Secondly, concerning the so called 'caravan park', the three caravans concerned are only visible by walking down their private drive and peering over a six foot fence. As relative newcomers ourselves, having only lived here for three years, I am shocked at the scare mongering viciousness and small mindedness of some of the villagers involved. So mean spirited! If only people would talk to their neighbours and thereby better understand each other! Regards

Dear Sir,

With reference to your article page 3 May 2018 edition of your anti dog walkers rag.

Your Community Magazine is neither anti dog walkers (quite the opposite in fact!) neither is it a 'rag'! - Ed'.

Farmers are bound by law, regardless who they think they are, not to spray harmful chemicals next to or near public rights of way or to quote the law with the following: "If you have to spray land crossed by a public right of way, use pesticides approved for such use and follow the product instructions. Where a public right of way crosses or runs alongside a field, you can provide an informal alternative route that they can use for this period if you wish, but this does not close the public right of way. If the public are still using the public right of way, despite warning notices, you must stop spraying temporarily."

"it is subject to the product label conditions as some products require you to keep unprotected people and livestock out of the treated area for a specific period. Don't use these if you cannot restrict access to the site until the area is safe.

Where a path or bridleway crosses or runs alongside a field, farmers must make sure the public is not put at risk and should consider using notices next to the right of way to warn people of spraying and advise that they keep to the path.

Such notices cannot stop people using a public right of way and if people are still using it despite the warning notices operators should consider stopping briefly if there is a risk to health such as from the machinery or spray used. Get permission from the local highway authority if you need to put a notice on the public right of way."

While I agree with your continuing quote of not allowing a dog to run across the fields, not that I have ever seen this happen and will suggest that most dog walkers are responsible enough, I respectfully request that you in your next issue make dog walkers and general public right of

way users aware of the facts.

While on this subject may I suggest you remind farmers, through your 'magazine' that restricting public rights of way is not permitted!

"Other don'ts for landowners:

You cannot grow crops on a public right of way, however grass can be grown for hay and silage.

Dairy bulls over 10 months are not allowed to cross over a field with a right of way.

You cannot put up stiles or gates without the permission of your local authority.

You cannot put up misleading signs to prevent people from using a public right of way.

You are not allowed to harrass, intimidate (e.g. placing a fierce dog on public right of way) or prevent members of the public from using a public right of way.

It is an offence under the Highways Act 1980 to put up barbed wires, electric fences or exposed barb wire that prevents or obstructs a public right of way."

I draw your attention to the public right of way at *Beachwood Farm where locked gates have been erected preventing public access. As Editor and possibly an upstanding member of the Christchurch community, would you like to report this or shall I? I also am respectfully aware that farmers have to earn a living, but must do so whilst keeping within the law.

I look forward in seeing this response in next month's 'magazine'. Sean Gray

My comments relate entirely to the facts presented at the meeting of the Parish Council. I was present, the facts are:

A <u>Retrospective</u> Planning Application, F/YR18/0283/F, has been lodged.

This has now been withdrawn—Ed'.

My wife and I attended the Parish Council meeting to have my specific concerns addressed, concerns with FDC Planning Department. I was there seeking a route to escalate these. I made it quite clear at the outset of the Parish Council meeting that my reason for attending the meeting had absolutely nothing to do with the rights or wrongs of the Retrospective Planning Application, that is for FDC to make a judgement on.

A DISCUSSION took place that clarified aspects of the Retrospective Planning Application. The Chair rightly reminded all to speak via the chair (It is easy to forget the protocols if you don't normally attend these meetings, sorry Mr. Chairman). The DISCUSSION was taken outside with Councillor Sutton so that the meeting could continue with the rest of its business. To be fair Councillor Sutton proposed a change to the Retrospective Planning Application that would have, at least, removed our objection to it.

Secondly I refer you to your comments on page 3 editorial:

"I feel that I must make comment....."

Whatever you 'feel' you should do you should not abuse your editorial position by using it to express your personal opinions. You are not an elected referee for the people. You should remain independent and objective.

If you did 'feel' you must keep the village informed you should simply have referred people to the Retrospective Planning Application and let people form their own opinion. At that point they are free to seek clarification from the applicant and register their consent or opposition via FDC Planning Department should they so wish.

If you cannot remain unbiased or report the whole facts perhaps you should consider whether you are right person to maintain the position of Editor of the Heron.

