

# The Spirit that Saved the CHURCH (without which there'd be no 150th)

During the interregnum following Rev. David Spencer, dry and wet rot were discovered in the nave of the Parish Church. Repairs were to cost many thousands of pounds.

A public meeting was held on January 4th 1995 in the church itself; it was presided over by the Archdeacon of Huntingdon. It was agreed action must be taken. Reports, surveys, estimates and a 'Faculty' should be

obtained. Then, Roland Singleterry stood up and said that if he could start next week he could get all the manpower free of charge! Any later the men would be out working the fields! The reply from the chair was 'In view of that you'd better start on Monday!' The Faculty would have to come later!

Monday, January 16th came, tractors, trailers, vans and cars lined up in Church Road. Dust started to fly in all

directions; pews were removed, floorboards

carted away, bricks were laid and joists renewed.

During the following weeks the ladies of the village headed by Connie Symonds and members of the P.C.C. brought scones, cakes and energy packed goodies twice a day to keep the

workforce in good heart.
Within a couple

of months the pews and carpet were laid on the new flooring and the quality job that will last for 'many a year' was in place.

When completed in April 1995 a 'thank you' party was held at 'The Masters' on the lawn of the Old Rectory. Thanks were expressed to everyone. Later a 'Thanksgiving and Rededication' Service was held in the church. The event also had a slot on Cambridgeshire Radio's Sunday programme.

They were unforgettable days. A great job was achieved in a remarkable way in a spirit of cooperation, camaraderie and


work. It has been a real joy to relive and remember such a momentous event.

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

#### Stonea 16ft Bank Road Closure

Dear Richard,

As some people may be already aware, there has been some instability in the embankment along the Sixteen Foot, Stonea. Over the past few months we have been working on a scheme to rectify the situation.

It is proposed that on the 9th June, we will be completely closing the Sixteen Foot (24 hours a day), near to the level crossing, for a period of around 3 weeks. The date and duration are subject to change, although we are confident they wont.

I am sending you a plan of the diversion route and photo of the damage. [available at www.theheron.info Ed'] Obviously there will be disruption and this will cause inconvenience, but unfortunately a full closure is unavoidable. We will be sheet piling along the section shown in the attached photograph and the plant/labour force present means that vehicles will not be able to pass. Residents and businesses will have access, but may have to enter via a certain direction. We will keep them as informed as possible and we have already been in contact with the Public House. Working with Network Rail, we have agreed that their level crossing gates will be closed during the works as people cannot pass. This will also create a safer working environment for Highways and Rail.

While on site we will be taking the opportunity to resurface the road, improve signs and lines in the area and undertake any other works that are required.

A letter drop will be delivered to premises along the Sixteen Foot and a press release will be issued to highlight the forthcoming works. I have tried to send this to as many people as possible but feel free to forward this information on.

# 1864 And All That – (Whatever else happened thereabouts)

The church was built just one year after the new stained glass windows were installed in the newly renovated 'Lantern Dome' of Ely Cathedral.

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# Witches, Butterflies and Sulphur - by Viv Haresnape

This month sees the 150th anniversary of the village church, which was built in 1864/5 at a cost of £3,500. (over £200,000 in today's money) It was paid for by the Townley family of Upwell, who did so much to benefit the district, building schools and churches, as well as the Suspension Bridge at Welney. (before that, there was only a ferry boat across the river)

The village changed its name after the church was built. Before this, it was part of the parish of Upwell, and was known as Brymstone, or Brimstone Hill. Brimstone is the old name for sulphur. There are various ideas about why the village was called this, An old legend apparently says that a vicar of Upwell chased the devil, disguised as a witch, from the tower of St Peter's church in Upwell across the fen until it disappeared in a cloud of fire and brimstone! Another theory is that it was named after the brimstone butterfly, which would have been common in the area. You can make your own mind up!

