How are we doing? - we need your views

What our readers think of our efforts. This is what the New Heron editorial team have set out to determine.

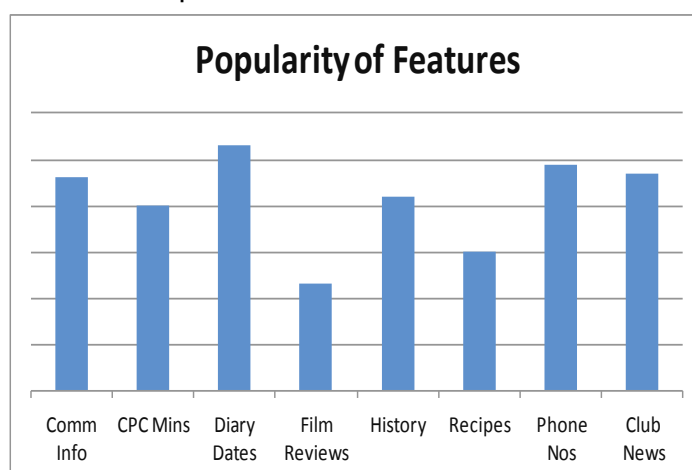
As an "open and responsive" organisation it is important that such views are clearly understood. To begin this process, at the Constitution launch in February a questionnaire was circulated to collect views on a limited range of topics.

Currently we do not have enough filled in questionnaires to make clear judgements of what the general views are on all the topics. However there are one or two themes we can report on as being likely to represent the views of most: It seems likely that the readership is happy with the style of text that we use in the magazines; the size of the text is less clear, but it looks likely that most of you don't want to reduce it. Most of you seem to be happy with the features

we asked about, but fewer valued the Film Reviews and the Recipe of the Month. There was one individual comment which may need a little explanation: It was regarding the fact that the Parish Council information is always too late. The New Heron is aware of this and has tried to persuade the Parish Council of the issue, but are limited by the law. The minutes are not publicly available until they have been agreed at the following meeting. We do publish them on the website almost immediately after that meeting.

In order to make clearer judgements we do need

more questionnaires to be filled in. If you have not been able to fill one in yet, **please get in touch at one of the numbers on the front cover and ask for one.** It will only take a few minutes to complete and will help us manage the New Heron more effectively for all our readers.



New Road Layout to Curb Speeders

Work began at last on Monday 16th February on the pavement widening scheme in Upwell Road. Not only will this greatly improve access for pedestrians, and especially those with wheelchairs or disability vehicles, but it is hoped that the narrowed, now single track road, would also act as a traffic calming measure for vehicles, which would otherwise be speeding into the village.

By Wednesday the new curb was already in place and drainage was being completed. The workmen involved seemed to think that the project was a great idea. They hoped to complete it by Friday.

Friday came and by the end of the day the project just needed 'topping out' with tarmac and levelling, and new road signage and markings added. Tarmac was laid and the job completed with temporary signage by Tuesday 24th Feb. Hopefully this would all be completed later in the week, or indeed by the time you are reading this? It is further hoped that a 'SLOW' road marking will be added on the northern end to further aid the slowing up of traffic entering the village.

Earlier in the planning application, Christchurch Residents Association had expressed concerns that the 'give way' feature would potentially block access and exit from Crown Road, particularly at school 'drop off' and 'pick up' times. Waiting traffic would effectively block the end of Crown Road, and could be potentially hazardous to pedestrians wishing to cross. We await with interest the outcome of this new innovation and its future practicality.

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Christchurch Village Resource Centre Re-launch

A fine spread of nibbles, and ample supplies of tea and coffee greeted the hardy souls who attended the relaunch of the Village Resource Centre when the Editorial Team of the New Heron, presented the new Constitution.

The Team explained why a written constitution was needed, and how it would work.