Do not presume to dictate to me how to do my job! A job which you clearly have no understanding of, save a somewhat 'jaded' view! The Heron and myself as Editor remain entirely objective, especially in our dealings with readers letters; the purpose of which is to elicit a response either in support of comments made or expressing an opposite view. As clearly stated in the magazine we reserve the right to 'edit' such contributions where this is considered appropriate. This matter clearly did not only refer to planning applications. I consider no apology necessary as all the 'facts' commented on by me were 'true'! There was no bias in any way, nor were they directed at any specific individual.

I agree wholeheartedly with Mrs. Brazil's sentiments about

Social Media abuse (I am glad to see the 'Trolling' appears to have been removed from Facebook) however I would expand those sentiments to include the misrepresentation of facts by the media.

The Group Meeting Report was given by Margaret Sparrow and the Federation Report by Peggy Warby.


Val Parker was presented with a voucher for her Committee work and help over several years.

During his fascinating one-hour talk Tony bemoaned the fate of the water vole which is fast becoming an endangered species and explained why we don't see so many Buick Swans in the area as we used to, all it seems due to the warming of the environment and the loss of wetlands. The Trust, started by Sir Peter Scott after the Second World War at Slimbridge, now has ten sights across the UK. While Welney remains one of the most important sights belonging to the



Trust with 1300 acres, the largest is in West London near Barnes. I can't begin to imagine what that amount of land in London would be worth on the open market.

With the help of his slides, Tony took the members on a trip through the seasons, explaining the centres successes and failures in the preservation of both the wild life as well as the plants. There are many events such as summer walks through the grounds and of course the swan feeds during the autumn and winter months. 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

Vet's View by Nick Wojciechowski



In my first column I would like to share some vital information from the viewpoint of an emergency clinician. Whether we like it or not most of our animals will get sick at some point of their lives. If we are particularly unlucky they will need emergency veterinary care.

We can never know when the emergency might be needed but we can make sure we are ready when the time comes. Please always keep your vets' contact numbers handy - store them in your mobile phone, and keep the business card in your wallet. Some practices provide fridge magnets with their details as well. Also please make sure that you are aware what are your vets' provisions for 'out-of-hours care'. Although every veterinary practice in the UK has to provide 24 hours care they are allowed to use dedicated emergency services and also out source the out of hours care. This allows them to rest at night, not working 24/7 and assures the owners that their pets would be looked after by well equipped hospital. Please make sure that you know if your vets would provide the out of hours care at their practice or use external services - if so make sure you have their contact numbers as well and know the physical location of the hospital.

When an emergency occurs it is the owners' responsibility to take their animal to the vets. House visits are rarely a necessity and emergency vets are often dealing with multiple patients at the same time, making it impossible to provide routine house visits. Making sure that you have appropriate transport arrangements is very important. Make sure you know who can help you – friends, neighbours, also keep local taxi companies phone numbers handy.

From 2016 it became mandatory to microchip dogs in the UK. I would encourage the microchipping of cats as well. Make sure that your details are always up-to-date at the microchip database. Commonly used cat collars often get lost and sometimes might cause risk of strangulation. There is nothing more satisfying than connecting the owner with their lost pet. Microchipping your animal is the best way to protect them.

The Birth of the Blues Part Four

As the sixties dawned the top names of the day were artists as diverse as Cliff and the Shadows, Elvis, while Dean Martin and the Rat Pack were still selling records by the truckload. The soon to be major Blues artists such as BB King, Muddy Waters, Howling



Wolf, were either scratching a living in the blues clubs of Chicago, Memphis and every other major city in the USA or trucking around the Chitlin Circuit. In the UK however, there was an almost seismic shift on the way as the young, hip art college crowd, were discovering almost forgotten albums by the very people now revered as the older statesmen of the Blues. One morning in 1962 a then young Blues aficionado, Keith Richards spotted another kindred spirit who was carrying a Muddy Waters album under his arm. They struck up a conversation and the partnership of Mick Jagger and "Keef" Richards was born. The Rolling Stones were named after a track on a Muddy Waters record. The Stones began life as an out and out Blues Band only later becoming the hit making machine, though always with a foot in the blues. Down in darkest Surrey the Yardbirds were stirring featuring the guitarist Eric Clapton. A guitarist who learnt his style by copying the records of Freddie King, a literal Blues giant. Eric's uncle brought these and other tracks home from his many trips to New York as a seaman. During the mid-sixties the unthinkable happened as these and other bands lifted the blues into the pop charts and the nations consciousness. Due to the initial burst of popularity of the Beatles, the USA opened its doors and its mind to those bands playing covers of American Blues tunes. In a way they were taking coal to Newcastle.