Upwell was a very big parish, and included Welney, Three Holes, Lakes End and Tipps End, as well as Brimstone Hill and Euximoor. This dated back to medieval times, but the population must have increased (I expect there would have been many more people working on the land after the draining of the fens) because in 1846 by a private Act of Parliament, the parish was divided into three, so that Welney and Brimstone Hill could become independent. It didn't happen straight away. The idea seems to have been that the parish would remain as it was until the death of

William Gale Townley, who was rector at the time. He died in 1862, and so our church was built soon afterwards. Welney already had a church building, so only a house for the Rector was needed, and this was also built in 1864. Three Holes, Lakes End and Tipps End remained part of the parish of Upwell.

The new church at Brimstone Hill was not dedicated to a saint, as many are, but was called the Church of Christ, or Christ Church. People must have begun to refer to the village as Upwell Christchurch, or just Christchurch, and the name stuck. Perhaps they also thought that Christchurch was a nicer name than Brimstone Hill!

There was a tower on the church until 1883, when it had to be demolished because of subsidence - sadly a common problem in the fens! Can anyone tell us where the tower was - in the centre of the building or at the west end?

On a table at the back of the church there are folders with the records of baptisms, marriages and burials at Christchurch, going back to when the church was built, so if your family lived in the village, you can research some of your family history. They are worth a look even if you aren't local. At the forthcoming Festival of flowers we are hoping that we will all be able to find out more about the history of the church and village, so don't forget to come along!

#### Editor's interview with "Key the Rey"

Q. What did you do before you became a priest?
A. I was an Engineering Technician in the Water industry and before that a Draughtsman in the Petro-Chemical industry.

#### Q. When did you become a Christian / Priest?

A. I became a Christian in 1971 through my marriage. I did not have any church upbringing but when we went to book the church the vicar invited us to a study course (a bit like the Alpha course which wasn't available at the time). This course was where I came to know that Jesus is alive and active in the world today. I was Ordained in 1981.

# Q. Were you a priest elsewhere before coming to Christchurch / Welney / Manea benefice

A. Yes in Eaton Socon which is part of St. Neots and before that in Newborough on the north east of Peterborough. I did my initial ministerial training in a parish in Corby, Northamptonshire.

# Q. You now oversee a second benefice making 6 churches in all. Can you tell us a little about this?

A. Multi Church Leadership is becoming the norm as numbers of clergy continue to reduce. This means that clergy now have to work in a different kind of way and the gifts of lay members of the churches need to be recognised, developed and deployed. So church leadership and work is now much more a team enterprise with, as you rightly observe, the clergy exercising more of an oversight and enabling role.

# Q. You used to work for another Christian organisation too. But I presume, now you are looking after 6 churches, that you had to discontinue this?

A. My original post at Christchurch, Manea and Welney was deemed to be a half time job and in addition I worked for The Church Pastoral Aid



Society as another half time job. I ceased the CPAS role when I took over Doddington with Benwick and Wimblington in 2011

# Q. What is your view on falling numbers in church congregations? Or do you see an upturn at all?

A. The Church of England is the only Christian denomination that still tries to maintain a Church presence, and usually a church building, in every parish and community. We are here



for everyone at the most significant points on life's journey; we have helped this community for 150 years to make sense of events and history. We also have records and evidence of the local families of Christchurch. While there is still a reservoir of goodwill towards the church very few members of the village actually attend church so that makes the present a struggle and the future a big question mark.

# Q. As a matter of interest how do congregations compare across the 6 churches? Are numbers attending similar in each or are some catchment areas bigger than others?

A. Our villages are of different sizes and levels of community vibrancy and so are the church congregations, some are doing reasonably OK and some are struggling to keep going, I don't think we could say that any of them are vigorous.

# Q. Pressure of work spreading yourself around the six parishes must make life difficult. How do you cope?

A. It is a struggle but you have to make sure that your output does not exceed your input. Working excessive hours as the norm means that you have to find space to recharge. For me that means taking a day off each week, trying not to fill every slot in the diary, making time for family and friends having an annual holiday and finding time each day for quiet reflection and prayer, often for me walking the dog in the great blue yonder. As I said above working as a team is essential.

