# Letters to the Editor



I am writing on behalf of the Parish Council to respond to the letter posted in the Heron regarding the facilities on the playing field.

Firstly, how delighted I was to hear that the young people in the village care so much about the playing field, the play areas and the skate park. It's very refreshing to see that our young village community are still interested in playing outside rather than inside on their computers, consoles and tablets!

Now, to answer the questions posed in the letter.

Skate Park: It's great that the young people in the village use the skate park, I know my own children enjoy it. It would be great to update it, but unfortunately, that would be a very expensive proposition, the last quote the Council received was for over £30,000 to improve it. We could smarten up the skate parks as the PC do have some paint specifically for it. I will bring this subject up at a future PC meeting, and perhaps could organise a work party and get advice on how we could improve the skate park with our limited budget. Any volunteers?

However, one subject brought up in the last PC meeting was about the amount of litter that builds up in the area. Although a bin would be useful, there are issues with getting it emptied (the refuse lorries do not venture that far up Crown Drove). The nearest bin is, I believe, at the kissing gate at the end of the field, so in order to keep the park tidy, it would be great if we could encourage everyone to remove any rubbish and dispose of it in the bin at the kissing gate.

Play Areas: The newer area was specifically aimed at older children, with the older play areas for toddlers. Some of the play equipment from the area which is now the new hall car park will be refurbished and installed between the new and old areas. Now that the village hall is pretty much complete, the PC will be able to spend time on arranging this. We will also discuss the aging equipment in the older area at a future meeting of the PC, to see what can be done to improve it.

As with any projects like this, the major problem is finding the money to do it. The Parish Council is responsible for many repair activities around the village (grass cutting, tree maintenance, village hall, streetlights etc) and all these take money.

A Parish Council gets its funding by receiving a small amount of the local Council Tax. This is referred to as a 'The Parish Precept'. It's not a huge amount of money, and has to be spent carefully. However, there is some money already set aside for the play park improvements, and the PC will be using it this year to improve the facilities as much as possible.

I hope that has answered some of your questions.

I had to drag my granddaughter in her buggy the length of the car park. It seems very odd to me that this was not picked up at an earlier stage during the planning of the centre. There is hard standing at the entrance to the car park and hard standing around the building itself, but if on foot you need to get to the building first. Not everyone coming to the centre will be dropped off by car if disabled and if there are any child centred activities taking place, obviously there will be buggies and prams. Are there any plans to put in a path through the centre of the drive? If not then I would suggest that this was a matter for urgent discussion. I am sure that with the voting taking place today there will be many more residence fall foul to this oversight.

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# Retiring Chair slams Clerk for costly advice! by Paul Haresnape

Councillors and members of the public were stunned to hear a statement from Cllr Nigel Russell at the May Parish Council. After some opening remarks where he thanked those who had supported him through his tenure as Chairman, he went on to express upset at wrong and very



costly advice given to the Council by the Clerk to the Council, Jacquie Richardson.

The problem arose over a plot of land, known as Poole field, which the Council had rented at a nominal rent for many years, to provide allotments for the community. Over time, as allotments became vacant, local farmer Rodger Symons took the plots from the council, until he retired when the whole field was then advertised for sub-let by sealed bid tender. In the event Cllr Russell (also a farmer) won the bid. A few years ago, the then owners, descendants of Mr Poole, decided they wanted to sell the land, but the Council had 'sitting tenant rights' to remain. Cllr Russell was given notice to vacate by the Council, which he did as the sub tenant. As Chair of the Council he took advice from a land agent and was told it was worth possibly £25,000 to the Council to be bought out of the sitting tenancy.

When the Parish Council discussed this Cllr Russell was advised by the clerk that he had 'an interest' (so did two of the Poole family who were also councillors at that time) and must leave the room and not be involved. Cllr Russell maintained that as he had relinquished his tenancy he no longer had any 'financial interest' and so he should not be excluded. The Clerk disagreed with him. In the event Cllr Russell accepted her professional opinion. He was therefore unable to press the case for obtaining the true worth of that sitting tenancy. Another councillor was in hospital and the three remaining did not obtain solicitor's opinion and, under pressure from the Poole family's solicitors, settled at only £5000.