Meanwhile, Clapton jumped ship with the Yardbirds and joined John Mayall's Blues breakers making one classic recording "The Beano Album." Before heading over to super group Cream, which despite the plaudits was in reality just another high energy Blues Group. Meanwhile the unthinkable was happening with the originators of the music being brought over to Europe to tour, playing to the largest audiences they had ever seen. BB King became probably the most well-known, Muddy Waters, Howling Wolf, Freddie King, Albert King (none of the Kings were related) at the same time these venerable Blues shouters found themselves playing to predominately white audience in the USA, most notably the famous BB King gig at The Fillmore East. In the UK the musicians kept coming. Peter Greens Fleetwood Mac, Chicken Shack with Stan Webb, Ten Years After and so many more.

As we arrived at the tail end of the sixties the Blues seemed to be in fine fettle, if any of our readers remember this era (if so were you there? Really?) I apologised if I have missed out your favourite band. Next Time the Blues today. Steve Waye





Upwell Health Centre

For me, the next few weeks will be a landmark period of my life. As many of you already know I will be retiring from full time general practice at the end of May. I will still be continuing as Chair of West Norfolk CCG for now and will be coming to the surgery for one session a month to help out with minor surgery and joint injections. I will also be retaining my interest in the pharmacy so I won't be a stranger! However, it will be very strange not being involved in the day to day medical care of so many of you. After more than 30 years there can't be many of you I haven't seen at least once. I have been doing baby development checks for my whole time here and for the last few years have been checking the babies of babies I checked in the past, that makes me feel old! It has been a privilege to have been entrusted with your healthcare all that time and I thank you all for the trust you have shown me over the years. Some of you will have been pleased with what I have achieved for you others may have been less impressed, all I can say is that I have always done my best for the patients, the practice and the NHS within the limitations imposed upon me.

I still clearly remember moving into my house in January 1988 and initially being treated with reticence by the locals, "another outsider coming to live here". I am still a foreigner, but I hope you have now all accepted me as a useful member of the community; I have certainly always tried to be part of the community having spent time on the Parish Council, Upwell Hall Committee and running a local sports team for the West Norfolk Inter-village Games for a few years as well as being your doctor.


We hope to have the new building work completed by next April. The first phase of the work is to build an extension where the bike shed and portacabin sits. This will be linked to the current building and will house a new pharmacy, a new teaching area, a notes store and several offices. Once this extension is complete the pharmacy and some staff will move into it and work will commence on phase two of the build which will create an improved reception and waiting area as well as providing three new consulting rooms. The new pharmacy should allow us to improve the quality and timeliness of the service we offer, it will include a state of the art dispensing robot which will reduce the danger of dispensing errors which inevitably happen when humans deal with as many prescriptions as they do in pharmacy. The extra consulting rooms will provide extra space for the staff who are going to replace me and give the surgery the opportunity to increase the number of services available in the community.

When I applied for this partnership in 1987 there were 112 applicants for the post. I counted myself very lucky to have been selected. Since then it has been increasingly difficult to recruit new doctors. We are a training practice and Dr's Blundell, Haine, Bhardwai and Kavin



were all trainees here who we convinced to stay. Unfortunately there was no recently qualified trainee available this time and so the partners tried hard to find a doctor to replace me. Unfortunately they have been unable to recruit a doctor, there just aren't enough around. However, what they have done is, I think, better for the practice than just replacing me with another doctor. They are getting three members of staff in. There will be a practice pharmacist, an advanced emergency care practitioner (a highly skilled paramedic in layman's terms) and an additional nurse practitioner. This will mean in the future there will be an 'on-call' team each day to deal with the acute work and this should hopefully increase the availability of advanced booked appointments which have been in short supply of late. The new computer system is now up and running. We are still learning how to get the best out of it and I'm sure it will become even more useful in the coming months. Most of the glitches we had have now been ironed out and we just need to get slicker using it. Thank you all for the forbearance you showed during the changeover.

Finally, I want to return to the subject which is filling my thoughts at the moment, my retirement. There is only one person still working here who was here when I started, Mary in dispensary. There are so many staff who supported me who have left, some have sadly died. I particularly remember Dr Rushmer who retired in 1990 and sadly passed away shortly thereafter. Pat Waters and Patrick Floyd who were the stalwarts of dispensary when I arrived, and Audrey Johnson our senior practice nurse, all of whom have sadly left us. I really want to take this opportunity to thank all the staff who have helped me over the years and put up with my occasional lapses in temper and my slightly obsessional personality. I have thoroughly enjoyed working in Upwell and it has been a privilege to be allowed to be your doctor.



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

The love of Christ in all its richness and fullness, must be our prime witness in a world of increasing complexity. When love is missing from intentions and actions it is important to stop and think again, not just where we are here in the Fen's, but wherever in the world you are reading this.