The evening began with the assembled villagers giving their views on how the New Heron was doing, by filling in a short questionnaire. See Page 4

Cllr Will Sutton welcomed everyone, and outlined how he had tried to keep the Heron alive after the last editors could not continue. He also announced that he had nominated the New Heron for an award under the Fenland Citizen's "Pride in Fenland" banner.

The Editor gave a brief thanks to those who had come and explained that the evening was to distribute the new constitution document.

There was a short presentation of the history of the Heron as far as was known, and an explanation of what the Village Resource Centre was. Villagers were asked to sign up to become members. Members would form a "Reference Group" which would be used to guide further development of the New Heron, but also launch other initiatives which would increase the village activities and amenities.

Members were asked to note the first AGM would be held on 21st May. Only signed up members would be eligible to take part.

We would welcome more members - if you live in the Parish - use one of the numbers on the front page - ask for a form - IT COSTS NOTHING!

Time to decide!

The country goes to the polls on May 7th!

There is a General Election. At the same time, the whole Parish Council will be elected. I'm sure there's many of you wondering why you should care about this. So I hope this little article may help you decide that it's worth doing.

We've just commemorated the centenary of the start of the First World War, many of our grandfathers, and grandmothers would have been involved. Are you aware that most of the men who were fighting did not have the right to vote? It was only after the war in 1918 that those who were 21 years old would be given the vote. The women coping back on the "home front" would only be granted the vote when they got to 31 years old! It was not until 1928 that they got parity with men.

For many many years before, ordinary working people had been thought of as being unworthy of the responsibility and the right to choose who was to run the institutions in charge of the country. Only those owning land and property, and only the men had that privilege!

Ordinary people were struggling under all sorts of oppression, injustice and lack of representation for many years. Until they won, against all the odds, the right, at first for all men, then after the First World War, all women. It cost many of them dearly, some had their lives taken, the lucky ones, their lives ruined, by prison and deportation across the seas. All to secure their children and future generations the chance to choose who will represent them in the "halls of power".

Let us not disrespect the cost to them, by failing to cast that hard won vote!

One further point. The registration for voting has changed in June last year, so each individual needs to ensure they are registered. Previously this was done by the "head" of the household. But no longer. You can register online at <http://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote>

Women are significantly less certain than men on whether they will vote. According to a survey conducted on behalf of BBC's Woman's Hour. 65% of men say they will definitely vote, compared to 55% of women. And almost 1 in 4 women aged 18-34 (24%) are unlikely to vote in the election. Over a third of women (35%) don't know who they will vote for in the general election, which is 10% higher than men (25%). Women under 34 are the least certain about how they will vote, more than 4 in 10 don't know.

Nearly half (48%) of all women with children claimed they did not vote in the last election. A third of women without children claimed to have not voted in 2010.

Around six in ten men and women know definitely which party they will vote for. And, nearly 4 in 10 men and women may change their mind on who they plan to vote for.

Successful weight loss

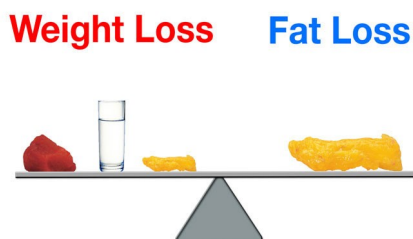

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Ex Head of Townley Dies

The sad death of Mr Peter Hearnshaw was announced last month.

Peter, or Mr Hearnshaw as he was more properly known to many, died suddenly on 8th February 2015, aged 74 at his home in March. He was Head Teacher at Townley School for many years, retiring because of ill health in 2000.

The village and the school has much to thank him for as these memories indicate: Ed'

One of Mr Hearnshaw's great loves was the Christingle. It was always a privilege for the year 6 to lead the service with bible readings. The tradition of the Christingle still continues today but in a slightly different format. Due to health and safety concerns the younger children no longer hold a lighted candle but take part acting the story of the first Christmas.