Subsequently Cllr Russell had been challenged by two members of the public as to why the council

had settled at so low a figure given the value of farmland. He took the chance, in the May meeting, to state that he would not accept any blame for the loss of assets and very much regretted having taken the wrong advice of the Parish Clerk.

During a closed part of the meeting the Clerk's position was discussed and her intention to resign was restated. Accordingly a new Clerk will be sought.

Jacquie Richardson was approached for a statement but she declined saying, "I think I'd better offer no comment for now."

# The Dun Cow

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#### My First Car by Geoff Cochrane

In 1969 I left school at 16 years old to commence a five year engineering apprenticeship with the Cambridge Instrument Company.

I had been mad on cars since childhood and had even learned to drive at eleven years old on a quiet and secluded beach at Allonby on the Solway coast in Cumberland where I was born. The car was my Dad's new Goodwood Green MkIII Zephyr Six, almost identical to the one currently in my possession which can be seen driving around the village occasionally.

Whilst at the Instrument Company's training school in Cambridge we attended Young Street Technical College on one day a week, which was situated close to a car sales lot in Occupation Road called "Fulgar Car Sales". It was here that I purchased my first car, a black 1947 Ford Anglia FOT675 for the princely sum of £20.00 including delivery, as at the time I was too young to drive it on public roads. Mr Fulgar was very keen to point out that when I passed my test that I needed to drive carefully as the car had been fitted with a 1200cc engine out of a later Ford Prefect and was quite a quick machine!

The car certainly performed well, but with it's transverse leaf springs mounted across the width of the car and not mounted in line with the chassis members as on most vehicles, it tended to roll dramatically on the corners and whilst my Mum called the car "Blossom" my fellow apprentices affectionately christened it "Rubber Kingpins".

I kept the car for about eighteen months and sold it to a Swiss student who was at University In Cambridge and intended to take the car home with him. He also doubled my investment paying me

£40.00 for it which was very soon reinvested in a Warwick Green 1957 Mkll Consul and to my continuing lifetime love of cars and vehicles of every sort.



# Views from the Farm Gate

At Fendale Farm it has been a busy few months. We started lambing on the 1st April with 3015 lambs due over the following four weeks. At our peak we were lambing 200 lambs over a 24 hour period. The weather was a battle at times, with the cold rain hitting us mid-April, causing extra work with hypothermic lambs to attend to. We lambed 600 ewes outside in their lambing paddocks and 1000 in yards. We were all kept very busy, and had help from

All the lambs are currently being wormed, mineral drenched, vaccinated and sprayed for flies. This will keep them happy whilst we're sheep shearing over the next month.

local friends and family.

The weather still seems to be unpredictable, but with

the hot days now causing a fly population explosion, shearing is on the cards to control fly strike on the ewes. We started with our shearling (12 month old) ewes on the 17th May, shearing 370 in three days. We had eight beginner shearers to help train for two days, which we love to do. To see the young keen youngsters go through the pain over two days to leave as capable shearers at the end is a great feeling.

We are hoping for a better run of weather so we

We are hoping for a better run of weather so we can get through the 4000 sheep we have to shear. Marketing wool 10 years ago was difficult with 3kg

fleeces being worth less than £1. Reassuringly over the past few years there has been a boom in wool sales worldwide as a natural sustainable fibre. Fleeces can now be worth £3 each, a needed boost for the sheep sector. Wool is flame resistant, fully decomposable, lanolin

Cont... (the oil in the wool) is used for cosmetics and hand creams, wool can be used for many more things such as insulation, body armour and coffins.



So where has Steve been? Good question!



May I take this opportunity to thank all those who donated plants, as well as the committee and club members for their contributions, support and hard work in staging this event. Our regular monthly meeting followed on Tuesday 17th May at the hall, featuring Charles Nelson speaking on Heathers. Dr Nelson is a passionate advocate for growing these plants with their flower and foliage providing brilliant colour throughout the year. These plants are very hardy and easy to look after, however you do need to check your soil to ascertain whether it is Alkaline or Acid in nature. A testing kit is available from local gardening centres although Agricultural colleges will test samples for a small fee. As long as you choose the correct variety for your soil there should be no problem in cultivating Heathers in your very own outside space. It seems it's advisable to purchase plants from a specialist Heather nursery. The Heather Society lists about fifteen of these nurseries in their "Handy Guide to Heathers" the R.H.S. Plant Finder is another useful source of information. The Heather Society can be found at www.heathersociety.org.uk

raised an amazing total of £966.97. Thank you!



