



### Shop closure threat denied

During "Public time" at the November Parish Council meeting, the Chair, Cllr Nigel Russell was asked if the rumour circulating the village, that Little Local, the Village Shop, was closing, was in fact true.

Cllr Russell stated that it was true that the shop had been struggling and expressed some disappointment that it had not been better supported by the local community, but that there were no plans to close it at all.

He went on to explain that the most trade was in newspapers and cigarettes, neither of which could sustain a viable business since the margins were so small. "That's why sometimes there are empty shelves, we can't always pay the monthly VAT demand and stock the shop at the same time" said Cllr Russell.

A villager from the floor made the point that the maxim "Use it or Lose it" should be applied to both the shop and the Pub who are both working in very difficult economic circumstances.

On another point the Friday Fish and Chip van will also need support especially through the cold winter months when we'd rather stay in!. PVH

### The Steve Waye Christmas Column



In a quiet moment I found myself wondering who it was first came up with the concept of the Christmas song. I knew that the composer of many Christmas hits such as "Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer" written in 1949 and based on a poem written by his brother in law, (which was based on a story published in 1939 as a department store promotion) was Johnny Marks, but didn't realise he was Jewish. When you consider however that Christmas began as a pagan festival and that carols were sung at the winter Solstice while people danced around a circle of stones (the word carol means to dance in a circle) this doesn't seem so odd. When the early Christians transformed the pagan festival into Christmas, the songs were changed to reflect the new direction. The first carol may have been a song called "Angels Hymn" sung at a Christmas service in Rome in AD129.

Our near neighbour from Ely, Oliver Cromwell,



banned the singing of carols when he came to power in 1647, but as usual the population went their own way and continued to sing them in secret. However the carol became largely unsung until Victorian times when Christmas as we know it began to be a part of the social calendar.

That popular ditty "Jingle Bells" was never intended to be a Christmas song and was originally composed under the title "One Horse Open Sleigh" for a Sunday School Thanksgiving program by James Pierpoint sometime between 1853 and 1857 and perhaps most memorably performed by astronauts Tom Stafford and Wally Schirra in 1965 aboard the Gemini 6 spacecraft!



The most successful Christmas song to date is, not surprisingly, "White Christmas", first featured in the movie *Holiday Inn* circa 1942 and sung by Bing Crosby, which has so far clocked up in excess of a 100 million sales. The film *Meet me in St Louis* gave Judy Garland a hit in 1944 with "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas."

This period in Hollywood seemed to give us many of the tunes we still sing today. In more recent times many artist such as Slade, Roy Wood, George Michael and Cliff have all weighed in with their take on the Christmas song, which form a direct line back thousands of years.

To list all of the composers, songs and carols would take the whole of this magazine which I'm not sure would be appreciated by our esteemed Editor, so I'm sorry if I've missed out your particular favourite but perhaps it may peak your interest enough for you look up the history of which ever song or carol floats your boat.

Let me take this opportunity to wish everybody a safe and Happy Christmas.

# There's no such thing as a free lunch!


Apart from actually producing the New Heron, quite a lot of other things go on behind the scenes, like producing the "new constitution" we mentioned last month.

### Neighbourhood Watch

Finally, after a few months of waiting all things are in place for setting up the first part of the scheme in Church Road. Upwell Road has now come onboard to thanks to Julian Swallow who now lives at Hillboro – Connie's old house. We will be putting up five "This is a Neighbourhood Watch Area!" signs in Church Road and another five in Upwell Road.



This means that we will now have the village main 'drag' covered and can set about working to slow up offending vehicles via "Speedwatch".

"Speedwatch" employs portable equipment similar to the signs that flash up "30mph" in Outwell; the

main difference being that the "Speedwatch" equipment will actually flash up the speed of the offending vehicle. Together with manual recording of registration plates and photographic evidence, this should enable us to make a difference. Initially drivers will be written to by the police informing them that they were exceeding the speed limit. If the same vehicle is caught three times the driver will be prosecuted.

We will have a purge from time to time in different places along Church Road and Upwell Road. It is hoped that this together with the signage deterring any petty criminal activity that we can make the village a safer and more secure place. Signs will be up, and information leaflets and window stickers will be with residents who have signed up before Christmas. We will carry out the first "Speedwatch" in the New Year.