His other great love was computers. Setting up an e-mail link to keep in touch with the residential trip alternating between the Isle of Wight and Weymouth. This was a shared trip with Wimblington school that he introduced during his headship.

He also introduced the year six barbeque to celebrate the end of their time at Townley. This has now become the friends of Townley Annual end of year barbeque.

During his headship the school had strong links with the community taking part in the annual pancake race. The Heron was edited and printed in the school. The school collected produce and the older children delivered small parcels to the older residents as part of the harvest celebrations. At one time the school kitchen prepared and served dinners to the Senior Citizens - I'm not sure if this was once a month or more often, volunteers also delivered hot meals or brought those unable to get to school. This was at the time of meals on wheels. He was also part of the team that fund raised and raised grants to enable the village to have a minibus - The Croft Carrier. The school used this regularly to go to the George Campbell in March for swimming lessons.

Mr Hearnshaw was interested in conservation and along with Charlotte Whitting developed part of the field into a conservation area.

Also during his headship the school underwent extensive extension due to the large number of pupils and small classrooms.

For many years the school entered a float in the Rose Fair. They also ran a medieval banquet to raise funds.

As a born and bred Welshman, he was known for his love of rugby. The children waited with anticipation for an England v Wales encounter.

Then during the School assembly on Monday morning when, if Wales lost, the friendly banter began!!

Later on with his daughter Rosie he developed a passion for horses

and entered the village horse show on his horse Harley.

Who's Who? - Richard Guilford

Are you a Whovian? A follower of Doctor Who? I must confess I have been since the halcyon days of William Hartnell, with his rather abrasive attitude, right up to today's latest manifestation via Peter Capaldi.

When Who was in its infancy, with Mr Hartnell, its shakey sets, and monsters that were quite evidently men in costumes which were not terribly convincing; still in a child's imagination, which suspended credibility, the stories were fascinating, and often, quite frightening to a youngster. Many a time I joined the hundreds of other children hiding behind the sofa. Not all at my house you understand.

Since the return of The Doctor, after a 16 year hiatus, in the form of Christopher Eccleston, in March 2005, Who has entered a new era; with movie quality production values, excellent storylines from Russell T Davies, Stephen Moffat, Mark Gatiss and others, plus the benefits of modern film and TV technologies like CGI, I have become an avid follower again.

For some reason I never really warmed to Patrick Troughton as the second Doctor. For me, the Doctors of my era were John Pertwee and Tom Baker. Two of the best. Again, for me, subsequent Doctors; Peter Davidson, Colin Baker, and Sylvester McCoy were not right for the part, had no real presence or strength of character, and for that period, before the hiatus, I also felt that the scripts had become weak and predictable. I became a lapsed Whovian for that period. Now both the characters, and the scripts, are in a different league. The programmes have become riveting to watch, and, no matter how fantastical, believable. Even the recent pastiche of Incredible Journey, when the Who team were miniaturized and went inside a Dalek, really worked.

Peter Capaldi's Doctor has the abrasiveness of the original Doctor – William Hartnell, the stylishness of John Pertwee – the third Doctor, and the eccentricity of Tom Baker's – fourth Doctor. He

