100g currants 100g raisins 100g mixed candied citrus peel 100g glacé cherries, roughly chopped 1 tsp mixed spice generous grating of nutmeg 1 orange, zested and juiced 1 lemon, zested 50ml brandy flavourless oil, for the basin 50g flaked almonds 50g ground almonds 1 tsp gluten-free baking powder 100g gluten-free plain flour 50g gluten-free breadcrumbs 2 eggs, beaten



100g dark brown soft sugar 1 large cooking apple, peeled, cored and grated

Preparation time: 20 minutes (plus overnight soak). Cook: 7 hours Method

STEP 1 - In a large bowl, mix the currants, raisins, candied peel, glacé cherries, mixed spice, nutmeg, orange zest and juice, the lemon zest and brandy together. Cover with a clean tea towel and leave to soak overnight.

STEP 2 - The next day, put an upturned saucer or trivet in the bottom of a deep, wide saucepan and half-fill the pan with water. Bring to a simmer over a low-medium heat. Oil a 1.5-litre pudding basin and line the base with a circle of baking parchment.

STEP 3 - Stir the flaked almonds, apple, ground almonds, baking powder, flour, breadcrumbs, sugar and eggs into the bowl of dried fruit using a wooden spoon. Tip the mixture into the prepared basin, packing it in with the back of the spoon, then cover the surface with another circle of parchment. Cover the basin with sheet of baking parchment, followed by a double layer of foil, then secure it around the rim with kitchen string. Tie on a loop of string to make a handle. Carefully lower the basin onto the upturned saucer in the pan of simmering water and cover with a lid. Cook for 6 hrs, topping up with boiling water from the kettle if needed to ensure the water doesn't boil off below the halfway line.

STEP 4 - Once the pudding is cooked, remove the basin from the pan and leave to cool completely. Remove the pudding from the basin, wrap well in baking parchment and foil and store in a cool, dark place for up to three months. To reheat, return the pudding to its basin, cover as before and lower into a pan of simmering water. Cover and warm through for 1-2 hrs, then remove and serve with brandy cream.

More on those pesky moles and how to stop them

1) Make a Stink

Moles are famously short-sighted, but they have a very acute sense of smell and hearing. One of the best ways to send moles packing is by laying something with a strong, foul smell in their tunnels. Something biodegradable to avoid damaging your garden or killing garden-friendly animals - like old, smelly cheese, fermented yoghurt, or gone-off milk, coffee grounds or powdered red pepper might be worth a try.

2) Make Some Noise

Moles are really sensitive to noise, and they will not want to stay in an area that has frequent loud sounds. Noisy children playing games and running around will make your garden a lot less welcoming to our furry, unwelcome guests or you could try placing one or more radios in their entrance and exit tunnels on a station with loud, boisterous music!

3) Mole Netting

This option is only possible if you are laying new turf, but if that's something you are doing, then this is a method to prevent moles from entering your garden. Mole netting can be bought at garden centres and online and is reliable and long-lasting.

4) Electronic Devices

As mentioned, moles detest loud noise, so some products have been specifically designed to drive moles away. Most of these products produce a low-frequency vibration or sound that repels moles without causing harm to other animals or your garden.

5) Mole Repellents

There are various mole repellent products which primarily do the same thing. They essentially release smoke and castor oil fumes, and this is said to infiltrate the tunnels and ward off worms and other tasty mole snacks.

6) Plant Power

If you are keen to use a more natural repellent, then it's worth planting some vegetative barriers.

There are several plants believed to deter moles such as daffodils and marigolds. Daffodil bulbs are toxic, and so it stands to reason that moles will avoid these. Marigolds are aromatic, and it's thought that, like castor oil, its pyrethrins repel worms and other soil-dwelling mole delicacies, sending the hungry mole to look elsewhere for food.

7) Mole Traps

Sadly sometimes simply repelling moles just isn't enough and if you've tried all of the previous options, then it may be time to consider setting traps.

There are various traps available and, when used correctly, they are considered a humane way to exterminate moles. These traps do not require any bait and you should check them at least once a day.

There are also live traps available, and if you are opting for these, you must check them twice a day; otherwise, the mole may starve or even die of stress before you can safely release it in its new home.

8) Hire a Hitman!

Probably the most sure-fire way to rid your garden of moles is to bring in a professional. That said, this is quite an expensive option and should only be considered if all else fails. Furthermore, as with setting your own traps, it provides no guarantee that a new mole won't make its home in your garden.