# Q. Presumably you have similar support teams at each church?

A. Sheila our Retired Priest and husband Stephen our Licensed Lay Minister are the linch pins of the team together with our Churchwardens in each parish (Daphne and Andrew here in Christchurch). Each church also has its own Church Council and various others who help with pastoral ministry, leading worship and administration.

# Q. Thanks a lot Kevin for agreeing to talk to us, we hope that you enjoy the Celebratory Edition of the New Heron!

A. My pleasure, and I'm sure I will!

#### An Interview with Walter Chamberlain - Part 1


Seeing as it is coming up to the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church, it made sense to interview somebody who has been involved there for a long time. Walter Chamberlin stepped down as the final member of the choir at Christchurch Parish church last year after approximately 84 years. He was born in 1922 in Christchurch and went to the old school next to the church. When Walter was seven, the rector at the time came into the school looking for choir boys. Walter gave an account of being picked 'He came in and said I'll have 'you, you, you, you, you and you' and the final one was me.'

Walter then attended Townley School, until the age of fourteen, where he was champion at sports. The very cup he received is still held there. On leaving school at the age of 14 Walter said, 'I left on the Friday and started work on the Monday' and worked at Frank Scott's farm for six years which he returned to after the Second World War ended. At the same time he was in search of a house and the rector 'Evans' was looking for a gardener so Walter moved into the rector's house. Evans finished as dean of Gloucester. He also remarked that 'When I was younger there wasn't much room in the church... it was always full.' This was followed by 'there were only nine of us last week.'

Apparently there used to be three shops in Christchurch as well as a blacksmith's and two carpenters' shops. Walter has also been involved in grounds keeping at the church: cutting the grass for 30 years and digging graves for 20. He also remembers when all the seats were removed to replace the floor (see this month's colour wrap –Ed').

His other roles include cross bearer, sides man, bell ringer and church councillor.
Walter received a award and certificate from the Bishop of Ely in 2009 for his services as a choirboy for 80 years.

#### Christchurch Residents Association

Our May meeting was held on Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup>. After the usual formalities the Stonea – 16 foot bank road closure was discussed followed by an update on the problems being experienced by Euximoor Drove residents. Unfortunately, the Speedwatch equipment was not appropriate to alleviate the speeding vehicle problem because it only registers up to 60mph and we needed to go beyond that. There has, however, been a recent visit from PCSO Dave Russ regarding a certain white van and motorcycles using the farmers field as a race track. Dave Russ and Mike Hawkins are monitoring this situation and will attempt to note the vehicle registration number.

Neighbourhood Watch was briefly discussed once again. Despite several volunteer co-ordinators coming forward more are required before we could set up and run the scheme properly. There would be an appeal for help in July's New Heron.

Various concerns were expressed over the current position re the proposed New Village Hall and the possibility that FDC funding could be lost. Richard has managed to get on the New Village Hall Committee who are having an emergency meeting on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> May and he will report back on the current state of play.

Disappointment was expressed by residents over the recent planning application for two new houses in Green Lane being passed despite the fact that it broke two major rules in FDC's own Planning Strategy; namely the development of 'paddocks' and infilling in such a small village as Christchurch. There remain outstanding issues relating to this proposed development, which are still being followed up by various parties who will report back in due course; hopefully by our June meeting.

In relation to all the above issues contact has been made with PCSO Dave Russ, Community Fire Safety Officer Howard Newton, and Susan Bull of Anglian Water who will be attending future CRA meetings. Contact numbers for these people will now be listed in the 'Useful Numbers' section of The New Heron.

The New Heron had been met with great approval by all and Richard explained that at the last Parish Council meeting they had been granted a monthly donation of £80. Together with donations from Alan Russell of Crown Farm and Nigel Russell, who also proposed the £80 support from CPC, the future of The New Heron is now much more secure. Deliveries are to be extended up the entire length of the Halfpenny Toll and Sandra will see Gill Bliss about this.

Residents voted unanimously that The New Heron should keep publishing the full Parish Council minutes each month, however they also voted unanimously that the PC minutes should be "of the moment" and not nearly two months old before publication. Richard was to bring this up at the next PC meeting as Editor.

