# Recipe of the Month

## MARROW TART

Marrows are in season this month, so if you are looking for something new to do with them, we can recommend Annette Russell's marrow tart recipe!

6oz sweet short crust pastry

- 2 large eggs
- 4 oz sugar

1 medium sized marrow

good pinch of cinnamon, nutmeg or ginger. 3 oz sultanas

1. Line a deep flan tin with pastry

2. Beat the eggs and sugar together

3. Add the diced marrow, milk and spice, and sultanas

4. Turn into the pastry case and bake for about15 mins. in a hot oven (425F-220C ~ 450F-230C)Gas Mark 6-7.

5. Lower the Heat to moderate (375F-190C) -Gas Mark 4) for a further 20 mins until pastry and filling are cooked. When Annette sent it to us, we had to try it ourselves - strictly in the interests of research, you understand! And very nice it was too.

# Editor's Interview with Doris and Wolsey Rolfe

## Their life together

Two of the most well known village elders, Wolsey and Doris Rolfe, both celebrated their 90<sup>th</sup> birthdays back in July of this year within a week of each other. Whilst we had always planned an interview with them at some point, mainly because they had been so involved in the life of the village over the years, now seemed particularly timely, with them both joining the ever increasing band of nonagenarians in Christchurch.



Wolsey and Doris had first met as infant school children nearly 85 years ago. In those days The Old School (now my home) was still operating. Apparently Doris didn't really like Wolsey very much at first, but their paths kept crossing over the years. They both moved on to Townley School at the age of 6 and by the time they had reached the age of 10 or 11 they had become Head Girl and Head Boy. Gradually over the years their affection for one another grew; largely due to Wolsey's persistence and Doris eventually giving in.

Their paths were ever crossing as happened again when they became choirboy and choirgirl under the Rector Serial Evans who was an exceptionally good singer. Members of the choir were paid fourpence a week and practiced weekly in The Old Rectory. Wolsey led the cricket team, mainly made up of choirboys who, in those days, regularly played against the choirboys of Ely. Who usually won is now lost in the mists of time.

Since the age of 9 or 10 most of the village girls did crafts and knitting etc. with Mrs. Selina Evans. Doris was always good with her hands at these skills. The Evans' also set up and ran the Good Friends Society, which supplied tea and scones, made by the Evans' maids, and ran games and competitions for the children. Later came garden parties which included the adults as well.

In the early years courting couples would frequent Green Lane, at the top end of which there used to be gypsies, and also Wayside before the houses were built there. Along with their friends Hilda and Eddie they remembered their presence being given away by the dogs barking. Youngsters from the chapel used to take a walk around to the Sixteen Foot Bank one way, but churchgoers, including Wolsey and Doris, used to go the other way via The Dun Cow and up Green Lane every Sunday. Between the ages of 17 to 18 Doris used to play the organ at Sunday School when it still used to be held in The Old School. Wolsey was only in the army reserves at this time as running the Garage business, where the scrapyard now is, was considered a protected occupation.

Also at this time there used to be a blacksmiths in the village on the corner of an old track, or cart road, which ran through to Crown Road from where Mae Reader now lives, and also another at the far



end almost opposite the church lych gate run by Mr. Hyams that you used to be able to cycle through to. Behind the barn which still stands there is an old workmans hut on wheels from when the church was built, and beyond that Beatrice's old wooden house. Abe Russell also had a carpenters shop next door to the blacksmiths, and on the corner there was another chap who used to deal in car batteries and the like. As a matter of interest, also in this era there used to be a bicycle repair shop, run by Harry Sparrow, up Church Road near Walter Chamberlain's house, in the large old shed which has only recently been pulled down in order to accommodate a new garage for the house. Opposite The Old School in what is now called The Cottage, where Johnathan Christmas and Katie Green live, there used to be a small sweet shop run by Mrs. Malt. The village shop was then Cawthorn's General Store. You could also then get bread, groceries, and sweets from The Farmers Boy, at the top end of Church Road.

In the war years Wolsey was finally called up and



served in the Royal Engineers from 1942 to 1945. He became an excellent nail-maker after taking a blacksmiths training course using big power hammers down in Kent. During the last few years of the war metal, mainly iron, became an important resource for munitions and as a result The Old School and similar buildings lost their original railings as they were commandeered for the war effort. The rector in Christchurch at this time was still Serial Evans. Wolsey had also been a footman at Lilford Hall which had fourteen servants all of whom lived in. During this time Doris lived at Kimberley Cottage where the family ran a smallholding and corn stackyard. The threshing tackle and binders were driven by horsepower originally. The old fashioned combines in those days were driven via a steam engine run by Mr.

