COUNCILSON COUNCILSON CAINING SCHENE Approaching the village the straight road invites speeding

In this issue!

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Christchurch Parish Council have been looking into various ways of reducing the number of vehicles passing through the village, as well as ways of decreasing speeds.

Generally, these sorts of schemes are quite expensive, but there is the possibility of getting majority funding through the Local Highways Initiative. This is a scheme run by the District Council which can provide up to 90% of the cost of the projects, up to a maximum of £10k.

Where LHI bids are unsuccessful, the Parish Council can wholly fund road improvements, although funds are not currently available for large scale works. The problem in the village is quite clear; there are large numbers of lorries passing through the village, and also a large number of vehicles exceeding the speed limit, especially on Church Road and coming into the village on Upwell Road. The recent Speedwatch found that 30% of cars on Church Road were driving at over 30mph.

There is also a problem with vehicles driving very quickly along Padgetts Road, past the junction with Church Road. Although this area is currently a 60mph section, cars often exceed this, and 60mph is actually regarded as too high a limit by residents along this piece of road.

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Residents who live within these problem areas often complain of speeding vehicles, but also about the shaking that the large agricultural lorries inflict on their properties.

Proposals

The Parish Council proposes to submit a number of LHI bids over the next few years, since dealing with all these problems in one go would be too expensive. These works are described below in the currently planned order of implementation. Whilst the PC has tried to be as comprehensive as possible, the final decision on the design of works will be down to Highways, so these proposals should be regarded as only preliminary.

Church Road

One, two or three build outs spread over the length of Church Road, to narrow the road to a single



carriageway. This should prevent vehicles from accelerating along the entire length of Church Road as they will need to stop for any oncoming traffic.

Alternating the build outs will ensure this works in both directions. Build outs would be approximately 33% of the road width, to allow

large agricultural vehicles to pass.

Circ wy to occoming vehicles

Upwell Road.

A build out to single carriageway on the entrance to the village, approximately in the area of the village hall. This should be on the left carriageway on entering the village, so incoming cars will be forced to slow down as they enter. Move the 30mph limit sign to the other side of Half Penny Toll road to reduce traffic speeds approaching the junction. In



addition, "Garden Gates" would be added at the village sign, which would be moved further north, perhaps even past the junction with Half Penny Toll road (B1094).

School Area.

The proposal here is to make the entire area around the school, Crown Road, Crown Avenue and Wayside estate a 20mph limit, with 20mph road signs and 20 painted on the road.

Padgetts Road.

It has been suggested by a resident that a 30mph limit for the entire section of the road between the village signs be installed, along with 'garden gate' style features around the village signs to give a further visual signal to vehicles of the built up nature of this area. If it can be shown to be effective, the speed limit could also be painted on the road as an additional indicators for drivers.



Approximate costs for the various proposals have not yet been finally determined. However, it should be noted that due the rather arcane requirement that all speed limit changes be publicised country wide, the costs can be rather more than might be expected!

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

David Henry's Trinity
Orchard is located on
the main road
between Ely and
Soham. By all
accounts when he
took over the massive
ten acres of apple
trees, it was so
overgrown that the
actual trees were
virtually invisible. He
recounted at length
the struggle he had to

bring these ancient trees back to useful production but now has many and varied varieties at his disposal, many of which he brought along with him. As well as the apples, he also lugged in an apple press, with which he proceeded to extract fresh unpasteurised juice for the members to taste. A pungent liquid that bore no resemblance to the watered-down apple juice available in your local supermarket. It did however come with a warning

not to over imbibe as the results for ones stomach could be alarming, if you catch my drift.

David told us that he cannot abide waste and so has set about using every part of the trees that he tends. Wood that has been pruned is used to make bespoke pieces of furniture as well as stocking a large selection of wood to supply other furniture makers. 

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Christchurch Residents Association

An Emergency Meeting of Christchurch Residents Association was held on Monday 25th September at The Old School at 7.30pm. There were 16 members in attendance including Parish Council Chairman Peter Owen, and Councillor James Reed-Hughes who came along to appraise us all of the forthcoming PC Highways Bid. There was one apology for absence from Derek Randall-Hall who had been called away on business. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and there were no matters arising. Some outstanding subs were collected before the meeting proper began.

Members were appraised of the current health of Peter Knight, Shirley's husband, who after nearly twelve weeks in Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Kings Lynn, had finally been diagnosed to be suffering with TB following a scan and biopsy at Papworth. He has an underlying problem with MDS which means his immune system is at an all time low. He is very weak but the TB is curable. So it's onwards and upwards now. Marion Hawthorn had suffered a stroke a week or so back but is now well on the mend and was at the McMillan coffee morning in the church last Friday.

Speedwatch was continuing successfully and the second batch of letters had gone out to recent offenders. It was hoped that our efforts would go some way to adding weight to the Parish Council's Highway's Bid, which is to be featured as the lead article in October's Heron. James Reed-Hughes kindly took the floor to explain the proposed details. There followed a long and lively discussion of the details and various alternative suggestions were also considered. In the end there was broad agreement with the idea of 'build-outs' with one exception. A oneway system down Crown Road and Wayside was considered to be impractical at best, and ultimately unworkable in any event. However, confining parking in Crown Road to the School side of the road combined with a new 20mph limit was considered the best way of dealing with traffic problems there. This combined with a 'priority' to be signed at the junction of Wayside

with Crown Road would further aid solving traffic problems there. All CRA members present again raised the issue of the chicane in Upwell Road having its priority the wrong way around. It was hoped that this situation could be corrected in any future bid though it was accepted that a 'build-out' between the Halfpenny Toll junction and the Community Centre might go some way in alleviating the problem.