PC Snippets

Public Time

The stable block building planning application behind Brimstone Close/Fen View was discussed with the public being in opposition to the application. It was pointed out that the same builder has not fully complied with environmental considerations with respect to the Brimstone Close development, as well as working beyond reasonable hours.

The Planning application on Church Road was raised, with concerns voiced regarding safety (speed limit), drainage etc. These are issues that would need to be addressed as part of the application.

Andrew Sparrow commented that development has occurred in the past, which has allowed current residents to live in the village - and we need the village to develop to ensure its future and to attract facilities.

PCC Matters

The local plan has flagged up the field behind Brimstone Close as part of the local plan for further development of houses. There are concerns regarding the drainage, but the PCC has no grounds to object to the plan as set before them but will pass the public objections to the planning department. The Draft local plan is in Flood Zone 1. The Church Road development includes a path to Church Lane, and a suggestion was added that the plan should include street lighting. The PCC had no objections to this proposal.

Matters Outstanding

- Affordable Housing a questionnaire is currently being prepared.
- Wayside Estate there is a meeting planned with highways regarding safety but measures may be limited to line marking. It was pointed out that a oneway system is not practical as this has been shown to increase traffic speeds.
- Parishioner engagement included in the last Heron as a QR code
- Santa Run 16th December, volunteers are needed to collect money in buckets

- Highways Weeds this is becoming a problem, and more action is needed
- Play Equipment inspections entered on MS Forms, and a form will be produced to share to assist in inspections, and assure documentation
- No Police report, but it was noted that NO gas is now classed as a class C drug
- Cllr Dal Roy notes: Our MP is now the Minister for the Environment, and Cllr Roy is building a database of local farmers to be able to support them in future. There is a small budget for any small crime prevention projects. The Syringa House caravan issue is progressing slowly.

Other matters discussed included the 20th Anniversary of the Golden Age. The FDC Carol Service at St Peter's Church, Wisbech on 8th Dec, the FDC Hate Crime resources pack, the National Lottery maximum grant to be increased to £20k, the FDC has a fund to assist with heating swimming pools, the National Pay for PCs agreed at 6% from March 2023, and the Cambridge council for Voluntary services AGM is 15th November.

The dog exercise area at the Dun Cow was mentioned and currently there is no planning permission for change of use. The closure of the PCC bank account by Barclays Bank was discussed at some length.

A comment was made that Hare coursers have been spotted in the area – these need to be reported as it's happening, with descriptions, registration numbers and as much information as possible.

The recreation extension – 300 more trees were planted, with 400 more still to go. We are awaiting a quote for clearing and seeding the field.

Highways

There is a fund for new projects, and a suggestion was for street lighting on Church Road.

There was a reminder about the 16ft Bank closure between Jan 8^{th} and March 8^{th} 2024, including cyclists.

Next Meeting is 11th December, 7:30pm.

The children in Emerald Class have been working with Heritage England since February and discovered the history of Christchurch, our little village in the Fens. The project involved them writing a song and performing it in an online concert with other schools last week. There were so many different avenues that we could have followed but it was decided that we would explore the old river Croft and our link to a special butterfly.

Our first two work sessions as a class took place back in May. We joined Tom Kitching from Just Beneath the Surface for a word workshop. He helped us to understand our village's history: why there is a settlement here, what the landscape and noisescape would have been like, how people lived and what has changed over the years. Tom worked with us to build lists of words, phrases and sentences to describe our environment. We went back 6,000 years to when the first people came to this part of the world and learnt about Brimstone Hill and the link it has with Christchurch. We discovered more about Charles Francis Townley who was the Rector of Christchurch between 1888 and 1912. The Reverend Townley was widely respected and helped the villagers in many practical ways. In 1932, two years after his death, the new school in Christchurch was opened and called The Townley School. This was in honour not only of Charles but of all the Townleys as they had been an influential family in the area for more than a century.

Our last work session took place in June with The Young'Uns. They were incredibly positive, patient and helpful when it came to putting our history, our ideas and our previous work together to write our school song. We loved the folk aspect of the song and really enjoyed describing the Brimstone butterfly because our village used to be called Brimstone Hill after the butterfly.

After a lot of practice, we sang this song to our families and peers in assembly in July and everybody left the school hall humming the chorus. It was great to learn more about where we live. You can sing along here:

The Lincolnshire village honoured in every Disney film since 2006

It is exactly 100 years since Walt Disney founded his famous film studio, which has made some of the world's best-loved movies. What's less well known is the story of the founder's links to a tiny English village in Lincolnshire. A shooting star flies around Sleeping Beauty's castle to the soaring strings of 'When You Wish Upon a Star', as multi-coloured fireworks explode and a perfect arc of light is formed in the sky before disappearing.