William Sparrow.

Wolsey and Doris married in1949 and lived in Crown Avenue for 22 years whilst running both the garage and the blacksmiths businesses. Most of the work was MOT's and repairs. Doris worked on the land at a smallholding dealing in strawberries and beetroot. They had two



children Malcolm and Monica who attended the weekly garden parties held by the Good Friends Society in the churchyard. Their children too went to Townley School. Sadly, Malcolm was killed in a road accident at the young age of 17 years. Wolsey and Doris purchased a sanctuary light for the church as a memorial to their beloved lost son. When Jack Rolfe, Mary's husband, closed the garage and blacksmiths business Wolsey became a postie for four years, serving Christchurch and Welney, before Alvar Smart took over.

Post-army Wolsey joined the PCC (Parochial Church Council) and, along with Ron Osler, ran the village football team. Even then Ron had talked about leaving a legacy to the church. True to his

word, after his recent death, this he did, and part of it has been used to



pay for the rebuilding of the front boundary wall of the churchyard (see page 9). Ron was also a leading member of Christchurch Fire Service, as pictured in last months New Heron. Wolsey used to organize the Christchurch Galas along with Connie Symons and others. Up to just earlier this year he was still a member of the PCC.

In 1971 they had a bungalow built in Upwell Road where they have now lived for the last 43 years. Wolsey gave up his PCC work and being a representative on the local synod in 2014 only due to failing health. Also, when I first moved to the village in 2008 he was still heavily involved in all the church events, being MC and DJ at the Christmas Bazaars and Summer Fetes, always full of fun and laughter along with his very happy wife. I did help out once or twice at these events but was never up to Wolsey's jovial standard.

So, married since 1949, and still very much in love, Wolsey and Doris celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary a few years back, and, now both in their nineties, are still together! That's got to be several records rolled into one these days! Both pillars of the community over the years, and much loved by all. We'll have to get that Christchurch Gala going again won't we?

# Film Review

## After Earth ~ Columbia Pictures ~ 1hr. 36mins.

When I first read the write up for this movie I was not impressed. Oh! Here we go again; another movie star making a vehicle to get his kid into the business! Especially when the original story was written by Will Smith himself! I was wrong! Very wrong! If you don't like a bit of sci-fi then you may not like this movie. However, apart from a few, high quality, CGI creatures this is far from typical sci-fi fare. In terms

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of its quality, believability, and investigation into the human condition of a son wanting to prove himself to his father, and all that that entails, this screenplay is on a par with Avatar.

A crash landing leaves Kitai Raige (Jaden Smith) and his legendary father Cypher (Will Smith) stranded on an old Earth 1,000 years after cataclysmic events had forced humanity to to evacuate the entire planet and escape to a new world. With his father severely injured with two broken legs Kitai must embark on a treacherous journey to retrieve a signal beacon so they might engineer a rescue for themselves. They must learn to work together, and trust each other, if they are to stand any chance of returning home. But young boys don't always do what there previously absentee father tells them do they!? Even if he is the Prime Commander in the space force.

Thrills and spills, excitement, a few shocks, and one or two interesting twists, make this a very watchable movie. If you give it a chance it will grab your attention and hold it until the end. Personally, I think I could watch it all over again. Probably will!

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
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# The Alan Russell Column



### A History of Euximoor Drove - Pt 4

Strawberry Villa I mentioned previously was once a public house called The Snipe and Duck but closed before my time.

Euximoor Drove when I was young consisted of two or three main farms, Mr. H Day, his brother Mr. F Day, Mr. B West and small farms Mr. F Russell and Mr. N Poole. The rest consisted of 20/30 smallholdings. Most people had an allotment either Parish Council or one of the Odd-fellows ones.

Most had one or two cows and a sow or two. Everyone had strawberries and as many as a dozen or so merchants came to collect them every night in the season, From mid June to end of July was the only time you saw strawberries then not like today when tasteless red things in a punnet are offered in all the shops and supermarkets! Many of these small holders went on to farm bigger holdings and I believe it is fair to say that there are not many hamlets in the UK that produced and sold as much money's worth totalled together, in the years following the war until farming changed unbelievably these past 30 years.

The Methodist Chapel played a big part in many residents' lives with Sunday school and Anniversaries, Morning and Evening Services, Christian Endeavour meetings and Sisterhood meetings.