The meeting closed at approximately 9.00pm but general discussions continued for sometime after. The date of our next meeting is 11<sup>th</sup> June 7.30pm at The Old School.

# Funding Threat to New Village Hall - by Paul Haresnape

Gloomy predictions were voiced at the May meeting of the Parish Council. Prevarication over the many different options for a replacement for the Memorial Hall could well threaten the £100,000 funding which was offered from Fenland District Council, according to District Council member Will Sutton. Cllr Sutton, who for several years, himself chaired the Parish Council, said he was pessimistic that the lack of a programme with a timetable for the project meant that the District Council funding would be no longer available to the Parish Council. The allocation had been made available providing a suitable plan had been agreed within a two year timescale, which had expired some time since.

Other voices, predominantly lead by district and county councillor Fred Yeulett, and ex Parish Clerk Stephen Cowell suggested that an emergency Hall committee meeting could be convened to determine specific "milestones" for the project. This was hastily arranged for the following week. Parish Council Chair Nigel Russell, suggested that drawings could be ready by the end of June and work begun by the end of the Bowls Season in September.

Privately there were concerns expressed that a reduction in the proposed size of the new hall, to save money on the project could limit the range of activities available in the hall. During the meeting it was agreed that the Short Mat Bowls would fit into the proposed size.

### New Play Park open for business

Newly finished and awaiting final inspection, the new children's play park was declared open for use at the May meeting of the Parish Council.

It was thought unnecessary to have any formal opening, but as seen in these photos the members of the Parish Council and the public present for the meeting took advantage of the late evening sun to give it a try-out.

The great Saxon defensive earthwork known as Devils Dyke runs 7 miles across country from Wood Ditton to Reach Fen.

Local legend has it that it was built by Satan, or by giants.

In the 18<sup>th</sup> century, a man named Joe Badcock murdered his lover in Reach Fen.

Legend has it that he was hanged and gibbeted on the highest part of Reach Fen in full view of his victim's cottage door, so that her parents could take some solace in watching his corpse slowly rotting away.

#### My beer tastes funny?

1816, just 48 years before the village church was built, saw some very bloody riots that were brought about by the poverty and unemployment that followed the end of the Napoleonic Wars. In Littleport and Ely where the rioting was fiercest, many stories were told of gamekeepers and farmers that were murdered for prosecuting Fen men whose only way of getting food was to trap or snare it. Soldiers and other officials were also killed when they tried to round up poachers and rioters.

Five Fen men were hanged at Mill Pitts, Ely, on the 28th of June that year, and their bodies were buried in a single grave in St Mary's churchyard. Their names are recorded on a stone slab on the south side of the church tower.

It is said that the body of a butcher who supplied the cart to take them to the gallows was later found head downwards in his own cesspit.

The corpse of the carpenter who made the coffins was discovered in the pipe that took water to Ely brewery ... sales of beer fell dramatically after the discovery. \*


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# Be cautious of traders who call at your door



### **Advice from Trading Standards**

In the last 5 years it is estimated that £1 million has been paid to rogue traders by older residents living in Cambridgeshire. In most cases the rogue trader will have called at the customer's door offering to do work on their house or garden, and will have overcharged for unnecessary and shoddy work.

These are serious crimes, in some cases costing the customer their life savings and often leading to them being fearful in their own homes.

At Trading Standards we would like to make you aware of the telltale signs of rogue traders to help you avoid them. We would also urge you to pass this advice on to elderly friends and relatives.

Rogue traders typically:

- **Call at the door offering services** such as replacing a loose roof tile, roof or gutter cleaning, gardening, house maintenance, jet washing, driveway paving and tree felling.
- Engage with the customer to win their trust e.g. claiming to have been before, claiming they are working up the street etc. They will seem very friendly and chatty.
- **Start with a small job** such as gutter cleaning and then claim further work is needed. This subsequent work will not be quoted for and will run into thousands of pounds.
- Make fraudulent claims e.g. moss growth on a roof causes severe damage and needs to be washed off, painting a roof is necessary to protect it.
- Fail to give you written notice of your right to cancel which is required for most contracts agreed at home.
- **Use intimidation to extort money** and often take the customer to a bank or cash point to withdraw cash (a criminal offence).
- Return again and again demanding further payment for bogus reasons e.g. claiming that VAT has not been paid.