After seeing the front cover picture of last month's New Heron, a few people were jokingly asking when Penelope Keith had come to Christchurch? Well – of course she didn't. It was a bit of clever photoshopping by our Technical department (Paul). But it's a good question. Why didn't she come here? She was making a series of

programmes on Britain's villages ('Penelope Keith's Hidden Villages' on More 4) so why not feature this one?

However, as we watched the programmes, all became clear! She was using some guidebooks published in the 1930s – the Batsford 'Face of Britain' series, and it just happens that I have a second hand copy of the one on East Anglia –

written in 1939 by Doreen Wallace.

It's an interesting read. Miss Wallace was very complimentary about much of East Anglia, but not all of it! Here is what she wrote about some of our local places.

She liked Wisbech, 'a prosperous town, with one very delightful feature – its waterfront. ...well back from the river on each side is a road of compact, dignified houses of Queen Anne and early Georgian types' However, she was somewhat less complimentary about March, which she said is 'notable for one of the finest church-roofs in England, perhaps the very finest. It is not notable for much else.'

She described Whittlesey as 'an ugly little place with just a few fine ancient buildings', and Peterborough as 'a very disappointing town. Its cathedral is squat and hidden, and the town itself, crowding along one main street, is insignificant.' I think Miss Wallace would notice a bit of a difference if she went to Peterborough today!

Apart from a passing reference to the church at Upwell, our local villages don't get even a mention.



So with a guidebook like that – no wonder Ms Keith didn't come here! Ah well, it's a shame, but there could be one good thing about it. We hear that the price of Bradshaw's Railway

guides have gone through the roof since Michael Portillo began using them on his railway programmes. Maybe if Ms Keith's shows turn out to be equally popular, I could sell my Batsford East Anglia guide for lots of money. Must check it out on ebay!

### Film Review

Being a confirmed Bondaholic I am well aware how this genre has changed and developed over the years; dare I say matured; from Mr Connery's original, via Moore and others through the well suited Mr Bronson to the latest incarnation via Daniel Craig.

And I do think with Daniel Craig at the helm the genre has matured. Gone are the incessant puns and sexual innuendo replaced, through tremendous scripts, with some intense and much more believable spy thrillers. For me, Skyfall is Bond at its peak with little or no gratuitous sex or action sequences. All those that are included are entirely relevant to the plot, and as I have already said, are believable.

Skyfall is the 23rd installment of the longestrunning film franchise in history, yet is fresh and real. Bond's loyalty to M (Judi Dench) is tested, as her past returns to haunt her. 007 must track down and destroy the threat, no matter how high the personal cost.

When Bond's latest assignment goes gravely wrong, and agents around the world are exposed, MI6 is directly attacked forcing M to relocate the agency. These events cause her authority and position to be challenged by Mallory (Ralph Fiennes), the new Chairman of the Intelligence and Security Committee. With MI6 now compromised from both inside and out, M is left with only one ally she can trust: Bond. 007 takes to the shadows – aided only by field agent Eve (Naomi Harris) – following a trail to the mysterious Silva (Javier Bardem), the most threatening Bond villain ever, whose lethal and hidden motives have yet to reveal themselves.

Unlike past Bonds pre-Craig, this movie is most definitely not formulaic and contains some interesting twists and, in one case, an entirely

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


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






### The Alan Russell Christmas Column

For the December column I thought I would deviate from the editors original request to write about Euximoor people and places and muse on Christmases past. My late father told me his most enjoyable Christmas present was made by his smallholder father, a knocked up threshing machine drum and elevator, driven by a belt from an upturned bicycle with a belt from a tireless rear wheel to a pulley on the drum, it gave him and his friends endless pleasure. One year when I did not receive the present I hoped for my mother told me this true story. Her father was killed in 1917, with no known grave, or memorial. Consequently her mother was widowed with 3 small children under 5 and existing on a pension of 50p per week and what she could earn herself. When mum was about 7 she dearly wished for a 10p dolls tea service, never having had anything like that, but delving into her hanging stocking on Christmas morning she was heart broken to find a pair of long thick brown woollen socks instead. When she was older her mother told her she had to weigh up whether to get her the tea set or make sure she was warm on her feet and legs during the coming cold winter as she could not afford both. For my best present ever my father cycled to 'Father Christmas's' second hand toy auction in his store at Wisbech and purchased a 500 piece Meccano set, complete with the wind up motors, I don't know how Father Christmas got to place it in my pillow case, but I still have it today. My wife Annette says her best present was a second hand dolls house with battery lights in every room, but I think it was my engagement ring, lucky girl!!