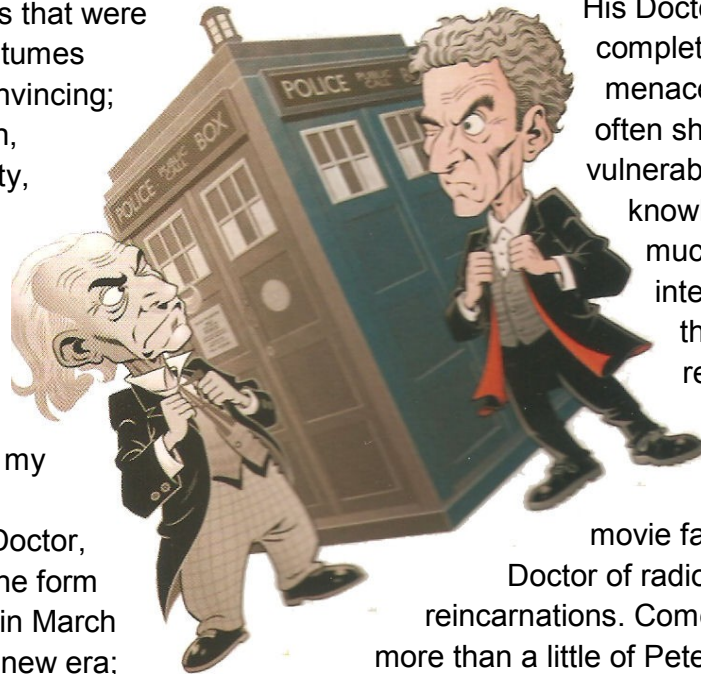
has brought back that touch of darkness, and ageless mystery to The Doctor that before the more recent incarnations of David Tennant, and Matt Smith, had been missing almost entirely. But Peter Capaldi has redeveloped these sides of the Doctor Who character to a much greater extent.

His Doctor is much more solid and complete. He has a dash of menace, a dash of mischief, and often shows an eccentric vulnerability when he admits to knowledge that he lacks. A much more complex and interesting character now, but then Peter Capaldi's Doctor represents the character's 13th reincarnation. I say 13th because I include Peter Cushing's Doctor of movie fame and Paul McGann's

Doctor of radio, not just the TV reincarnations. Come to think of it, I can see more than a little of Peter Cushing's Doctor in Peter Capaldi's version.

Next month I shall tell how I myself was fortunate enough to work at the BBC during the mid-seventies, on The Two Ronnies, and, on Doctor Who when John Pertwee was in charge. That was for a series of episodes under the heading Planet of the Spiders. An archive which I thought had never been reissued on DVD and seemed to have been lost. Fortunately, for my recent 63rd birthday, Jennie, my other half, found out that it had now been released, and got me a brand new copy from Ebay. Anyway, more on that next month.

It Don't Mean a Thing



You know how it goes; It don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing!

So says Alan Norris founder and leader of The Alan Norris Big Band.

Alan started the band in 1993 and for the last twenty two years this twenty piece group of talented musicians has played and gigged its way around the region, expertly recreating the sound of the greats like Count Basie, Glenn Miller, Woody Herman and Glen Miller. A large horn section featuring saxes, trumpets and trombones aided by a tight rhythm section of piano, bass and drums ensure a big sound with Ed Ling from Ely hitting the high notes on trumpet.

Two singers add vocals, and completing the line-up is Alan's acerbic wit and conducting skills.

Not content with just one band, in 2013 twenty years after starting the big band Alan turned his attention to the Fenland Youth Swing band which gives young people (the average age is approximately 16) the chance to grow as musicians and also acts as a feeder for the big band, as they acquire the skills required to move up to the main unit. Aply supported by Sarah Garforth and Kevin Steward, Alan and the band have played at St Peters Church in March in aid of the Help For Heroes Charity and are due to perform at the March Park Music Festival this coming June.

At the time of writing Alan requires musicians for all instruments, they need to be grade six and above. He is also in the process of raising money for equipment. So if you play or can help to fund raise he would love to hear from you.

Alan took up the trombone almost by accident in 1957 when he went with a friend who was playing in the St John's Ambulance Brigade Brass Band. The bandmaster handed Alan the only instrument he had left, a trombone and asked him to try to play it. The rest as they say is history. In 1961 on leaving school he joined the military band of the First Battalion East Anglian Regiment (later to become The Royal Anglian Regiment) and was also a member of the Dixie Land group, Big Band and Dance Band that was contained within the military Band.