If you think rogue traders are currently at your property, are in the vicinity or are due to return, please contact the police on 999. If you think rogue traders have done some work for you but have left, contact our advice partner, Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline, on 08454 040506 for advice.

### Trustees Statement - Christchurch Memorial Hall and Social Centre (1001867)

The Memorial Hall finally closed its doors to the public in early January 2014.

Since then all outstanding utility bills, rates demands and insurance charges/refunds etc, have been settled. A full set of accounts has been produced and audited for the period Jan 2013 to May 2014.

Currently the Memorial Hall Trustees hold the following money/assets on behalf of the village.

- (1) Proceeds from Sale of Hall + interest = £ 103,096
- (2) Balance held in Memorial Hall Deposit and Current Bank Accounts = £ 24,663
- (3) A quantity of crockery and folding tables in long term storage.

After settling any future legal costs, all remaining money/assets will be transferred to the proposed new charity ( new hall + sports field ), following its creation and registration with the Charity Commission. The existing Christchurch Memorial Hall and Social Centre charity will then be wound up.

# Dalek to defeat dangerous potholes

Motorists driven round the bend – and to repair centres – by the seemingly unstoppable pothole epidemic may have a new ally in the form of the 'Dalek'.

The new device, officially known as the road patcher but nicknamed after Doctor Who's most infamous adversary, costs £200,000 and can fill a pothole around 30 times faster than a conventional repair crew, all while the operator relaxes in the warmth of his truck cab.



Essentially a hydraulic arm, which can be fitted to the front of a lorry, the 'Dalek', or 'Pothole Killer' as it has been dubbed in America, is currently being trialled by Bedfordshire council and could soon be used to fix broken roads across the country.

In a report by The Mirror, local roads chief Brian Spurr said: "We're constantly investigating new ways to keep up to speed with road improvements and trying out innovative technology like this ticks all the boxes. The road patcher is going through a trial phase but could be another way that we can improve the service for residents."

Trials of the new technology that save time and money in road repairs cannot come soon enough, as a new report estimates that the cost of completely repairing roads in England in Wales will total £12billion.

Meeting held at the Octavia Hill Birthplace Museum, Wisbech on May 14<sup>th</sup> 2014.

It was good to emerge from the "slums" into the secret garden – one of Octavia's outdoor sitting rooms.

Following an enjoyable evening we held our usual monthly meeting in a room at the museum. 

CHRISTCHURCH villagers have pulled off a "miracle" by saving their parish church which was doomed to close because of dry rot.

When church workers found out in the autumn that almost £20,000 was needed to replace the rotten floor, they feared they were beaten, but Christchurch people proved they were made of sterner stuff!

By early January, Rural Dean The Rev

Peter Baxandall had been given £3,000 in donations, with £13,000

promised over the next five years and countless offers of voluntary help. "It was a miracle," said Warden Connie Symons. "We walked into the meeting thinking we couldn't do it and came away overwhelmed by the tremendous response."

Now retired men, farmers and anyone with time to spare are digging up the foundations of the church, built in 1863, preparing it for specialist rot treatment.

Mr Baxandall said: "One side of the church is as normal with the pews but on the other side is a six foot deep hole." Mrs Symons said: "The atmosphere is great, the women are making countless cups of teas and the men, working under a trained architect, are labouring away. We could not have faced this task without their help." Last Sunday the morning service was held in the village's Townley School hall for the first time - and the hall looks likely to be a temporary church until at least mid-March. "We had the same number of people as normal, and it was a wonderful family atmosphere, warm and lovely; and we were able to take communion as normal," said a delighted Mrs Symons, who went on to say that the new carpet, that they'd had funds donated for, "would be the icing on the cake!"