Much is made of obesity today but I am certain no one eats like they did in the past, not burgers and chips, but with the heavy manual labour involved in land work then, many calories were needed but strenuous work soon took them off. We would go to my Grandma's at Victoria House down Euximoor on Christmas Eve when Uncles and Aunts and children all sat down at 5.30pm to plates of Ham, Cheese and pickles etc., and jellies and cakes. Since it was a strict Methodist home, drink was tea, Corona, Best yet (that's got a lot of you wondering), and home made cordials, alcohol never got a look in.



Most of us stayed overnight and after presents for the children had been opened, milking the cows, feeding the horses, pigs etc., a large breakfast of fried potatoes, eggs, bacon and sausage meat with plenty of bread and best dairy butter was devoured. We kids would go out to play ready for a 1 o'clock feed again. As it was War time a caponised cockerel was the main meat or occasionally a fattened goose. Christmas puddings cooked in the copper earlier in the year when we all had a stir of the mixture beforehand, was served with the usual silver threepenny bits and custard (war time recipe of course). Although it was in the '40s most people on the land fared reasonably well with portions mostly supplemented by home grown vegetables, bottled and canned fruits and preserves and a back yard pig fed on scraps which a local butcher would come and kill, him taking half for his trouble and the rest of the joints for the owner. Afternoon feeding, milking and racking up finished we would all sit down for tea about 5 o'clock.

- Poor quality work is visible on the roof, driveway, or property
- Your neighbour appears anxious or distressed
- Your neighbour visits the bank, building society, or post office more frequently, particularly if they are accompanied by a trader

### What can I do?

- Ask your neighbour in private in person or on the phone - if things are OK
- If they are displeased, suggest calling a relative or carer on their behalf
- Vote any vehicle registration numbers
- Keep hold of any flyers you have received through your door
- Ask if the trader has left any paperwork and put it in a clean food bag
- If you suspect a crime, call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 03454 04 05 06 or your local trading standards office
- If the situation with the trader becomes volatile, call the police

### Harry Sparrow's Cycle Shop - by John Sparrow

The shop was built in 1934 in Church Road Christchurch, next to the new bungalow built by Mr Harold Means of Upwell, which was to be my mother & fathers home after their marriage. They were



married in 1934 at Christchurch Parish Church in the morning and went to Hunstanton in the afternoon in a Bull Nose

Morris Car kindly loaned by Mr Frank Scott, Harry's employer, then back to work the next morning.

The shop sold new cycles, Raleigh, Phillips, Triumph & Hercules all British made and they were delivered by van from Birmingham & Nottingham. Second hand cycles were also very much part of his business alongside mending punctures, replacing spokes which was a recurring problem, as today, the fenland roads have always had pot holes and hitting one of those on a cycle would break the spokes. Harry could build a cycle wheel with rim, hub, spokes & nipples from memory in 30 minutes.

Brown Bros and Johnson & Burton both of Norwich were trade suppliers of many items that could be purchased for Harry's Cycle shop. Brushes, buckets, wellington boots, spades, 2 tine straw forks, 4 tine muck forks, potato ladles, sugar beet forks, scythes and hoes.

A large wooden box would be delivered prior to November 5<sup>th</sup> from the Standard Firework Company. Dad had to apply for a Fire Arms Licence to be able to sell rockets, bangers, jumping jacks and roman candles to name just a few. Lads would be queuing outside his shop awaiting opening to buy bangers. (Really a queue in Christchurch to make a purchase)

In the 1930's he mended kettles, pots & pans, also replaced springs in windup gramophones and repaired radios which had valves in. The radios were either powered by batteries or the accumulator which was a rechargeable glass bodied battery.