That is the title sequence at the start of every Disney movie since 2006 - meaning that whether it is the live action Little Mermaid or the latest animated release Elemental, a tribute has just been paid to a Lincolnshire village with a population of 242.

In 1965, for the 10th anniversary of the Disneyland theme park in California, Walt decided he wanted to add a coat of arms to Sleeping Beauty's castle. He was asked if there was a Disney crest. He said, "Yes, I remember I saw it in Norton Disney in 1949 when I was in England filming Treasure Island. I went to that little town and saw the coat of arms."

So they took photographs of it and they reproduced it on the castle in Disney, California, and since then it is on every Disney castle in all Disney parks. It even appears now at the beginning of every Disney movie." So, since 2006 at the start of every Disney film, three lions can be seen flying on the flag at the top of Sleeping Beauty's castle - a tribute to Norton Disney.

Christmas Classical Tales. Beethoven at 20, meets one of his musical idols ... probably

When Ludwig van Beethoven was 20 years old, Santa Claus brought him the chance to meet one of his musical idols. Franz Joseph Haydn was passing through Beethoven's hometown, Bonn, on his way to London. On the day after Christmas, Bonn's Elector, Max Franz, invited Haydn to a party in his honour with local musicians. While no records indicate the dinner party's precise guest list, Beethoven, considered Bonn's best pianist and emerging composer, was almost definitely there.



Whatever impression the young Ludwig might have made on the

exalted master that Christmas, a year and a half passed before Haydn, stopping again in Bonn, concluded that Beethoven's unprecedented talent demanded the cultivation of none other than Haydn himself. In November of 1792, Beethoven, his luggage full of scores and sketches, arrived in Vienna as Haydn's newest pupil, beginning the most significant chapter yet of his instruction.



When Christmas is Celebrated around the world.

Many people think Christmas is on December the 25th and that's all there is to Christmas. However, for many people around the world, in different countries and in different

Christian traditions, Christmas lasts for a lot longer than that - and it's even celebrated at different times!

The name 'Christmas' comes from the Mass of Christ (or Jesus). A Mass service (sometimes called Communion or Eucharist) is where Christians remember that Jesus died and then came back to life. The 'Christ-Mass' service was the only one that was allowed to take place after sunset (and before sunrise the next day), so people had it at Midnight! So we get the name Christ-Mass, shortened to Christmas.

Although December 25th (or the late afternoon/ evening of December 24th) is the date when most people celebrate Christmas, there are some other dates as well!

Some churches (mainly Orthodox and Coptic Orthodox churches) use a different calendar for their religious celebrations. Orthodox Churches in Russia, Belarus, Serbia, Jerusalem and other countries use the old 'Julian' calendar and people in those churches celebrate Christmas on January 7th. The Coptic Orthodox Church celebrates Christmas on January 7th. The Ethiopian Orthodox Tewahedo Church also celebrates Christmas on the 7th January (which is the 29th of Tahsas in their calendar). Most people in the Greek Orthodox Church celebrate Christmas on December 25th. But some still use the Julian calendar and so celebrate Christmas on 7th January! Some Greek Catholics also celebrate on January 7th.

In 2023, the law was changed in Ukraine so Christmas will be celebrated on December 25th rather than on January 7th.

The Armenian Apostolic Church celebrates Christmas on January 6th. It also celebrates Epiphany on this day.

Advent - The Time Before Christmas

Before Christmas, many Christians use the time of Advent to prepare themselves and get ready to celebrate the joy of Christmas, when Christians celebrate of the birth of Jesus, who they believe is the Son of God.

Advent is normally a period of four Sundays and weeks before Christmas. In many Orthodox and Eastern Catholics Churches Advent lasts for 40 days, starting on November 15th. In Orthodox Churches which celebrate Christmas on 7th January, Advent starts on 28th November!

And if you think that's complicated enough, after Christmas, there's a whole lot more – but perhaps we'll leave that for another year.

Storm Babet: Cambridgeshire fire service received 1,500 calls

Heavy downpours caused by Storm Babet meant a fire service experienced its "busiest 24 hours on record." Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service said its staff handled more than 1,500 calls and logged

more than 640 incidents. The storm destroyed homes and businesses and a major incident was declared in neighbouring Suffolk.