It was noted that the Bus Shelter beautification was underway with trellis having been fitted and initial planting of climbers being in place.

However, all members present remained adamant that it would have benefited the village much more if it had been removed.

The defibrillator had now been resited on the new school building facing the new car park, as before.

Arrangements for the proposed Food Fayre were currently hanging in the balance as Richard Hughes had to back out due to losing his head chef. Richard still hoped to resolve the situation by next month.

Another important discussion topic was the forthcoming Appeal re development access for six proposed homes to the rear of Syringa House. All members present remained adamant that the most logical access to the site would be via the spur off Fenview. The issue of that apparently crossing Crown Land was simply one of the developer not wanting to pay any additional fee for that privilege. Any interested parties were encouraged to write in to the Planning Inspector, attend the meeting, and/or speak at the meeting. (Full details of this forthcoming meeting are shown on page 24 – Ed'.)

There was no other business and the meeting closed at 8.55pm though there was much further discussion on the two main topics.

The date of the next meeting is Wednesday 25th October, 7.30pm at The Old School.

A study showed 66% of us who nap for under 30 minutes feel happy, compared with 56% who doze for longer and 60% for those who never nap.

The short-nappers scored 3.67 in the "nappiness" index, while it was 3.52 for no-nappers and 3.44 for long-nappers.

Prof Richard Wiseman, of the University of Hertfordshire, said: "Previous research shows naps

of under 30 minutes make you more focused, productive and creative, and these new findings suggest you can also become happier by taking a short nap.

IVF services to be suspended in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

At a meeting of its Governing Body on 5th September, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) decided to suspend, until April 2019, routinely commissioning specialist fertility services.

The decision was taken following a 20 week public consultation over the summer. The CCG's Governing Body reviewed the comments and responses received during the consultation in an end of consultation report. A total of 1,311 responses were received during the consultation; this number includes emails, letters, and telephone calls as well as completed questionnaires. The CCG also received a petition with 2,278 signatures.

Dr Gary Howsam, Chair and Chief Clinical Officer, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough CCG, said:

"Specialist IVF services are part of a range of investigations and treatments that can help couples to conceive. I would encourage anyone with fertility problems to go to their GP who can discuss with them the treatment options available. Couples can still be referred on to hospital for further tests to investigate the cause of their infertility. Many causes of infertility

can be successfully treated without the need to go on to IVF.

"The response to the consultation showed that people feel strongly about this issue, and for that reason this was a very difficult decision for the Governing Body to make and we understand that people will be disappointed.



Good News for People with Depression

LIGHT TREATMENT MAY WORK ON NON-SEASONAL **DEPRESSION TOO (NOT JUST ON SAD)**

With current interest in the area of mental health we found this article from a recent publication which may be of interest to anyone with a family member who suffers from depression.

Bright light therapy has been used effectively for seasonal affective disorder, the kind of depression

that comes on at a specific time of the year - often the dark days of late autumn and winter - then lifts. But a new study has found that it may now work to treat non-seasonal depression as well.

Researchers randomly assigned 122 patients with major depression,

aged 19 to 60, to receive one of four treatments: 30 minutes of daily exposure to fluorescent light, 20mg of Prozac daily, both light and Prozac, and a dummy pill and exposure to an electric air purifier. The study, in JAMA Psychiatry, lasted eight weeks.

Using scales that quantify depression severity, the researchers found improvements in all four groups. The difference between Prozac alone and the placebo wasn't statistically significant, but light

> therapy alone was significantly better than the placebo, and light therapy with medication was the most effective treatment of all.

NB Obviously anyone under treatment must consult their doctor before making changes to their treatment - Ed'.



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
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Earl Grey - Tea Loaf

Pre-heat oven to Gas Mark 5/190°c

225g mixed dried fruit ½ cup of cold strong Earl Grey tea 225g self-raising flour 100g caster sugar 1 Egg

- 4 tbsp milk
- Soak the dried fruit overnight in the tea.
- Grease and line a 450g loaf tin.
- Sift the flour.
- Add the sugar.
- Add the milk and the egg, and beat well.
- Add the fruit and the tea.
- Turn into the buttered floured loaf tin.
- Bake for approximately 45 minutes until cooked through.
- Turn out onto a wire rack.
- Allow to cool, wrap in foil and leave to stand overnight.

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Village Robbery!

On the evening of Thursday 21st September at around 11.30pm there was a robbery from the development site where the Memorial Hall used to be and including the new build on Green Lane. retreat. The van was pursued again in an attempt to get the vehicles registration, but it appeared to have no plates. It is suspected that it was the same white van that was involved in the recent fallabella miniature horse theft.

New fencing along with a Neighbourhood Watch sign now guard the site but Christchurch residents are warned to be vigilant as such activities, from past

experience, are not usually 'oneoffs'. Take care to cover any
vulnerable items that may be
outside, lock sheds and homes
securely, and make sure security
lights and intruder alarms are in
working order. Between now
and Christmas is the typical
period for such robberies and
burglaries to take place. Be
vigilant!