Combining music with a spell on the staff of Oundle School he was featured in the Neil Mitchell Band as well as the Peterborough Concert Band. The Casual Vacancy by J.K.Rowling – BBC ONE

Yes! I know it's not strictly a film but three one hour episodes add up to a film, and quite a long one at that. With the elections in a couple of months including those for Parish Council representatives this latest adaptation for the small screen (though they're getting bigger!) of J.K.Rowling's first adult novel "The Casual Vacancy" is both timely and, not to be missed. The group are also in process of getting funding from Cambs. County Council for a course of Molly Dancing sessions for the children of Townley and Welney schools.



So – what exactly is Molly dancing? Well, it can best be described as the local equivalent of Morris dancing – but if that conjures up a mental picture of handkerchief waving gentleman in spotless white garb, you have another think coming! Molly dancing is loud, energetic, and very colourful. It was traditionally performed by out of work ploughboys in the 19th century, often in the period between Christmas and the start of the spring ploughing season. They would tour around the village landowners, offering to dance for money, and if they refused to pay up they might well find a furrow ploughed across their lawn afterwards!

It has been suggested that the dances were a parody of the formal dancing seen at social events in the 'big houses' and the dancers would often hide their identities by blackening their faces. The last traditional Molly dancing died out in the 1930s, but a number of groups around East Anglia have revived it, and put their own modern 'take' on it with new dances, and colourful and often outlandish costumes. Some of the best known are Ouse Washes, Pig Dyke Molly, and Gog Magog from Cambridge. You may have seen them at events like Ely Folk festival, or Whittlesey Straw Bear.

Angling on the Sixteen Foot

After the war and up to the sixties every weekend coach loads of fisherman from Sheffield and District descended on the 16 foot for matches. They would throw so much ground bait in the fish were not hungry again until the next Thursday or Friday! The local hostelrys did very



well out of them after the matches as did others, selling fresh fruit and vegetables for our visitors to take back to Sheffield. However, I'm afraid many of us suffered with them walking in crops or pinching strawberries, potatoes etc. Eventually, with increasing costs for them travelling down here, 20/30 coaches gradually wound down to one or two and finally none. I think some of them just enjoyed a "MERRY" day out as us lads would search the banks after they had gone and everything from floats to rods could be found left in the grassy banks.

Many local pubs had their own fishing clubs and, although pike fishing is still popular, fishermen seem to prefer the many private lakes filled with fish and catches of 50 lbs are easily achieved against 2 or 3 lbs in a match in the river.

Mr T Clarke, who had been disabled, lived in Happy Row and introduced me to fishing, which I enjoyed for many years, and many happy hours were spent with him catching Roach and Silver Bream especially beyond Cut Bridge, the last angled bridge before the left turn to Upwell.

Crown Road got its name by there being a public house called the Crown at the river end. Further down the river was the Old Wheatsheaf, now a pink house. Both were thriving pubs in their day, with both their own Darts and Fishing Clubs. Sadly, trade gradually diminished over the years. I have seen photos of their presentation nights and dinners at Christchurch; do you own any, if so let us know and we could feature them in The New Heron?

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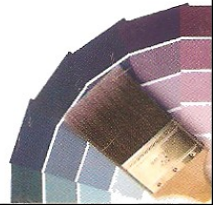
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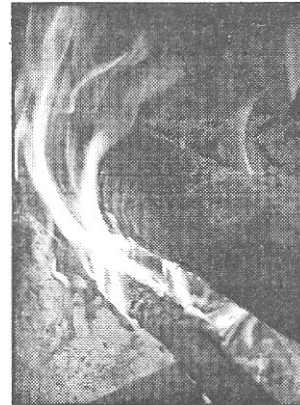
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Recipe of the Month

Add egg whites and give it a few pulses.

Gently mix in fruits with a spoon. Do not blend.

Spray bottom of your pan with cooking spray or lightly cover with oil. Pour batter in.

Bake in oven at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes, checking frequently to make sure it does not brown or dry out.

When done, serve super hot straight out of the oven, or chilled in the fridge. Enjoy!