Chief fire officer Chris Strickland praised the hard work of his colleagues during the peak period. "Despite the extreme workload generated by the storm, the combined fire control provided a great service throughout and clearly showed how cost effective and efficient a joint facility can be," he said. People had to be rescued from their cars in Suffolk and Charsfield in the county recorded 78mm of rain (3in) in 24 hours, as did Wattisham.

HEATING ADVICE:

Should you keep your heating on all day?

The Met Office, which measures temperatures and weather for the UK, recommends setting timers to turn the heating on before you get up and off after you've gone to bed. If no one is at home all day then you can have it turn off before you leave and on again just before you get back.

Does turning down radiators save money?

The Energy Saving Trust recommends setting them at three or four to start, and then go up or down if the room is too hot or too cold.

Heat the rooms you use often and forget the rest

If you're worried about bills, stick to heating the rooms you use the most by using the radiator controls. Don't forget to close the door on the rooms you're leaving cold and think about getting draught excluders to keep your rooms extra snug.

Stay warm without turning the heating up

Wearing thick clothes and using warm bedding can help to keep you warm even if your home is on the chilly side. Opening your curtains when the sun is shining will also help. Just remember to shut them again when the sun goes down.

Get help with heating costs from the government

The government is giving pensioners and people on certain benefits extra help with heating costs. If you already get benefits or a state pension you can check if you can get some more help. A man who discovered his father's beloved classic car on an auction website has completed its restoration after three years of graft.



Malcolm Stern, from Rickmansworth, Hertfordshire, chanced on the 1930s Talbot Darracq while trying to recreate a 3D model. He said he could not believe it was the very car his father owned, although it had become a "right wreck".

The 94-year-old said taking it to the road again was "terrifying".

"Many people get old cars but this one is different, because it was my father's car, it makes it a little bit special," he said.

Mr Stern bought a 3D printer before lockdown and wanted to make a model of the bright yellow classic car his father owned and drove when he was growing up.

When looking for reference pictures on the internet, he found the actual car being sold at auction.

He said his father, Alec Stern, acquired the car in 1935, adding: "He drove that car to work every day, and he took us on picnics."

The yellow classic car was manufactured in 1930 and is nearly as old as Malcolm Stern himself.

When Mr Stern and his wife went to visit the car, they said it looked a "right wreck" but decided to buy it for £6,000 because it was so special.

"For sentimental reasons I thought I would buy it... then we brought the car home, and that was in September 2020 and I've been working on the car three years since," he said.

"The original engine was smashed up in a rally... I reckon that the renovators did about 2,000 hours work and I reckon I did about 1,000."

Mr Stern now hopes to spend another six months renovating the interior, saying the restoration project had been "difficult" and "expensive".

He said: "I'm still very excited, very surprised that I'm 94, able to be here and do this and still be fit enough to go out in the car for a ride.

"I think my father would be very proud, he'd be very excited as well," he said.

Skating in the Fens

In 1879, James Smart from Welney became Britain's only ever World Champion speed skater. "The village has a tremendous amount of skating history attached to it, it's quite a unique place. It's the home of Fen Skating".

'There were a lot of underhand dealings'

When the weather was freezing, skating matches were held in towns and villages all over the Fens. In local matches, men - or sometimes women or children - would go in for prizes of money, clothing, or food.

Different things would be raced for - Farmers would put up a side of pork or beef but there were a lot of underhand dealings because the activity and the sport, at this time, wasn't regulated.

Modern Skating born in Cambridge

On February 1, 1879, a number of Cambridgeshire bigwigs met in the Guildhall, Cambridge, to set up the National Skating Association. The aim of the meeting was to have greater control of the sport, which until then had been unregulated.

The founding committee consisted of a fellow of Trinity College, two members of parliament, various landowners, the mayor of Cambridge, a Wisbech journalist called James Drake Digby, and the president of Cambridge University Skating Club. It was the Wisbech journalist, James Drake Digby, who had a hand in pushing for the sport to be further regulated.



'They always forget the Cambridge ice skating story'

"He could see it was a great activity, it was something that could be done during the winter months, it was becoming really competitive".



It was curious that Cambridge had not become eponymous with skating, "When people talk about Cambridge they talk about the rules of football, but they always forget about the ice-skating story.

"If it wasn't for Fen skating, we wouldn't have the International Skating Union (ISU), all the activities and sport that spawned out of it, or Dancing on Ice or all the other shows we see on TV today. Fen Skating was the inspiration behind the members of the ISU that got the Olympic Ice-Skating movement off the ground."