The week before the anniversary celebrations new outfits were bought, gardens and hedges trimmed to perfection, and farmers fields next to the road got a special clean up, as visiting families, friends and relations came to tea and to size things up!! Then you went to their village and did the same.

I do not know why but Euximoor and Christchurch never did really hit it off?

In those days they visited us and we visited Christchurch. That was about the only time of the year!

For a year or so Euximoor had its own football team and played on Mr. Dallidays rough grass field in socalled friendlies with Christchurch. But only one or two matches ever took place. I have a few other memories of Euximoor Drove but that's for another time.

Every year I help Annette to collect for the poppy appeal doing the outlying roads, farms and the Drove and sitting waiting for her I try to picture how it was, who lived where, who did I work for and when as I still remember the Steam engine belonging to Mr. W Sparrow with the threshing drum and jackstraw when each neighbour would help the next to thresh the corn out of the stacks - a hard and often dirty job.

Now a combine does as much in an hour as 12/14 men did in a day. But life changes and so must we.

# THE SAYERS FAMILY AT CHRISTCHURCH by Trevor Bevis.

Dorothy Leigh Sayers (1893-1957), earned an extraordinary reputation with some of the best, most amusing, and most intelligent detective novels combining snobbery and exact background knowledge in precisely the right proportions. Her creation Lord Peter Wimsey, impressively assisted by the ideal servant, Bunter, is one of the classic detective figures of 20th century fiction. Among the several books Dorothy wrote The Nine Tailors is a tour de force depending on knowledge of campanology, (bell ringing).

Dorothy was the daughter of the Reverend Henry and Helen Mary Sayers who came to Christchurch from Bluntisham. Both are buried in Christchurch churchyard. Their daughter frequently visited the village sometimes staying for several weeks. Her time at the rectory was used for forming ideas for

her novels and she actually completed "Whose Body" at the rectory in 1923. Her opinion of the Fen country as "dreary" originated from the vast openness of the land around Christchurch, but she drew inspiration from the "three-

quarter sky" and the rare sense of freedom in the

flatness,

She wore a "fetching" dress and a

wide brimmed hat and ... astounded

them clenching a pipe between her

teeth!

exemplified by the stoical qualities of fenfolk whom she admired! She wrote that the Fens was "the last place God made and he left out the stairs". The Nine Tailors arguably the finest of her novels. centred on the Fens, especially in times of flooding. It ran to 30 editions and received Possessed zeal to understand the Fens' great history international acclaim.

The Rev. and Mrs Sayers came to Christchurch in 1917 vacating the large rectory at Bluntisham for 14

a much smaller building. They inherited a parish of uncommon challenge, one dominated by agricultural expertise. The church building cannot equal the fine medieval edifice at Bluntisham. At



Christchurch the church had a tower but it was pulled down to stop the rest of the building from sliding to one side, a common thing in the Fens. Dorothy had her own sitting room at the rectory, now privately owned, and spent long hours

planning her novels. Her early years were challenging, but her time with a publishing company honed her ability as a wordsmith. She also worked away from the Fens and her parents sent her fresh eggs and also daffodils and budding twigs. She sent her

washing to the rectory to save having bills and tried to get a permanent job connected with her talent.

When Dorothy visited Christchurch she joined the church choir for services and, mindful of her time at Oxford University, she wore her graduate apparel. The "Oxford" presence tended to overwhelm her colleagues. She liked to walk in the rectory gardens and the surrounding countryside immersed in thought of future plots for her Lord Peter Wimsey series.

On one occasion Dorothy organized a garden party to boost church funds. She wore a "fetching" dress and a wide brimmed hat and mingled with visitors. A bit of a teaser Dorothy astounded them clenching a pipe between her teeth! Mixing with the elite at London taught her a few mischievous tricks and she tried them out on the villagers.

Dorothy hated cars but loved motorcycles. She eventually married and she and her husband visited Christchurch regularly. Dorothy even took her mother on a short trip on her motorcycle and "she (her mother) was ever so sporting and enjoyed going fast". Her husband, Mac, relished visiting the rectory; he was always impressed by the garden and really looked forward to the fine meals served there.


When the Rev. Sayers died, his wife went to live at a house at Witham, Essex, and she passed away a few months after her husband. Their burial at Christchurch is marked with a small plaque.

