to the amusement of Glaswegian Bruce Adams. Tina scatted and bent the vocals around and around and led the band through her selection of songs. The Musicians replied with solid backing and tight solos in a near faultless performance that proved their class.

As some one who has frequented many of the gigs at the centre, this is the first time I have seen this knowledgeable crowd give a standing ovation, and a well deserved one too! Well done to club promoter Nigel Smith for booking such an entertaining gig.



This month why not visit Linton Zoo. Linton Zoo has evolved out of their family's love, interest and concern for the wildlife of the world. They have got a fantastic schedule of events for weekends and main school holidays designed to get you much closer to some of their animals, whilst giving you more information about their conservation projects.

The zoo and all of its inhabitants came to Linton in 1972 and has grown into an impressive, exotic zoo that covers 18 acres and is as committed now to conservation as it was back then. The 16 acres of gardens have been beautifully planted with shrubs, trees and over 10,000 bulbs to ensure that the environment is as nice for the guests as it is for the animals.

They now have a large collection of wildlife ranging from Mexican red-kneed tarantulas and snakes through giant tortoises, hornbills, toucans, parrots, owls and pheasants to beautiful snow leopards, magnificent Amur

tigers, Hartmann Mountain zebra and Brazilian tapir. Each year new species are brought in, many of them being part of an international captive breeding programme, so the collection's constantly on the increase.

This is an outdoor attraction with country park-like trails.

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Vet's View

The current wave of hot weather is a great treat for everybody. Nevertheless we need to remember that our pet friends might not necessarily enjoy the it as much as we do.

Dogs and cats have thick coats, which is great in keeping them warm but becomes a problem in hot weather. Our pets can only lose heat by panting and through very few sweat glands on their paws. They can easily overheat and suffer heat exhaustion or even a heat stroke.

There are very simple rules to keep your pets safe in hot weather:


- Don't expose your pets to hot and humid conditions. Avoid the midday heat on very hot days.

- Avoid exercising them in severely hot weather. It is worrying how many people take their dogs on a walk and let them carry a stick or a toy. As stated before, dogs can only loose heat by panting so anything in their mouth will compromise heat exchange.

- Make sure they have access to shade and take a supply of water with you.

- Never ever leave your animals in the car in summer, even with windows partially open.

Signs of heat stroke include: weakness/collapse, high body temperature (over 40 degrees Centigrade), dark red to purple gums, rapid panting and heart rate, sometimes vomiting and diarrhoea.



If your animal collapsed because of heat you should contact your veterinary practice as soon as possible. At the same time try keeping the animal calm and provide them with lukewarm to cool (but never cold) shower or bath. Make sure to dampen their coat thoroughly and if they are weak keep supporting their heads, making sure they don't drown. Allow access to cool drinking water. If possible check the rectal temperature with thermometer and stop cooling efforts as soon as it comes down to 39.5 degrees Celsius.

All pets who suffered a heat stroke should be taken to the veterinary surgeon for examination and treatment. Heat stroke might not look very serious but can result in severe, fatal sequelae such as kidney failure, damage to liver and heart, coagulation abnormalities resulting in multi organ failure. Therefore vigilant monitoring and treatment are recommended.

Dear Nick,

I am writing in response to your column in last months Heron. I am, and have been for over 60 years a responsible dog owner and show judge. However, having lost my husband recently I am left with looking after our four doas on my own, including an elderly Borzoi and Whippet. At your suggestion in your June column I have been trying to find a local vet in the area that runs a 24hr emergency service but to no avail. They all seem to have dropped this facility including at the practice we are registered with since the old boss retired. I did manage to find one veterinary practice that does home euthanasia but they are based in Peterborough and will not come out this far. I am not confident driving at night or indeed anytime to places I do not already know. I think a taxi would be out of the question as they would not want to carry a sick dog. So I have become increasingly anxious over what would be a big problem if my dog was taken ill at night. Any information you might be able to give me on this matter would be greatly appreciated.

Dear Shirley,

Thank you very much for your letter. I appreciate the fact that many owners might find it challenging to transport their pets to the veterinary practice, especially at night and in emergency.