Torch batteries and bulbs were important because there was no electricity in the village until the 1950's. When electricity arrived there was another trade to go into, electric bulbs, plugs, cable and fuse wire. He started to repair electric fires, flat irons and replace elements in kettles. Paraffin was sold from a 200

gallon tank, another much needed commodity 18

used for heating and cooking. Customers would bring their own 1 or 2 gallon cans to be filled. Oh how times have changed!

A tobacco licence was also held, farm workers would call before 7am on their way to work to buy their daily needs, also sold were No 7 razor blades to shave the fenland chins.

The shop was heated by a cast iron stove called a tortoiseshell fuelled by coke. This would be lit by my mother around 3pm so it was warm and ready for the evening trade closing around 9pm.

During the Second World War, the field opposite the shop was owned by Mr Dick Beeston. A search light unit was installed for the early part of the war, looking for those German Aircraft. Later this was replaced with a prisoner of war camp for the Italian Solders. During the day most of the solders worked on local farms. Dad needed a new door on the shop and a prisoner called Puggie who was a skilled carpenter made and fitted the door for him. It remained in the shop until it's demolition in 2010. Most evenings one of the prisoners would bring dad his supper over, they always had plenty of food especially fish and spaghetti. Dad was able to count

up to ten in Italian before Puggie returned home.

As a young boy I spent many happy hours in the shop with hammers. spanners and screwdrivers. He



taught me so many skills such as brazing, soldering and welding. Mending punctures was an everyday job. To find where the tube was punctured, we had a small bath filled with water, you put air in the tube placing it in the water and watching for the bubbles to rise, you would put your finger over the hole trying not to lose it and proceed to put a patch on it. In the winter it was a cold job as you would have to break the ice on the water before you could use it. As a boy I repaired the front wheels and dad the rear as they were more difficult because of the chain. Price to repair a puncture was 1shilling & sixpence (7.5p) today.

My Dad left school at the age of 13. He started work on Lavenders Farm in Padgetts Road (now no longer) then moved to J.F. Scott's and became their lorry driver, driving a Morris Commercial. Dad passed so many of his self-taught skills on to me, those skills have been very useful to me through my life and is a constant reminder of dad, and it makes me very proud of him.


### **Beauty Treatments** By Jane

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### Christchurch Residents Association

Our November meeting was attended by Josh Rutherford of the Local Highways Improvement Initiative. He informed us that our suggested alteration to the proposed 'Give Way' feature in Upwell Road, which linked in with the pavement widening scheme, could not be done at this time, but that an additional 'Give Way' feature could form part of next year's bid if some additional funding (i.e. 10% of the total cost) could be found. Josh was very informative and helpful. He answered many residents questions in great detail. We thanked him very much for coming over all the way from Newmarket in his own time.

Our Chairman informed us that the proposed Neighbourhood Watch scheme would be up and running in Church Road and Upwell Road before Christmas. The signs had been ordered and the first five financed by the Parish Council at a cost of £70. Co-Ordinators were also now in place and it was hoped that other parts of the village would join the scheme in the New Year.

'Speedwatch' equipment would be loaned to us early in the New Year to monitor speeding traffic in Upwell Road and Church Road. Owners of any vehicles over the limit would be written to by the local police once they were informed; that's speed, registration, and photographic evidence. This scheme would be re-run from time to time in different village locations throughout 2015. Owners of any vehicle caught three times would

be prosecuted.

Richard updated us on developments via the New Village Hall Committee. He had volunteered to produce a 'Tender Pack' for the project. It was hoped that all the final 't's' could be crossed and 'i's' dotted by a Working Group who would thrash out the final details before Christmas. The project would then be advertised and put out to tender in early January, Constructor/Developer finalized by mid-February, and work would start ASAP thereafter.

Regarding the ongoing problem of 'dog-fouling' in the village, it was made clear that it's the owners, not the dogs, that are the problem. Some new posters had been obtained and would be placed at strategic points around the village. It was hoped that these would have some effect

because -"There's No Such Thing as a Dog-Poo Fairy!" There had been a request from The New Heron team for Christmas anecdotes, stories, or jokes. And Penelope Keith's – Hidden Villages as reported in last months issue could now be seen on More4 -Tuesdays -9.00pm.



The meeting closed at 9.45pm after much discussion.







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



### Who pulled Santa's Sleigh?