In her world famous The Nine Tailors ("more than a detective story, but a novel of astonishing virtuosity") local place names are seen in the plot. Walbeach for instance is a combination of Walsoken and Wisbech. The story is a perpetual monument to Dorothy Sayers and her Knowledge of the Fens and the stoical Fenmen. There are not many around nowadays. She mentions the magnificent angel roof at St Wendreda's Church, March, in her novel. The verger who taught the writer to ring bells had met her there.

Dorothy Sayers died at her home on December 17th 1957 and her last manuscript was completed by her friend, Dr. Barbara Reynolds. The novelist, who also wrote serious works as a Christian apologist, and religious plays such as The Man Born To Be King, brought a nice slice of fame to the Fens, and especially to Christchurch. Trevor Bevis is a native of Pinchbeck, Lincolnshire and moved to March at the outbreak of World War two. He



became a trainee journalist for a provincial newspaper company and gained experience in every printing department. Keenly interested in Fenland History he has written and published in excess of 120 books and booklets on many Fen subjects including most towns in the region. His hobbies are cycling and line drawing and photography and for 64 years he rang bells at several hundred churches and many cathedrals in the country. He took part in the setting up of the National Centre of Work Based Partnership at Middlesex University and still enjoys writing articles for magazines, as he says "Keeping his hand in".



## Christchurch Residents Association

We did not hold a meeting in August but at our meeting on the 10<sup>th</sup> September the following items were discussed and three new members welcomed:

Concerns were expressed over the health of William Beswick, one of our members, who had recently had a heart operation when he needed a drain to overcome some internal bleeding. This had now been stemmed and his wound now sown up. He was now stable and slowly being revived. Since this meeting I am pleased to report that Bill is not only conscious but now on a normal ward and walking about unaided. His wife Margaret can't believe how wonderfully well he looks! Best wishes from us all William for a speedy recovery! Keep up the good work!

There was a brief update on the New Village Hall but there was not much to report as we have not yet heard if the plans have been passed by FDC. However, the work has been put out to tender, and it is hoped that construction of the new village hall can begin very soon.

A proposal had been put before the Parish Council on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> September for an open space that could be used as a 'dog park', due to the large number of dog owners in Christchurch. Whilst there are several walks available in the village and beyond there was no large open area that could be used for training, or ball and Frisbee throwing. One suggestion was that the playing field might be 'trialed' again and policed by

'responsible' dog owners, as

this facility was only lost due to inconsiderate owners not 'picking up' after their pets! Similarly, all dog owners had suffered due to one thoughtless owner who frequented the pub; resulting in a dog ban! It was also suggested that an area to the rear of the football field could be sectioned off and 'policed' as a self-help project. This matter would be looked into and discussed further at a future meeting. However, Chairman Nigel Russell was thanked for seeing that Crown Drove had been cut back to make it more practical for dog walkers. This was now to be maintained in the future too!

Due to a villager vacating Albert House on Church Road in the very near future concerns were expressed over possible future housing development on this plot. Whilst not necessarily being averse to this, residents expressed their concerns and we would keep an eye on the situation.

Residents present expressed their gratitude to Susan Bull of Anglian Water for her clear and concise response to villagers sewage queries, as published in last month's New Heron.

Richard expressed his apologies for not progressing the Neighbourhood Watch scheme as yet. Time had not permitted him to do so with his New Heron commitments, and rehearsing for and organizing HeronAid, which he hoped we would all be attending (see page 22). He hoped to be able to drum up support and collect initial donations towards the cost of signage over the weekend of 20<sup>th</sup>/21<sup>st</sup> September, and get the initial scheme up and running very soon.

"Make Christchurch Safe Campaign" was reviewed, as it had been discussed in detail at the recent Parish Council meeting, where Graham Chappell of the Charlotte's Way Road Safety Campaign had spoken in detail. (PC minutes on page 15 - Ed'.)

Local Highways Improvement Initiative had written to some Christchurch residents requesting their views on the proposed pavement widening scheme near the bus shelter at the beginning of Upwell Road. (*The scheme, and views expressed, are discussed in detail on page 24 - Ed'.*)

Terry Symons is continuing his dialogue with Susan Black of FDC Planning Dept. regarding the proposed housing development in Green Lane. Though residents views have been expressed little or no progress has been made so far!

It was proposed and agreed unanimously that CRA should provide a wreath for presentation on Remembrance Day. All those present agreed to put in £2 each towards this. Sarah Craven agreed to make the necessary arrangements.

The meeting closed at around 9.00pm but discussions continued long after.