There is really no good solution to the problem. Veterinary surgeons, especially at nights and weekends, would struggle to provide a house visit as they work with skeleton crew and are responsible for a number of patients, either in the hospital or on the way to be seen. Current RCVS Guide to Professional Conduct for Veterinary Surgeons states that "Owners are responsible for transporting their animals to a veterinary practice, including in emergency situations".

I would encourage all owners to make plans on how to handle the situation if emergency happens. The options include:

- checking with family, friend and neighbours if they could lend us a hand

checking with local pet ambulance service (nearest to Christchurch operates form Watlington/Kings Lynn area)
checking which local taxi companies are happy to transport sick animals (if you call your veterinary practice they should have such a list at hand)

I hope I have helped even a little. I know that we can be afraid what to do in case of an emergency but careful planning can help us prepare.



When powering up your BBQ's and putting out the garden furniture for the summer season, be sure to take note of our top tips below to ensure you have a fun and safe summer in the garden.

- If cooking outdoors, always check BBQs over after winter storage. Keep them on level ground and ensure they are sited away from sheds, fences, overhanging foliage and property
- Keep children and garden games well away from the cooking area and never leave the barbecue unattended
- If you have a bonfire, build it well away from buildings, tents or other flammable objects and make sure it is properly out when you leave
- When out in the countryside, extinguish cigarettes properly and dispose of them responsibly never throw a lit cigarette into a field or wooded area
- Don't forget to stay safe around our county's waterways and if you see someone in trouble in water, call 999 immediately with clear details of your location

Editor's Interview with Jayne Freear

I guess we always like to welcome new folks into the village as did I when Steve and Jayne moved into Jim and Alison Small's old place in Church Road. You may remember Steve wrote some rugby articles for us at the beginning of last year. Imagine my surprise recently when I discovered, quite by chance that Jayne is the most fantastic



artist with her own studio in the garden! She actually sells some of her work from a coffee shop in East Rudham, Norfolk. Jayne was born in Wisbech in 1961 and always loved art from a very early age. When she was twelve years old she was caught sketching caricatures of famous people in her sketch book at the back of a geography class when suddenly everything went quiet!

She glanced down beside her to see a pair of shiney brown brogues belonging to her teacher, Mr. Turf. He held his hand out indicating to Jane to give up her sketch book. Jayne went bright red and handed it over. As he flicked through it Mr. Turf said, "Has anyone else seen this?" "No!" Jayne replied hesitantly. "Well I think they should!" barked Mr Turf. Jayne immediately thought this meant she and it would be going to the headmistress but, to her surprise, he began to pass it around the class.

Jayne was so embarassed and wanted the ground to 'swallow her up'! Then she began to realise that she was getting lots of really positive comments from her classmates. So, over time this very much helped with Jane's confidence in her work and was a real 'turning point' for her.

Following this revelation Jane would spend most lunchtimes in the Art Department with her art teacher Mr. Houseden, who encouraged her even more! In the mid - to late seventies Jayne took her 'O' Level Art and, naturally, passed with flying colours. She continued sketching over the next few years, took a midwife course at Isle College, Wisbech. She soon realised that she wanted to swop classes and do Art but unfortunately there were no spare places at the time.

Jayne took a job in a local supermarket for a couple of years before getting married quite young and having a family after



which time her art ground to a halt. Later, having worked as a Teaching Assistant for about two years at Little Downham Feoffes Primary she applied for a job as a Teaching Assistant at Ely College. Having worked at Ely for a few years she applied to help out at the Art Summer School there. She got the job and her artistic spark was reignited. Later that year she took her Art 'A' level getting an 'A'.

That was about fifteen years ago since when Jane has REALLY developed her artistic skills, branching out into clay modelling work, pottery and ceramics. Her work has continued to develop at a pace over the years before she moved into Christchurch with Steve at 'Ashleigh Cottage' in May 2014. Imagine! All this time and I never knew! At last she has her own studio and it is full of some trully wonderful stuff. I feel privileged to have seen some of it. I hope that you can appreciate the level of her skills