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
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# Heron Finances


## With Green Lane, Scott's Road

and Church Road recently resurfaced things are much improved.



# Where we got money from - amount and percentage of total



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
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
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# The Rayner family - the story goes on! by Vivien Haresnape.

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

# Mr Bass Man by Steve Waye

#### The life and times of a Travelling Musician

Some demand the spotlight while claiming to be musicians, while others follow the well travelled road of the journeyman musician. Honing their craft and building their technique as they go, helping to create the household names who, without the endeavours of the session player, would struggle to attain the stardom that they crave. One such musician is Len Skeat.

Len began by playing Clarinet aged twelve, taught by his older brother Bill who later became a top studio player and who was featured on many tracks including notably the Bond themes. Bill would wail away on the clarinet while a young Len would pluck

the bass line on an old Cello. It was then that Len realised he loved playing Bass and wanted to take it further.

While toiling away in his first job in a man's outfitters and tailors in Chadwell Heath, Len bought his first proper instrument from his teacher Bernie Woods for £25.00, a lot of money back then.

Len began the usual round of weddings and bar gigs, slowly becoming known in the business eventually picking up the better jobs that would become available, culminating in his playing his first professional gig in the circus band at Yarmouth which Len remembers as "one of the hardest jobs I've ever done".

Len Skeat and Ray Brown (sadly deceased)

After numerous summer seasons he landed a regular job playing Bass with Phil Tate at the Ilford Palais and it was here that he began his broadcasting career. This led onto more job offers one of which featured Len as the bass player in the band for the BBC's very first Come Dancing, the forerunner of Strictly. There followed a veritable who's who of band leaders including Ted Heath, Cyril Stapleton, Tommy Whittle, the late great Kenny Baker, plus early recording sessions with Tony Hatch (The man responsible for the theme from Neighbours, Crossroads, Jackie Trent and Petula

One night in Edinburgh while playing with the famed jazz violinist Stephan Grappelli a young eleven year old violinist was called to the stage by Grappelli and while Stephan looked on proudly proceeded to blow

the roof off. It was Nigel Kennedy. Other Jazz notables taking advantage of Len's considerable talent on bass were good friends Cleo Laine and John Dankworth on the Spring Collection Tours. Peggy Lee famous for the song Fever which heavily featured the upright Bass, was so enamoured with Len's playing that she placed him front and centre on the stage at the London Palladium, even sitting at his feet while she sang, as Len remembers "it was a bit nerve-racking."

Once again with Grappelli while playing a concert with Ella Fitzgerald, One of the most famous jazz guitarists of all time Joe Pass sat in on guitar, replacing at a moment's notice Grappellis' errant guitar player. The German Bass that Len has played all over the world since he was twenty five has an

> autograph scratched into the shoulder by Tony Bennet, with whom Len on a world tour with Stefan Grappelli. Yet another memorable night occurred when Len was booked to play at a large old country house, to his surprise he found the audience consisted of virtually the whole

played in New York while

Diana Princess of Wales was not present as the very next day it was announced that she was pregnant with William.

But, I hear you ask, what of the present day? Well Len who has recently set up house in this part of the world will be playing at Upwell Jazz Club at Three Holes Village Hall on Sunday 25th September 2016, with his quartet consisting of Mike Smith Drums (BBC Radio Big Band, National Youth Jazz Orchestra) Brian Dee, Piano (Elton John, Peggy Lee) Bruce Adams Trumpet ("He's a big man, with a big sound") and of course Len himself. This is a coup for the club, a not to be missed gig if ever there was one. The band will hit the stage about 12.30 pm.

As my conversation with Len came to a close, I couldn't help but ask him if he had any advice for young musicians just starting out. This is what he said, "While playing always know what to leave out, work on timing. Listen to good music, preferably on headphones. Then listen to it again, so as to hear what you missed the first time. And remember, all music must swing!" That sounds like good advice to me.


